#### YESTERDAY

The newly formed Tulsa Garden Club, founded October 6, 1929, announced in March 1930, that persons interested in home gardening could apply to join. The application required signatures of two present Members of the Club and a \$2 entry fee.

An invitation was given to amateur horticulturists who raised their own flowers in Tulsa/vicinity to enter a flower show. "Hilltop" house, President Maud Mason's country home, became the venue for our first three flower shows. Visitors were invited to stay until dark



while enjoying the flower show and touring Mrs. Mason's gardens. Members hosted an outdoor picnic luncheon for new Members prior to public entry.

FIRST FLOWER SHOW April 30, 1930 The garage of Hilltop house held the

The garage of Hilltop house held the exhibits. Also on display were florals designed by Mrs. Edwina Henry of Henry's Hot House "on the Jenks road" and Mrs. Josephine DeHaven of Mrs. DeHaven's Flower Shop.

Nearly 400 visitors attended. The 23 charter Members hosted 35 new Members. New names were handed in for membership.

**SECOND FLOWER SHOW May 13, 1931** A large tent was placed on the grounds of Hilltop house for the flower show competition. The Club had 160 members by then! Cash prizes ranging from \$1 to \$5 were awarded to winners. Exhibitors were asked to bring their own one-half pint, one pint, and quart milk bottles for horticulture displays. More than 1,000 persons attended.

**THIRD FLOWER SHOW May 11, 1932** As the Tulsa Garden Club grew, so did the numbers of flower show exhibits. Hilltop house amazingly accommodated 3,000 visitors. "Streams of motor cars poured through the gates of the beautiful grounds located on Lewis road southeast of the city." President Mrs. Spillers and State President Mrs. Mason awarded ribbons as prizes. Subsequent flower shows moved to the livestock building at the fairgrounds.

# **Gardening for Birds**

#### The Dark-eyed Junco

Seven years ago I finally paid attention to Dark-eyed Juncos. Nicknamed "Snowbirds," juncos are some of the most commonly seen birds in Oklahoma during winter.

There are six color variations of Dark -eyed Juncos depending on their geographic range. Ours in eastern Oklahoma is the Slate-Colored Junco. It is a beautiful dark grey bird with a white belly and white outer tail feathers.

Each variety has the white flash of tail feathers. Look hard for the Slate-Colored Junco in the photo. Its tail gives it away.

What caught my attention in 2017 were the pure white tail feathers on one charcoal-grey bird. As I watched, the ground seemed to come alive with similar birds foraging under my backyard

trees. It had been easy to notice sparrows,

doves, bluejays, and cardinals, but not until I spotted this one unusual white tail did I focus on the junco and its small flock. Typically juncos have white OUTER tail feathers but the one hopping beneath my bird feeder had a solid white tail (really!).

I have not since seen a junco with predominately white tail feathers like I did that year. As I kept record of when the humming birds migrated, I discovered that juncos appeared soon after. (This year I first spotted juncos in my backyard on October 25, 2023.)

Juncos return to the same areas each winter and are seen in Oklahoma between October and April. Each spring they retreat northward to breed and build nests. Had it not been for that amazing stark white tail, I would not be watching for this little backyard bird friend each year.
