As we were so clearly reminded at the signing of the bill establishing the new national holiday of Juneteenth, we are a nation always imperfect, but struggling to live the vision of our founders that all people are created equal and enjoy certain rights simply because we have been created to be free.



As we celebrate this great anniversary, let us be grateful for all the vision of a free people calls us to be and also be aware of how we have come up short and continually need to be summoned to make that vision a reality for all people here in the United States and as a potential reality for other nations in the world. As many have already stated, "until all are free, none are free."

Our Phased Reopening Week 4

This weekend, we continue our reopening with some of the adult choir singing at the 10:30 am Mass. Last weekend, we resumed ushers taking up the collections, and singing! (*Reminder: Breaking Bread* books are now on the library carts at the front and side entrances of church. Please pick up a hymnal when you arrive and place it back on the cart as you are exiting church.)

Except for offering Communion under both kinds (hosts and wine), everything else has returned to normal. (And, as I mentioned before, it may be some time before Communion under both kinds resumes.)

I encourage everyone to be aware that the new COVID variants are causing

serious concern among the medical community. We all need to be aware that a return to wearing masks may soon be one of our safest practices once again.

Finally, this weekend we will begin making available some copies of the electronic newsletter/bulletin on the top shelves of the library carts which hold the *Breaking Bread* hymnals. It may take us a few weeks to determine how many copies will be printed each week. So if you are looking for a copy, and none are available, please notify me or any member of the parish staff so we can increase the number of copies in future weeks.

Water, Water, Everywhere

Like so many homes in the parish, the huge rains of last week brought water upon us and into the basements of each of our parish buildings. The worst-hit was the Social Hall basement. Because the fans need to keep running all week to prevent any mold or mildew, the summer day camp had to be moved.

The water in the other buildings was not as extensive and was able to be cleaned up quickly. At one point the rain was coming down so hard, and the wind was blowing so strong that water was actually coming into the church through the seals around some of the windows! Once the buildings have all dried out, we will be able to determine if we have any damage to plaster, etc. We certainly needed the rain -- maybe just not so much so quickly?!

St. Ignatius

On July 1, St. Ignatius Parish ended its long history. While the parish itself no longer exists, weekend Masses will continue until the final Mass on Saturday, July 31 - the Feast of St. Ignatius of Loyola. Bishop Bartosic will preside at the final liturgy. Please continue to keep the parishioners of St.

Ignatius in your prayers and welcome all those who are seeking a new parish home in the coming weeks.

As I mentioned in some previous columns, with the closing of St. Ignatius Parish, the boundaries of both St. Jerome and St. Gertrude have been extended to include the geographic boundaries of the former St. Ignatius. And the campus of St. Ignatius Parish is now part of St. Gertrude Parish. There may be some special masses/services in the coming months - especially services such as funerals. In the next twelve months, discussions will continue about the possibility of a Mission Center hosted jointly by St. Jerome and St. Gertrude Parishes. Last week, a meeting with Bishop Bartosic, representatives of St. Ignatius Parish, and Loyola University clarified that, at this time, the University will not be able to partner in this venture. What will happen to the campus of the former parish has yet to be determined.



Growing in Faith

"He was amazed at their lack of faith." Christ came home to preach and found resistance from people who "knew him". This resonates with me after what we've lived through—the isolation and unknowingness—of 15 months of Covid. The mysteries and stories, at the pandemic's beginning, changed

as the science of the disease slowly unfolded. We heard outrageous ways the disease could be spread, not unlike naysayers' stories told about Jesus in his day.

Many people saw Jesus as a powerful teacher and miracle worker, but the higher-ups got nervous that he'd take away their power and control. But Jesus wanted no earthly power. Instead, he preached truth, love, forgiveness, and care for the less fortunate. And to those who didn't want to hear that truth: "Isn't he the carpenter, the son of Mary?"

Dr. Fauci is neither Jesus nor Ezekiel, but he got caught up similarly, trying to tell us the truth about COVID-19. The powers above him didn't like the spotlight on him and tried to silence and discredit him. After all, he was, "just a doctor-scientist working for a government agency!"

Flashback 35 years, to when, as a gay man in the 1980s with friends dying of an unknown disease, I heard Dr. Fauci and other scientists speak the same truths about HIV/AIDS at a time when the government refused to even acknowledge its existence. That truth was ignored, and–like COVID—many, too many died unnecessarily and tragically. Like Ezekiel, Fauci was "sitting among scorpions." To some, today, getting vaccinated has become "political", instead of a solution to avoid a horrible and painful illness and/or death.

God reassures Ezekiel, and us, that hearing and believing in the truth is our path to God, to Life itself.
