District VI Meeting Update


I am so very proud of our club. Representatives from 13 garden clubs were in attendance to celebrate the 100th birthday of FFGC

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GO NATIVE! NATIVE PLANTS

Do you know what plants you have growing in your yard? If you have identified everything and found something that is invasive, what do you plant instead?



Here are some options. **Coral ardisia** (Ardisia crenata) is a federally noxious weed. You cannot move any plant part (berries, leaves, roots) anywhere except by placing it in a trash bag and put-

ting it into your trash bin. Do not compost this plant. Do not put it in the yard debris pile for your city or county to mulch.

Some alternatives are wildcoffee (Psychotria

nervosa), Dahoon holly(llex vomitoria) or Gallberry (llex glabra).



Mexican petunia (Ruellia simplex) is often over used and it is an invasive species in all of Florida. Great alternatives include wild petunia (Ruellia caroliniensis), blueporterweed (Stachytarpheta jamaicensis), and Stokes aster (Stokesia laevis).




Taro (Colocasia esculenta) or elephant ear is another beautiful plant but it is invasive in all of Florida especially in our water bodies.

Plant the **Florida swamp lily** (Crinumamericanum), the mangrove spider lily (Hymenocallis latifolia), or caladiums(Caladium x hortulanum) instead.
