It is under this title our nation is placed under Mary's protection.

### **Second Sunday of Advent**

Sometimes some people reduce the message of Jesus Christ to some variation of, "Everyone be nice." Which might be a good starting point, but, today's readings provide us with a stark reminder, He was actually preaching a complete reversal in how we look at the world, what power is in our world, and what our responsibilities and challenges are. God is not only always making something new, God is also fully supporting the reversal of the power structure so that those who have no power, those who are weak, those who are suffering, etc., will finally be treated with love and concern

and compassion.

In today's gospel passage, John the Baptist makes his appearance, announcing the fulfillment of the prophecies of Isaiah. In his preaching, the crooked ways are to be made straight, valleys filled in and mountains levelled, the rough places made smooth. "And all flesh shall see the salvation of God." In order to begin to grasp the enormity of John's message, we have to remember the mindset of the times. It was assumed that those in power were there because God favored them. It was a clever and devilish way of maintaining the established order -- keeping those in power seated upon their thrones, and those with nothing still being powerless with nothing.

It is fair to say "Hmm. Not much has changed!" Which is part of why we journey through Advent every year. We do this to remind ourselves what we are preparing for in the coming of the Lord. Being nice is barely the tip of the iceberg! Our Heavenly Father sent His Son for no less a reason than rearranging the established order.

Recently, I was talking to a college student and he remarked that one of the things he was working on was his own awareness of his privilege as a white, well-educated, middle-class American. As he looked at many situations in the world, he wondered what he could do to reduce the inequality. I think this young man is just one of the reasons those in positions of power and privilege are terrified of the "woke" culture! This young man, and others like him, are pointing the way. We cannot keep consuming at the level we have been and expect there to be no repercussions to our planet. And now we know that unless we stop, we will kill our planet and kill ourselves! Did we really think the Creator of All would not call us to be better stewards of the planet and each other?

The Second Sunday of Advent proclaims the never-out-of-date announcement of John the Baptist. And it requires of each of us to ask ourselves how we are going to work WITH the Lord to help this reversal of fortunes take place in our time and place. Maybe being nice would be a good place to start! But it is far from where the Lord wants us to end up!

### The Feast of our Lady of Guadalupe - December 12

The Virgin of Guadalupe, like the shroud of Turin, appears on a piece of fabric. Both are sacred objects, hundreds of years old, and both depict an image said to be miraculous. The Virgin of Guadalupe was declared Queen of Mexico and is Patroness of the Americas.

### First apparition

Our Lady of Guadalupe first introduced herself as the Mother of God and the mother of all humanity when she appeared on the hill of Tepeyac in Mexico in 1531. An indigenous peasant, Juan Diego, saw a glowing figure on the hill. After she had identified herself to him, Our Lady asked that Juan build her a shrine in that same spot, in order for her to show and share her love and compassion with all those who believe.

Afterwards, Juan Diego visited Juan de Zumárraga, who was Archbishop of what is now Mexico City. Zumárraga dismissed him in disbelief and asked that the future Saint provide proof of his story and proof of the Lady's

identity.

Juan Diego returned to the hill and encountered Our Lady again. The Virgin told him to climb to the top of the hill and pick some flowers to present to the Archbishop.

### Winter bloom

Although it was winter and nothing should have been in bloom, Juan Diego found an abundance of flowers of a type he had never seen before. The Virgin bundled the flowers into Juan's cloak, known as a tilma. When Juan Diego presented the tilma of exotic flowers to Zumárraga, the flowers fell out and he recognised them as Castilian roses, which are not found in Mexico.

What was even more significant, however, was that the tilma had been miraculously imprinted with a colorful image of the Virgin herself.

### Tilma

This actual tilma, preserved since that date and showing the familiar image of the Virgin Mary with her head bowed and hands together in prayer, represents the Virgin of Guadalupe. It remains perhaps the most sacred object in all of Mexico.

The story is best known from a manuscript written in the Aztec's native language Nahuatl by the scholar Antonio Valeriano. It was written sometime after 1556.

Over 20 million people visit the Basilica of Our Lady of Guadalupe each year, now situated on the very same hill on which she appeared.

In 1990, Pope Saint John Paul II visited Mexico and beatified Juan Diego. 10 years later, in the year 2000, he was declared a Saint.

(Because the Feast of Our Lady of Guadalupe falls on a Sunday this year, the actual celebration moves to one day before or after the Sunday.)

In the story above taken from The Vatican News, we begin to see the amazing levels of challenge and support in the image of Our Lady of Guadalupe. Where until her appearance the Spanish conquerors considered the native peoples as subservient, primitive and undesirable, the Virgin appeared as one of those same native people! But she also produced, in winter, flowers native to the Spanish aristocracy! In the Virgin of Guadalupe, Mary's image unites these two unequal strains. Never again could the indigenous be dismissed as worthless or second class.

The other amazing part of the image is the sash Mary is wearing, indicating she is with child. The enormous significance of a pregnant Virgin was a great sign of hope! God was being born in a whole new way -- uniting the Spanish and indigenous cultures. It is no wonder the Church named her Patroness of the Americas! She is the mother of all peoples and all cultures.

## **Growing in Faith**

I know that the traditional month to honor Mary is May, but it seems to me that the season that focuses on the 'Miracle of Mary' is Advent. Look at all the special days set aside to honor her during this season, Immaculate Conception, Our Lady of Guadalupe, just to name two.

Because the feast of Our Lady of Guadalupe falls this year on the Third Sunday of Advent, those readings take precedent over the feast day readings. But last year, the psalm for her feast day was taken from the book of Judith, and the response was:

You are the highest honor of our race.

To me, that perfectly sums it up. Mary receives the highest honor of our race in bearing the child Jesus. And Mary also honors The Lord in the highest possible way, by saying YES to the honor, and to the obligation.

Mary was very important to my mother, who prayed the rosary every day. And I also have been inspired by Mary over my lifetime. When I was in a serious automobile accident 25 years ago and had a long recovery ahead of me, I was given great comfort in praying the Hail Mary throughout my days of fear and rehabilitation.

As we enter more fully into Advent and anticipate the birth of our Lord, let us remember Our Lady and call upon her example, her commitment, and her love when we need support.





# Help Needed with with our RCIA Ministry

Do you feel called to help others journey with the Catholic faith? Please consider being part of our RCIA Ministry!

The Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA) is a process by which adults learn more about the Catholic Church. Many people who begin RCIA are non-Catholics seeking to become Catholic or at least to explore whether Catholicism might be a good home. Those who complete the process and decide to become Catholic are initiated into the Church at the Easter Vigil Mass on Holy Saturday. Others who take RCIA are already Catholic but

want a deeper understanding of their faith foundation.

The RCIA process does not ask those who have been baptized in another faith to give up their denominational experiences. Rather, the RCIA process seeks to add new colors and designs to their existing faith life tapestry. In addition to attending Mass, the RCIA process includes weekly gatherings of breaking open the Word of God, sharing our stories, and learning about our faith traditions.

## Heart to Heart Monthly Report

In October, we assisted people from 14 Chicagoland zip codes who were recovering from surgery, families caring for family members with mobility issues and in need of extensive assistance with daily tasks (including bathing, toileting, and eating), and home health outreach workers (including OTs, PTs, social workers, and RNs).

We have provided a local homeless encampment with mobility equipment

for residents in need, a nursing home resident with personal care products she couldn't afford, Community Health (the largest volunteer-based health clinic in the nation) with nebulizers, CPAP breathing machines and masks, and a Cook County care coordinator with supplies for her outreach work. The vast majority of people we serve have limited resources and are often in need of equipment or supplies for extended periods of time.

Donations came in from people who live in eight different zip codes, most of whom have recently lost family members or close friends. Over and over again, we are told how much it means to surviving family members/friends that durable medical equipment and supplies that helped their loved ones can now be used by someone else in need. The generosity of people grieving the loss of a friend or family member is tremendously moving and greatly appreciated.

You will receive your Contribution Authorization Certificate (CAC) via email. Once you have your CAC, you are

ready to donate.

### 3. DONATE

Once you receive confirmation of your tax credit and your CAC from IDOR, you have up to 60 days to donate to the Scholarship Granting Organization of your choice.
