Outreach Committee News – Karen Farmer

I love the stillness that comes with falling snow, blanketing the world in a quiet innocence that reminds me of the quiet nature of God's love. God is everywhere in the silence of winter, speaking to us, reassuring us that His love is constant.

During this month of February, dedicated to expressions of love, the Outreach Committee continues to find ways to share God's love with our community. We will be collecting hats, gloves, scarves, and socks for Neighborhood Alliance (Genesis House) this winter. Check the snowman in the Sunday School hallway for details of this vital mission. The Christian Appalachian Project and Heifer International wrote to us to express their gratitude for our financial support last month.

We voted to continue our \$100 monthly membership in the Community Care Club. We are considering requests for donations from the Lorain County Free Clinic, as well as, the Human Rights Campaign (HRC), which strives to end discrimination against the LGBTQ+ community. We are looking into possibly hosting a "yard sale" in the parking lot, a fundraiser sale of gift cards to Red Robin restaurants, and a "Dine & Donate" event at an area restaurant. We plan to have One World Shop bring their mobile store to the church for some Mother's Day shopping opportunities once again in April.

We hope that we may make a difference in the lives of many through these missions. May you know that, even with no footprints in the pristine landscape of new fallen snow, God has walked this way and asks that we follow by sharing His message of love.

<u>Deacons' Desk</u> – Karen Dreger

Ash Wednesday is February 14 this year. It is the first day of Lent which is 6 1/2 weeks before Easter. It is important to experience Ash Wednesday in preparation for Christ's Resurrection on Easter Sunday. It is a time of repentance and reflection. Christians today will often give up something for Lent such as sweets, a special coffee, smoking, or social media. The 40-day period of Lent is a time to reflect on man's sinful humanity and Jesus' sacrifice for our sins.

In biblical times, sprinkling oneself with ashes has been a mark of repentance and sorrow for one's sins. Often the ashes used on Ash Wednesday come from palm leaves of Palm Sunday of the year before. The ashen cross on your forehead (or hand) is a reminder of the power of the cross. Genesis 3:19 reads: "By the sweat of your brow you will eat your food until you return to the ground, since from it you were taken; from dust you are made and to dust you will return." Even though our bodies will return to ashes (dust), our spirits can live eternally with our Savior."

<u>Trustees' Turn</u> – Roy Dreger

During the trustees' first meeting of the year it was decided, among other projects, to have Geisel come in again to present their suggestions for updating our heating and cooling systems. One of the two furnaces that heat the sanctuary had to have a new circuit board several months ago and it cost almost \$1,000.00. On Saturday, January 13, Barb discovered the temperature in the sanctuary was only about 57 degrees. Geisel was called out for a service call and, perhaps not unexpectedly, the remaining furnace was found to have a bad circuit board. The furnaces were 24 years old and have had a history as of late of breaking down. (The air conditioning units were of the same age and condition and use an older type of refrigerant that is not easy to find, nor is it cheap to purchase once you find it.)

Something needed to be done, and sooner rather than later. Aside from being too cold for services to be held in the sanctuary, temperatures too cold or too hot are not good for the organ. Barb says the organ should not be subject to extreme temperatures changes and repairing the organ (again) would just compound the cost of getting everything back to normal.

Therefore, the trustees decided by consensus that, rather than investing more money in the furnaces or air conditioning units, this was the time to replace them before the cost to repair was more than what replacement would cost.

SO, we have had both heating and A/C units replaced. With that in mind, I am going to recommend to the trustees that a capital campaign be started to help pay for the heating and cooling units as well as other infrastructure problems that need to be dealt with before they become exorbitantly expensive. If we do start a campaign, we will provide a list of projects that we feel need to be done so that you will know what your contributions are funding. You are, of course, free to donate to this or any other project at any time.

We have received an estimate for ceiling repair in the sanctuary above the organ as well as painting in Fellowship Hall. We will be discussing this at our February meeting, so if you have any thoughts on this matter, please let one of the trustees know before then. A quote was received for cleaning the stove hood and duct work in the kitchen. This is supposed to be done on a yearly basis to satisfy the insurance company as well as the state fire marshal. This work is slated to be done early in February.

As always, your financial support of this church keeps our ministry in North Ridgeville functioning, and we thank you for that.
