Hymnals should be returned to the library carts after Mass.

Sometimes it Might be Better to not say Anything at all

Last week, the Catholic Bishops of the United States voted at their meeting to go forward in creating a document outlining how they propose to deal with Catholic public figures and politicians who do not toe the line on what the bishops have decided is the most pressing moral issue of the day -- access to abortion. The document has not yet been written. It is supposed to be done by their November meeting. And most commentators have already weighed in that it has come about at this time because of the second Catholic president, Joe Biden.

One can never know what another person's mind or heart is, but it is very difficult to consider this as anything other than the final straw breaking the camel's back. A majority of the members of the U.S. Bishop's Conference now seem to be right-wing politicians, fully embracing a right-wing national

party.

Many of those speaking in favor of this new document claim it is because they are so concerned that many Catholics -- especially young people -- are leaving the Church. But we already have the data from professional polling of why people are abandoning the Church: the way the Church treats women, the Church's obsession with anything related to sexual morality at the cost of every other moral issue, and the crisis of clergy sexual abuse of minors. Weaponizing Holy Communion will not address any of those issues and will only lead to more divisiveness in the Church and in our nation.



Growing in Faith

Imagine the tender compassion within which the double miracle of today's Gospel takes place! Was Jesus complaining because someone had touched his garment? Of course not! Jesus felt the Spirit of love move through him to a suffering woman who conveyed her belief in him with her touch. He wanted to see her and hear her story.

How precious is that sense of touch to all of us, now that pandemic restrictions have been lifted! Touch has power, and loving touch has the power to heal.

So, too was the power of Jesus' touch as he took the hand of Jairus's seemingly lifeless daughter! He conveyed his Father's desire that the little girl would overcome death for the benefit not only of the girl and her parents but for all who doubted Jesus's power over death in the form of great compassion.

We, too, should not underestimate our power to heal and bring new life to those we touch and to those who seek our hands and our hugs. What miracles may take place by Jesus' Spirit within us!
