Well, she has tripled her inventory and will be sharing lots of new "toys". She is in Paducah right now getting ready to join us.

(The Block Auction has been moved to the September meeting.)

Southern California Council of Quilt Guilds Meeting April 10th.

This meeting was held in Yucaipa, hosted by the Citrus Belt Quilters Guild. It really was a wonderful day - and the ladies were friendly, welcoming and helpful. I can't report on the quilt stores in the area (there were several, but I had to run to Redondo Beach after about a puppy). The meeting covered business issues - most of the board was either ill or out of town so this went quickly. After a short break, we had presentations dealing with Community Service possibilities. It was a real tear-filled session. I am summarizing for you the information that was presented and have provided the same details to our board and the community service chairfolk.

1) Royal Family Kids Camp - Presenter Darly Dulion (once owner of Quilt n Things). This is a series of camps that are sponsored by churches, started in 1985 with 155 in the United States, and 20 international. They have over 7000 children go through the camps each summer which are staffed by volunteers. Their website is <a href="www.rfkc.org">www.rfkc.org</a> where you can check out what is happening. They normally look for a church to support all or part of a camp, but are willing to take donations.

They normally accept pillowcases, birthday boxes (most of the kids have never had a birthday party) and quilts. I am avoiding some of what really got to me - the children are from the foster system, and have been abused. They are given a week in the summer at a camp where there is a "grandpa" (who tells lots of stories), a "grandma" (who bakes cookies etc), an aunt, uncle - role models who have positive sides. One night there is a birthday party and the children each receive a birthday box which is approximately shoe box size with gifts in it.

2) Citrus Belt Quilters - Presenter Marguerite Tate. They have approximately 30 community service projects that they support in some way. They pick 5 or 6 to concentrate on each year, organizing workshops to create what they are donating.

3) Los Angeles Veterans Quilt Project - Presenter Karen Van Den Brink. Karen spurred this project beginning about 5 years ago. They focus on giving a quilt to every soldier returning from Iran and Afghanistan who has been wounded. When they register with the VA, they are allowed to choose a quilt. Most are red/white and blue but others are not and all seem to find a home with someone. Most are lap or twin size but if you give them a bigger one, it will be available to the returning vets. She told of one that was peach & green, full sized. It turned out to be peach cow/bull skulls. They put it in the mix. There was a couple who was returning and fell in love with it. Apparently it was perfect for their home - colors and theme.

#### PROGRAMS, Continued

Karen emphasized that all donations are accepted for the quilts. See the San Fernando Valley Guild website for meeting times if you want to help with this effort. One of the most interesting things she presented was that they used the block of the month blocks to create quilts. The "winner" receives a prize instead of the blocks.

4) Quilts for those who died in service to our country - Presenter Cathy Kreater. Don Beld, the current council treasurer started this effort. They have given over 660 quilts to the families that have lost someone - in California. This effort is nationwide, but she was speaking to efforts in our state. If you go to Don's site you can get details on the quilts, the block they are recommending and the size. The guilts are civil war era style quilts that were called "Sanitary" quilts. The size was made to fit the cots the soldiers slept on and they were used instead of blankets (which they didn't have) or to wrap them for burial. Most are tied. Their biggest problem - finding the families because of privacy issues, it isn't easy. If someone in the community or other quilt guild members knows of a family who has lost someone, the council asks that they please provide the information and they will be sure the family gets a quilt. Cathy also presented a new project that Don started - the National Home of the Brave quilt - a block for someone you have lost in the war - to be put together and shows beginning in April 2011. The remainder of the meeting was guild member announcements. Sometimes this means flyers that can be brought back to the guilds. This time there were only a few:

Antelope Valley Quilt Association May 22nd - Quilt Home Tour with display quilts. This is instead of their show.

Beach Cities Quilters Guild, Southern Ventura County - June 5-6 FantaSea of Beauty Quilt Show

Camarillo Quilters Association - May 1 & 2 Quilting by the Sea, Ventura County Fairgrounds. They have a quilter who is 80 this year and generates over 75 community service quilts each year.

North Cities Quilt Guild (Placentia) April 25th - Spring Fling. Honors new members and has Stuffed Baskets, over 100 available for a silent auction. This is their meeting, guests are free.



Are you concerned about ink usage when printing the newsletter? You have several options:

- 1. Don't print it, save to file and read at leisure.
- 2. Print it in grayscale (doesn't use color ink) From your menu bar, Click on File, Print, Properties, then in the "COLOR" tab, check the box named "Print in Grayscale", then OK.
- 3. Print in draft mode and grayscale (uses less ink)

Same steps as above. But instead of the "COLOR" tab, select the "Paper/Quality" tab. Look for "Print Quality". This is usually defaulted to "Normal". Click on the drop down menu and select "Fast Normal" or "Fast Draft", then OK.






