Friends, as I wrap up my ministry as your bridge pastor, I've been looking back over many things and reliving some memories. I'm grateful to have met so many wonderful people and to have lived this little slice of life together – a collection of joys and challenges. I feel especially grateful to have worshiped with you, to have had the opportunity to dive into God's Word every week. And I was not expecting to include my banjo on Sunday mornings! The staff is talented and hard-working and I'm thankful to know them. The leadership is very dedicated.

During the announcement time on Sunday mornings, it seemed we were regularly talking about food. Every healthy church eats together and is planning the next big meal. If I had one piece of advice, it would be to keep this up. It's scriptural! Hungry people need to eat. In Genesis, God sends manna and quail. In the New Testament book of Acts (chapter 10), God reveals inclusive food to Peter – he shouldn't be afraid to be around the people he previously considered unclean. I'll confess that I have a favorite food story: Jesus feeding 5,000 people is mentioned in all the gospels. In my imagination we're there with that crowd of thousands by the Sea of Galilee. We are hungry or "hangry," with no markets or convenience stores nearby. Jesus tells his worried disciples take their two fish and five loaves and... "You give them something to eat." It was a faith

exercise, to say the least! Of course, the presence of Jesus made all the difference.

I believe that's when we are most connected to God, when we simply trust Jesus to take our resources and multiply them, when we love God and look for neighbors who need love. Like Jesus, we look around us and see a great crowd with many needs. Like him, we have "compassion for them, because they [are] like sheep without a shepherd." The difference we can make together in our community and our world is exciting, and it is clearly happening. Be generous with God's gifts and keep up the good work! You give them something to eat!

A good friend in faith, Pastor Andy Call, shared this recently, and I thought it would be great to send to you (original post by Belgian-American Esther Perel). This was shared upon the events that have shaken the Middle East in the past few weeks:

- >Be careful to separate people from the policies of their governments.
- >Be careful to separate people from the actions of terrorists who live among them.
- >Be careful not to collapse history and context into narrow interpretation.
- >Be careful not to eschew complexity and nuance for the sake of memeification.
- >Be careful to recognize that grief for one side does not mean hate for the other.
- >Be careful to understand that support for one side does not mean hate for the other.
- >Be careful of gaslighting on a mass level: disinformation and denial of loss.

- >Be careful not to dismiss the excruciating and real pain of others. Do not make it worse.
- >Be careful not to say online things that you would not say to someone in real life.
- >Be careful not to add hatred on top of hatred; we are all being crushed underneath its compounding weight.
- >Be careful not to lose empathy for those with whom you disagree. Be careful not to dehumanize others. Doing so dehumanizes you.
- >Do not lose touch with the parts of you needed most: Your compassion. Your humanity. Your care.

That strikes me as solid and helpful advice. I would add the reminder to keep the faith, especially amid challenging times. Christ said we should be known not for our rightness, but by the way we love one another.



FAQ about Pledging

Q: What does it mean to make a financial pledge?

A: Making a financial pledge is promising to give a specific dollar amount of your financial resources.

Q: Why is pledging important?

A: Pledging is important because it allows you to reflect on the gifts God has given you and show your thanks for those gifts by giving back to the church. There is also a very practical reason: Each year we create a budget based on the total income we expect to receive the next year (pledges). The budget is the foundation for planning for the next year's events.

Q: What are the areas I can pledge to?

A: We have three pledging accounts – operating, outreach and capital. Pledges to the operating fund help to pay for the day-to-day expenses of the church including utilities and salaries. Outreach pledges are used to help support outreach efforts in the wider community and world. Pledges to the capital fund are used for to buy, maintain, or improve the church's fixed assets, such as buildings, vehicles, equipment, or land and when money is used towards extending the useful life of an existing asset.

Q: Who should make a financial pledge to the church?

A: Everyone! Even if you are not a member of First Congregational Church, you can still pledge. It takes the help of everyone in the church to allow us to function and do God's work.
