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# From Fr. Rich

#### **Lenten Reconciliation Service**

Everyone is invited to join in the Parish Lenten Reconciliation Service this Sunday, April 3 at 1:00 pm in church. This is a reflective service, offering music, scripture, and a guided reflection/examination of conscience and

then absolution. This service is under an hour and a great time for some quiet reflection in this Lenten season.

#### The Fifth Sunday of Lent

In today's First Reading from the prophet Isaiah, we hear that extraordinary and comforting message from the prophet, "Remember not the events of the past, the things of long ago consider not; see, I am doing something new! Now it springs forth, do you not perceive it?"

It is a message of enormous consolation as we move into the final days of this Lenten season, in what we once called Passion Week (the fifth week in Lent).

And if we were wondering what this change, this time of transition is, we experience it fully in the Gospel passage of the woman caught in adultery. Not so different than what we might still experience today, with a select group of male religious leaders bringing forth a woman already determined as guilty for a sexual sin (somehow always considered far more serious than their bigotry, misogyny, and small-mindedness) and somehow having committed this sin with some man who remains unnamed, uncharged, and NOT brought before Jesus. And all of this in order to trap Jesus so they could remove him from their midst because they were tired of his challenges to their established authority. But outfoxing them once again, Jesus simply redirects their focus to, "Let the one among you who is without sin be the first to throw a stone at her."

In this single incident, with a dynamic we have seen countless times in the Gospels, Jesus drives home the point that in God's eyes we are all sinners, all loved by God, and all equal in stature.

In this final, full week of Lent, let us pause to consider how we think of and

treat other human beings. Let us especially think of those on the peripheries, those who belong to minorities, or who in any way are deemed by ourselves and our society as worthless, powerless in the way we measure -- in wealth and prominence, fame, and production. If Jesus were sitting with us today, which people would he be recognizing, calling forth to be treated with honor, respect, and dignity? And then let us tend to our own "homework" of making such a culture our lived reality.

### Palm Sunday - April 9-10

Next weekend is Palm Sunday. Weather-permitting, all the Masses will all have the Blessing of Palms in the courtyard between the church and the Ministry Center. At the Saturday 5:00 pm and the Sunday 8:00 am Masses, immediately following the blessing, we will process out of the courtyard and into the church through the front doors.

At the 10:30 am (Combined) Mass, we will bless palms and then process around the block (weather-permitting) and then into church through the front doors.

#### Holy Week Schedule/COVID Protocols

Next week, we begin the celebration of Holy Week as we gather for the Blessing of Palms. This year's COVID protocols are much less restrictive than the past two years, so much so, that overall the services of Holy Week are pretty much back to normal with a few exceptions listed below.

### Holy Thursday, April 14

- No morning Mass
- 7:30 pm Mass of the Lord's Supper (live-streamed)
- Church will remain open until 10:00 pm for private adoration.
- The Mass of the Lord's Supper will have some of the pandemic restrictions. The most evident is the limited washing of feet. This year,

we will have the candidates for entrance into the Catholic Church at the Easter Vigil Mass (RCIA Catechumen and Candidates) represent various groups of people that Pope Francis keeps reminding us are on the peripheries, and it is up to us to move them into the center of our church and our lives. The procession of the Blessed Sacrament at the end of Mass returns to its usual format this year.

#### Good Friday, April 15

- No morning Mass
- 3:00 pm Stations of the Cross (No Stations at 6:30 pm)
- 7:30 pm Passion of the Lord's Supper (live-streamed)
- The Rectory office is closed.
- The Good Friday Service of the Lord's Passion once again will restrict
  Veneration of the Cross to only non-touching forms of veneration (e.g.
  a bow, a genuflection, a brief moment in silence before the cross). The
  rest of this service should be pretty much as it usually was before the
  pandemic.

#### Holy Saturday, April 16

- No morning Mass
- 11:00 am Blessing of Easter baskets
- 7:30 pm Easter Vigil Mass (live-streamed)
- Holy Saturday Easter Vigil Mass -- this year everyone will once again receive a taper on their way into church, which will be lit from the newly lighted Paschal Candle, while the Exsultet is sung. We will use the large crystal bowl for baptisms in front of the altar, instead of erecting the pool in the sanctuary. The rest of the Easter Vigil should look pretty much as it did pre-pandemic.

#### **Easter Sunday Masses**

- 8:00 am
- 10:30 am in church
- 10:30 am Gym Mass
- Easter Sunday Masses should also pretty much look like prepandemic -- with the exception that Communion is still limited to reception in the hand (not on the tongue) and there will be no distribution of the Precious Blood.

The Rectory office is closed on Good Friday, April 15 and Easter Monday, April 18.

Growing in Faith
Rejoicing on the Way

Last Sunday (March 27) was the 4th Sunday of Lent and Laetare Sunday. Laetare means "rejoice," a time to be filled with hope, for Easter is now within sight. But it's hard to rejoice when many suffer from the horrors of war. We've come through two years of pandemic, with grievous losses for some, and we don't know what lies ahead. We stand on a threshold, that liminal in-between time that invites transformation and growth while

requiring acceptance of a wobbly present.

In this Sunday's first reading, Isaiah tells us to "Remember not the events of the past" and promises "something new...water in the desert." Paul, in the second reading, has "accepted the loss of all things" that he may be found in Christ, "depending on faith to know Christ and the power of his resurrection."

Both readings show us that the threshold we experience today is not something new. Isaiah wrote in anticipation of the coming of Christ, which is now our "already," the "something new" that begins our salvation. Paul speaks of our "not yet," the fullness of faith which will "somehow. . .attain the resurrection from the dead." From their points of view wars and pandemics are only bleeps on the long Christian journey. Our shared pilgrimage takes place on a threshold where we teeter together, taking deep breaths, between the already of Jesus' birth and the not yet of Christ's return.

# **Composting Program**

Dear St. Gertrude Compost and Garden Team,

With the promise of warmer temperatures this week, it is time to start thinking about spring and our parish compost and garden projects. I think we had a great year last year and am hoping that many or most of you will return to be involved again this year.

We have some new changes with our compost program this spring. Last year, we had many people drop off their compostable goods; so many in fact that it required a huge labor-intensive effort to move the material from one bin to another bin to speed along the breakdown process. And while Grace and Paul were very helpful in getting us started, they both work full time jobs and manage their own composting project at St. Gregory, so they were often not available.


So, I have decided to go with a different system that is more user friendly and will produce compost at quicker pace. We have purchased a compost tumbler that is actually a large steel drum on its own stand that is totally self-contained with a removable door (for loading and unloading of compost materials), air vents and drainage units, and a gear driven spin handle. Simply spin the handle five times before loading your material, and five times afterwards and you are done! This unit is also impermeable for city wildlife to enter which is very important since we are close to an alley. I highly suggest going to <a href="https://www.mantis.com">www.mantis.com</a> for more information and watch a short video demonstration.

Because of this new system and the fact that we need to make a few revisions to our Do's and Don't's lists, I think it might be wise to set up a

Zoom meeting with our group so I can better inform you of the coming changes and answer any of your questions. This will probably be on a Saturday morning in the near future. We hope to get this system up and running by mid-April.

There will be no Stations of the Cross at 6:30 pm on Good Friday, April 15.
