Palm Sunday

This weekend, with the Feast of Palm (Passion) Sunday, we enter into our “High Holy Days.” This Holy Week contains so many celebrations of the foundation of our faith: the Passion and Death of the Lord; the example of service; the gift of the Lord’s Body and Blood in the Eucharist; the agony of the crucifixion; the fountain of salvation -- the water and wine - the baptism and Eucharist - that flowed from the pierced side of Jesus; the silence and despair of the tomb; finally - the unexpected announcement of the Resurrection of the Lord!

Some believers take this week off from their regular jobs to spend it in a retreat, praying over and cherishing the gift of our salvation through the

events of this week. But even if we can't do that, we can participate in these sacred events by attending the services on Holy Thursday, Good Friday, Holy Saturday, and Easter Sunday.

I encourage you to take as much time as you possibly can to spend it in quiet with the Lord in any way you can do that; and to participate in as many of these primary celebrations as you are able.

Palm Sunday Blessing & Procession

This Sunday is Palm Sunday. Weather-permitting, all the Masses will have the Blessing of Palms in the courtyard between the church and the Ministry Center. At the Saturday 5:00 pm and the Sunday 8:00 am Masses, immediately following the blessing, we will process out of the courtyard and into the church through the front doors.

At the 10:30 am (combined) Mass, we will bless palms and then process around the block (weather-permitting) and then into church through the front doors.

Holy Week Schedule/COVID Protocols

This year's COVID protocols are much less restrictive than the past two years, so much so, that overall the services of Holy Week are pretty much back to normal with a few exceptions listed below.

Holy Thursday, April 14

- No morning Mass
- 7:30 pm - Mass of the Lord's Supper (live-streamed)
- Church will remain open until 10:00 pm for private adoration.
- ***Pandemic protocols:*** The most evident restriction is the limited washing of feet. This year, we will have the candidates for entrance into the Catholic Church at the Easter Vigil Mass (RCIA Catechumen

and Candidates) represent various groups of people that Pope Francis keeps reminding us are on the peripheries, and it is up to us to move them into the center of our church and our lives.

Good Friday, April 15

- No morning Mass
- The Rectory office is open from 8:30 am-2:00 pm.
- 3:00 pm - Stations of the Cross (***No Stations at 6:30 pm***)
- 7:30 pm - Service of the Lord's Passion (live-streamed)
- ***Pandemic protocols:*** The Good Friday Service will once again restrict the Veneration of the Cross to non-touching forms of veneration (e.g. a bow, a genuflection, a brief moment in silence before the cross).

Holy Saturday, April 16

- No morning Mass
- 11:00 am - Blessing of Easter baskets
- 7:30 pm - Easter Vigil Mass (live-streamed)
- ***Pandemic protocols:*** This year, everyone will once again receive a taper on their way into church. We will use the large crystal bowl for baptisms in front of the altar, instead of erecting the pool in the sanctuary.

Easter Sunday Masses

- 8:00 am
- 10:30 am in Church
- 10:30 am Gym Mass
- The Rectory office is closed.

- **Pandemic protocols:** Easter Sunday Masses should also pretty much look like pre-pandemic -- with the exception that Communion is still limited to reception in the hand (not on the tongue) and there will be no distribution of the Precious Blood.

The Rectory office is open from 8:30 am-2:00 pm on Good Friday, and closed on Easter Sunday and Easter Monday, April 18.

[Update on Repair, Renew, Refresh Projects](#)

With the arrival of milder weather, we will continue with or start projects to improve the parish buildings. Tuckpointing and masonry repairs, the final phase of the multi-year project to care for the exterior of the Ministry Center, should be finished in just a few weeks. The scaffolding will be taken down afterwards and that part of the campus will return to a more normal appearance.

Some of the roofing repairs on the church and rectory are scheduled to begin. These include removing some downspouts that have been the source of water getting inside parish buildings, affixing new gutters in other parts, and adding new roofing to sections of the buildings.

Here is the status of other projects funded by the *Renew, Repair, Refresh* campaign:

- We hope and expect the repairs/rebuilding of some of the outside stairs will get underway soon.
- The re-carpeting of church is also moving forward, albeit a little slower than we might have hoped.
- The handrails from the main floor of the church into the sanctuary have all been installed.
- And the *Fund for Catholic Education* at NCA for parish families with children attending NCA has been funded and all the school families have been made aware of that support possibility.

Married Couples Needed to Work with Engaged Couples

As part of our marriage preparation program, St. Gertrude offers a parish-based PreCana classes, as well as the premarital inventory tool, FOCCUS. The FOCCUS tool measures the level of agreement between the engaged couple in about 11 different areas they will encounter in their married life. Couples fill out this questionnaire through a link provided by a facilitator couple and each party answers a series of questions online. The two sets of responses are then matched and scored, then a print-out of the level of agreement/disagreement between the bride and groom is shared. The facilitator couple, who has been trained in how to read the results, then meets with the engaged couple to discuss the results.

Right now, we have only one couple doing this important ministry, and we are hoping to get one or two more couples involved to share the load. As is true with PreCana, the facilitator couple should be married for at least a few

years, with or without children. Experience as a married couple is a prerequisite, but couples of any age are welcome.

Growing in Faith

The Kingdom of God is in the Palms of Our Hands

Palm Sunday isn't usually thought about in terms of the Kingdom of God. But we cannot read the (very long) Scripture passages today without

recognizing that the Kingdom of God was Jesus' big idea, the one he was willing to die for, the new way of being that he proclaimed to his followers (i.e., us) had "already begun" and "is already within us."

In today's readings, the people proclaim: "Blessed is the king who comes in the name of the Lord." There is only one king who fits that description, and he is right in front of them (and us) today. He comes as a leader, not as a ruler.

Jesus says, "I am among you as the one who serves...and I confer a kingdom on you, just as my Father has conferred one on me, that you may eat and drink at my table in my kingdom." In fact, when Jesus taught us to pray, the first thing he told us to pray for was that "thy kingdom come...on Earth as it is in Heaven."

So, we leave here to today, with our palms in our hands, looking forward to Holy Week and then Easter. But what we need to think about are the days when we will be like Joseph of Arimathea, a "virtuous and righteous" human being who was "awaiting the kingdom of God."

That is the mission we are all sent to help bring about...on Earth, as it already is in Heaven.

St. Gertrude Composting Program - List of Do's and Don'ts

With the arrival of spring, it's time to start thinking about our parish compost and garden projects. This year, we are going to use a compost tumbler. It's user-friendly and will produce compost at a quicker pace. I highly suggest going to www.mantis.com for more information and watch a short video demonstration. Additionally, our *Composting Do's and Don'ts* list has been updated and is outlined below.

A Zoom discussion was held last weekend on how to use the new compost tumbler and what can and cannot go into it. It was recorded and available for anyone who would still like to be a part of the program!

We plan to get the garden ready for planting in early June, I'll share details about that in later bulletins.

Compost Bucket Do's and Don'ts

DO's:

Collect in your buckets:

- **1/3 Brown:**
 - Leaves and dead-headed flowers
 - Shredded paper
 - SMALL sticks (This will not make heat.)
- **1/3 Green:**
 - Grass clippings
 - Leaves of vegetables like broccoli and cauliflower, parsley, herbs, and spices (This makes heat.)
- **1/3 Food:**
 - Vegetables and fruit (Chopped up into small parts.)
 - Egg shells (small pieces)
 - Coffee and tea grounds (Tea must be taken out of the tea bag.)

DON'TS

Please do not add these to your bucket:

- **Brown:**
 - Don't overuse this, break it up to only 1/3 of the bucket.
 - No plastic or labels on shredded paper. (Remove the labels first because they won't decompose.)
 - Break up shredded paper if it clumps together in your bucket. The materials must be able to breathe, and air must be able to circulate.
 - Do not include magazines or glossy paper.
- **Green:**
 - Grass clippings must be chemical free at the time of cutting.

- Do not include diseased plants of any kind.
 - **Food:**
 - No MEAT, BONES, FAT, SKIN, BUTTER, OLEO! These will attract animals.
 - No corn cobs
 - No plastics of any kind
 - No avocado pits or skins
 - No flour products, grains, or legumes
 - No nuts, seeds, and baked goods, or snacks
 - No paper towels, napkins, and tissues
 - No spoiled tofu/tempeh or spoiled tomato products
 - No old jelly jams or preserves
 - No organic house waste

Meet Members of the RCIA Group at St. Gertrude

Below is an introduction to two of our RCIA candidates, Marlena Siroki and Russell Gipe.

Marlena Siroki

Hi! I am Marlena Siroki. I am a 33-year-old Ohio native and I am an acupuncturist at REMIX Acupuncture + Integrative Health in the West Loop. My husband, Russ, and I moved to Chicago in 2014 so that I could complete my masters and doctorate in Acupuncture and East Asian medicine. After that, we chose to stay in Chicago and start our family here.

I have always felt a close connection with Catholicism since I come from a large family of Catholics. Both my grandparents were raised Catholic (Greek Orthodox and Roman Catholic) and my mother was raised in the Greek Orthodox Church. Because of these familial ties, I grew up with a lot of the traditions associated with Catholicism and our eastern European heritage, but never truly understood them or their importance. While I was baptized as Greek Orthodox Catholic as a young child, I didn't have the opportunity to pursue further sacraments or religious education. It was one of the many questions I had for my mother as a child. I wanted to understand our traditions, understand faith and my relationship with God.

Even though my family didn't attend church weekly or regularly, faith and God have always been a part of my life, in one way or another. As I became an adult, I realized I had a yearning to connect with it on a deeper level. I have grown to appreciate that my faith has always been present, but I just need more of it in my life. I simply didn't know how to make that happen until I stumbled upon the RCIA program.

What ultimately brought us to St. Gertrude and the RCIA program, was our son, Lucas. I have always known that I wanted Lucas to have a relationship with God. So it's important that he has a good foundation from the start. And when the time came, we chose to enroll him at NCA. It is through his growth and learning that inspires us, as a family, to grow in our faith too.

Russell Gipe

Hello! My name is Russell Gipe. I am originally from Virginia and moved to Chicago in 2014 for my wife to attend school. I am currently a massage therapist and teacher at The New School for Massage and Bodywork in River North.

I was raised in the United Methodist church and attended church every Sunday with my family growing up. I drifted away from my faith in my late teens and lost my way for quite a few years. It was not until my son was born that I felt a reawakening of my faith. This slowly grew in me, with the patient and understanding guidance of my wife. Becoming a father made me realize how important my relationship with God was and how I wanted my son to have a close relationship with God as well.

Our son, Lucas, attends NCA, which led us to St. Gertrude. As my faith has continued to grow, we decided that the RCIA program was the next step in our journey. Fostering and nurturing our faith as a family has been an incredible experience that will continue to grow as we do.

A Tax-Savvy Way to Support St. Gertrude Parish

We love because He first loved us. (1 John 4:19)

Jesus told us “whatever you do for the least of my brothers, you do for me.” Every day, we have the opportunity to be the face of Jesus to others. You can help to support our parish and cover our increased operating costs by making a qualified charitable distribution (“QCD”) gift from your individual retirement account.

A QCD gift (a.k.a. IRA charitable rollover) allows individuals age 70½ or older to authorize their IRA administrator to make a direct transfer of funds from their IRA to qualified charities, tax-free. This way of giving does not generate taxable income, which may lower your annual income level. If you are age 72 or older, the amount you transfer may count towards your required minimum distribution.
