Meeting Minutes

Date: October 1, 2023 Time: 9:00 a.m.

Type of Meeting: General Meeting Facilitator: Keith Parsels

- 1. *Call to order:* The meeting was called to order at 9:01am by President Keith Parsels.
- II. *Approval of minutes from last meeting*: The minutes were reviewed. Bryon moved to accept the minutes as written; Kelvin seconded the motion. Motion Passed.
- III. Treasurer's report:

Main Club Account: \$6,331.11; Youth Account: \$1, 505.00. There is one outstanding check for the electric bill from last month - \$103.

- IV. Old Business:
 - a) Work Party Saturday, October 21st, 2023 from 8:00am 12 noon.
 Scotty asked how many folks were planning on attending. Thirteen people volunteered. He has a list with the tasks that we want to work on and asked that members step up and take the lead for each of the tasks. Butch volunteered to lead the team for the two river trails. Debbie will take on the kitchen. Debbie reminded everyone that if they sign in and work all four hours, lunch will be provided.
 - b) Haunted Canyon Shoot October 28th. There will be 20 targets, kid's (12 & under) Costume Contest. Prizes for Scariest, Cutest, and Most Original costumes. Three classes: Men's, Women's, and Youth (17 & under); Two Divisions: Compound and Traditional. First place only to be awarded. Concession Stand will be open for hot dogs/chili dogs & nachos, and drinks. Debbie has placed flyers in Sprague's Sports, Cal Stores, and Firearms Unknown, and handed out flyers to members to hang in their workplaces or other businesses that they deem appropriate.
 - c) Bathroom update Butch stated that the work on the doors will begin on Saturday, Oct. 21st. Gump will have the porta-pottys from Mayflower delivered prior to the work party.
 - d) Gates Scotty has a friend who will make gates for the driveway. He also says that the county will build a berm along the south side of the range along the road. He noted that people who really wanted to get in would probably just drive over it, but it would probably keep the honest people honest. Discussion ensued about what kind of lock to put on the gate and who would receive keys. Debbie suggested that we put a 4-digit combo lock on the gate and when members paid their dues and received their membership card, the combination would be on the card.
 - e) Raffle prizes and monetary donations Debbie has drafted a generic letter to send to local businesses. She will make the letter available in a Word format that can be edited to anyone who knows of a specific business that they would like to approach. Scott suggested that we sell course sponsorships for the 3D Championships at two levels: a \$500 sponsorship that would include two banners, mention on the flyer, as well as Facebook and Instagram and be featured on the Podcast as well as the 3D Championship Website. The second level would cost \$250 that would include the two banners and the flyers only. He will pursue that idea further.

- V. New business:
 - a) Rebar for Targets Scotty noted that we seem to need some more rebar for the targets and for the number signs that need to be built for the 3D Championship, and asked the club if anyone had a lead on some or if we should just buy a bag of them. Ebb said he will take care of the rebar needs.
 - b) PVC for signage on course We need to make signage for each of the 8 courses. The other clubs that host the 3D Championship have PVC signs made from a, 3/4" pipe, 4' high, w/90 degree elbow, then a 1' long piece with an endcap, from which a target number will be hung from two hooks. Butch expressed concern that PVC is expensive. Debbie suggested that if anyone knew of a landscape company that may have old PVC laying around, please contact them. Keith said that the farm where he shoots may have some laying around, and he would check on that. Debbie will price some new PVC for info.

VI. Items from the floor:

- a) Tanja Eiben reported on the Hunt-Her Optics Workshop Part 2 that was held at our range on Saturday, September 30. Scott Covey, Kris Warren, Gump, Kelvin and Tanja set up 11 targets around the Canyon Course and taught a dozen members of the Yuma Desert Doves beginning hunting group how to 'glass up' animals in the field. Tanja reported that it was quite successful and thanked the club for allowing this to be held here, and especially thanked those who helped to set it up, mentor, and make it so successful!
- b) Shirts We still have some shirts left from the last order; mostly kids sizes and small and medium adult sizes. Do we want to sell these at the Haunted Canyon Night Shoot? Discussion followed, and it was agreed to sell what we have at the Haunted Canyon Shoot, and then we will order more shirts for the WWT and #D Championship Shoots.
- c) Volunteers Scott noted that no one volunteered to be the lead for any of the projects for the work party, so he will simply assign people to different tasks. "DON'T (COMPLAIN) about what you are assigned!!!!!!"
- VII. *Adjournment:* Gump motioned that the meeting be adjourned; Scott seconded the motion. Motion passed.

The meeting was adjourned at 9:32 am.

From the Hunter's Kitchen:

Reverse Seared Goose Breast

This is a fantastic goose breast recipe if you want to try eating it like a steak. Just be sure to start the cooking very slowly, rest the meat well, then slice thin.

Prep Time: 10 minutes Cook Time: 2 hours, 15 minutes Total Time: 2 hours, 25 minutes Servings: 4 servings



Course: Appetizer, lunch, Main Course Cuisine: American Diet: Gluten Free Author: Hank Shaw

Ingredients

- 1 goose breast, both halves
- Salt and freshly ground black pepper
- 2 tablespoons minced fresh rosemary

Instructions

- Salt the goose breasts about an hour before you plan to cook them. Keep them in the fridge. Get your smoker or oven to about 175°F to 200°F. For smokers, I use cherry wood here, but use what you have. If you are cooking sous vide, get the water to 130°F and vacuum seal the goose breasts.
- 2. Cook the goose, skin side up (whether or not the skin is still there) until the interior hits 120°F to 130°F. I use a probe thermometer to determine this. If you are using sous vide, this will take about 2 hours or so. It takes about the same time in a smoker, depending on weather and temperature of the smoker.
- 3. When you are ready to sear, get some oil, duck fat or goose fat hot, almost smoking. Sear the skin side (again, whether the skin is still there or not) hard for about 3 minutes. I like to put a heavy weight, like a bacon press or a small cast iron pan, on the meat to keep it flat.
- 4. Remove the goose breast, set it skin side up on a cutting board to rest, and grind black pepper over it. Sprinkle some rosemary on it, too. Slice very thin and serve.
