There are so many great deals out there and with every great dealer there is a scammer waiting to take advantage of people. The following is a list of places you should look at the next time you would like to purchase your next numismatic, silver, or gold piece.

Where to Buy:

- #1 Dealers and Auctions at the Ocean County Coin Club Meetings
 - They are right in the back of the room at all of our meetings. These friendly and knowledgeable vendors will always seek to give you great deals on most of their items.
- #2 Local Coin Shops
 - There are local coin shops throughout our area. Make sure to compare prices and check out the locations. See what makes you comfortable and do deals with people you trust. At least you can see a face to the transaction.
- #3 Online Dealers
 - The following are some of the online dealers that are known to be trustworthy but might have higher premiums: The U.S. Mint, JM Bullion, SD Bullion, and APMEX. BE CAREFUL with every other website NOT listed above. There are many scams going on out there.

What is the difference between the various types of silver?

Silver Rounds - Silver rounds are flat discs made of silver at a private minting firm. They are not a valid currency; think of them rather as a silver bar. They come in all types of sizes. These silver pieces cost less than their coin counterparts. Some examples are listed below:







Silver Coins - Silver coins are minted by the government and can be used as a currency. They are usually made of .999 Pure Silver and .9999 Pure Silver. These too come in a variety of different sizes and because they are minted by sovereign governments they come at a higher premium than silver rounds. Coins will always have a face value on them, year of mintage, and government name on it. Some examples are listed below:







Junk Silver or Constitutional Silver - Junk silver coins are circulated 90% US silver coins, minted prior to 1965 that are referred to as "junk" because they contain less silver than bullion pieces. Some people purchase junk silver coins purely for their silver content while others seek to get them graded and collect them for their numismatic value. Constitutional Silver is simply US currency, usually seen in dimes, quarters, and half dollars minted before 1965.

Native American \$1 Coin Program (Cont.)

The theme of the 2023 Native American \$1 Coin is: Maria Tallchief and American Indians in Ballet.

Maria Tallchief is considered America's first major prima ballerina. She is the first Native American (Osage Nation) to hold the rank. In addition to Tallchief, four other American Indian ballerinas from Oklahoma achieved international recognition in the 20th century, including her younger sister Marjorie Tallchief, Yvonne Chouteau, Rosella Hightower, and Moscelyne Larkin. Celebrated as the "Five Moons," their legacy of achievement and inclusion continues to influence ballet today.

The 2022 Native American \$1 Coin honors Ely Samuel Parker Ely Samuel Parker was a U.S. Army officer, engineer, and tribal diplomat, who served as military secretary to Ulysses S. Grant during the U.S. Civil War. When Robert E. Lee surrendered at Appomattox, Virginia, on the morning of April 9, 1865, Parker rendered the formal surrender documents in his own hand.

The theme of the 2021 Native American \$1 Coin is Native Americans in the U.S. Military.

Native Americans have served in the Armed Forces of the United States in each of our nation's conflicts, beginning with the Revolutionary War. They have served at a higher rate in proportion to their population than any other ethnic group. During World War I, Native Americans volunteered to fight in astonishing numbers although most were ineligible for the draft. Of the 10,000 Native Americans who served in the Army and the 2,000 who served in the Navy, three out of four were volunteers.

Native Americans have received recognition for their service, including five Medals of Honor during World War II. Their exemplary record of military service continues to this day.

American Women Quarters 2023 Rolls and Bags - Eleanor Roosevelt





Eleanor Roosevelt was one of our most active and influential first ladies. She was an author, reformer, civil liberties and human rights advocate, and the first American woman delegate to the United Nations. She was also a member of the first delegation to the UN.

The reverse (tails) design depicts Eleanor
Roosevelt and the scales of justice against a
backdrop representing the globe, symbolic of her
impactful work with the Universal Declaration of
Human Rights. Inscriptions are "UNITED STATES
of AMERICA," "QUARTER DOLLAR," "E PLURIBUS
UNUM," "ELEANOR ROOSEVELT," and
"UNIVERSAL DECLARATION OF HUMAN
RIGHTS."


