As we hear over and over again in so many of the post-Resurrection stories, in word and in imagery, Our Lord and Our God is constantly reaching out to us, going in search when we have wandered, seeking us out to give us back our sense of direction when we have strayed off the right path. In other words, the recurring images are just about the opposite of what we had feared -- that God was keeping some kind of ledger and we were all in big trouble! Nothing could be farther from the truth!

It is valuable to take some time, during this Easter season -- but any time, and consider what is my operational image of God in my life? How do I imagine Jesus looks upon me? So often we get caught up in an image from when we were young children. We have grown up in so many ways, yet often we leave our image of God stuck back in our childhood. And that image is often less than positive. As we listen to all of these stories, after Jesus had been raised, and reflect upon them in our minds and hearts, we will always be led to the forgiving, loving, kind, concerned Lord who only wants what is best for us. He is always stretching out his hand to hold us and protect us. As we hear at the end of today's brief Gospel passages, "No one can take them out of the Father's hand."

This week, no matter what you have feared about your past failures, your sins, your bad attitudes, try only considering the positive: that ALL your sins are forgiven; that God loves you just the way you are; God only wants what is best for you.

In that same spirit, Happy Mother's Day to all those who have been our mother and all those who have nurtured us throughout our lives. In fact, it might do us all well to replace the image of "God our Father" with "God our Mother." Since God is way beyond our limitations, no reason not to consider the mother side of God. In that, we might find ourselves more comfortable with a kind, loving, nurturing, caring God. Happy Mother's Day!

Children who made their First Communion on Saturday, May 7 are welcome to wear their Communion finery to Mass.

Help for Ukraine

Greeting some 30,000 pilgrims in St. Peter's Square on Sunday, May 1, Pope Francis said: "Today, we begin the month dedicated to the Mother of God. I would like to invite the faithful and all communities to pray the rosary every day during the month of May for peace."

He told them, "My thoughts go immediately to the city of Mariupol, the city of Mary, that has been barbarically bombed and destroyed." When Russian President Putin ordered the invasion of Ukraine on Feb. 24, Mariupol had a

population of over 400,000 people. While three-quarters of the population managed to flee, 100,000 remained and are surviving underground in what is now an almost totally devastated city after daily bombing by Russian forces.

St. Ignatius Update

This past week, as required in church law, I asked both the Parish Pastoral Council and the Parish Finance Council for their approval to sign-off on the sale of the school portion of the St. Ignatius campus. This was only for the portion of the St. Ignatius campus that is the various school and school-related buildings. It does not involve the portion of the campus that is the church and rectory. Because we “inherited” the St. Ignatius campus when the parish was closed, the sale of that property requires the agreement of the parish leadership -- in this case, us. The offer was presented to the Archdiocesan Board of Consultors which the Archbishop is required to check in with for any property sale in the Archdiocese.

Once the Board of Consultors approves, the sale is free to go forward. After this process is completed, I will let you know the next steps.

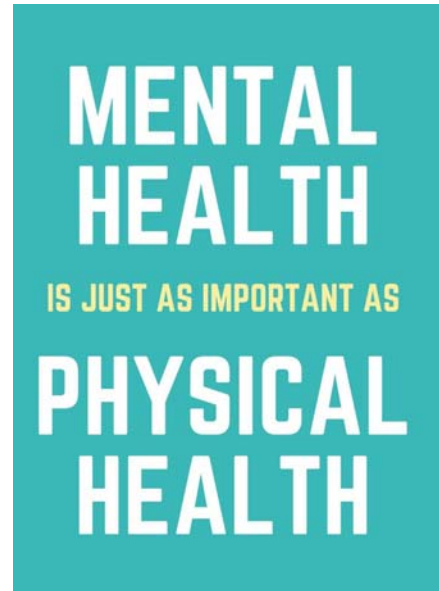

May Is Mental Health Awareness Month

We have entered into the “busy” time of the year! May has so many special celebrations - Mother’s Day, First Communion, graduations, weddings, etc. These are celebrations of gratitude and thanksgiving.

For some people, these “extra” celebrations also cause extra anxiety when they already have so much on their plates. There is a need for all of us to be aware that we may feel over-burdened and undone by trying to balance a few more items into already over-scheduled lives. It is vitally important for each of us to take our “mental health temperature” on a regular basis.

The arrival and duration of the COVID pandemic has caused an enormous increase in cases of depression and other mental health challenges. For many, being isolated only got worse during the highly contagious time of the virus. And for everyone, grappling with the uncomfortable, daily sensation that we were no longer in control of our own lives was extremely unsettling.

We are also, possibly, at the end of the pandemic phase of the COVID virus. But that simply means we have entered the endemic phase -- and we are going to have to adjust to the virus being around for a long time -- even if not as threatening as when the virus was causing so much sickness and death.

On top of those issues, is that nearly everyone had to find a way to deal with is that so many people also were either sick themselves from the virus or had close friends and relatives that got sick. Many lost important and significant people in their lives to the virus. Now, the added awareness of the horrible situation in Ukraine has become a constant in our lives. Taken together, this may well be an unprecedented level of burden upon our mental health. And each of us needs loving and caring support to re-establish we are not alone and that we are cared for.

If you or someone you know has been adversely affected and still hurting from these various situations, please consider consulting with a mental health professional. Visiting a counselor may be a good option for many. In some cases, medication may help to lift you out of your depression or other ailment.

Friends from Swedish Hospital called in March -- medical supplies for a field clinic in Ukraine were desperately needed. Could the Lending Closet help? Serving internally displaced refugees, the clinic needed basic items. The Lending Closet sent 12 boxes of donated first aid supplies (gauze bandages, alcohol wipes, aspirin, etc...), delivered directly by a Chicago

delegation to the Ukrainian clinic that week.

Closer to home, a grateful mother stopped by to donate durable medical equipment, including "the Hog", pictured above. A folding Hemi Walker, the Hog, supported her 26 year-old son during his recovery from a motorcycle accident. The mother said she'd spent hours in prayer at her son's bedside. The Hog, no doubt, has been amply blessed for whoever needs it next!
