The Third Sunday of Lent

Today's Gospel story of the un-producing fig tree given another chance to bear fruit is a not so subtle reminder to each of us that we should not give up -- because God is always giving us another chance to repent and follow His Word.

This Sunday, we begin the "Scrutinies". These are special rites for the women and men who have been meeting weekly to explore their faith and their movement into the Catholic Church on Holy Saturday.

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On the third, fourth, and fifth Sundays of Lent each year, we call these candidates and catechumens forward and invite them to reflect upon their past lives and commit themselves to repentance as they continue this spiritual journey to a new life. We celebrate these rites publicly in order for all of us, already baptized, confirmed Catholics, to reflect upon our own lives and how we have or have not lived up to the promises made at our own baptisms. And, like these searchers, we also are invited to reject whatever has been sinful in our lives, leading us away from the Lord. We ask God's help to cleanse us of our sins and follow the true path of Our Lord's gospel.

Lenten Reconciliation Service

Everyone is invited to join in the Parish Lenten Reconciliation Service on

Sunday, April 3 at 1:00 pm in church. This is a reflective service, offering music, scripture, and a guided reflection/examination of conscience and then absolution. This service is under an hour and a great time for some quiet reflection in this Lenten season.

The purpose of this Synod is not to produce documents, but to plant dreams, draw forth prophecies and visions, allow hope to flourish, inspire trust, bind up wounds, weave together relationships, awaken a dawn of hope, learn from one another, and create a bright resourcefulness that will enlighten minds, warm hearts, and give strength to our hands.

condense the responses into a paper to be submitted to the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops. The conference will collect the responses from all U.S. dioceses and use them to create a national report to be sent to the Vatican .



Growing in Faith

"Remove the sandals from your feet for the place you stand is holy ground." – Ex 3: 4-5

When I am telling her about an experience I've had, a friend will sometimes quietly say: "remove your sandals." She means to point out the holiness of simple moments like these and help me appreciate God's presence in everyday occurrences. Sadly, the sacredness rarely dawns on me until after the fact.

Fr. Greg Boyle, a Jesuit priest who works with gang members in LA, was talking about how church leaders are overly worried about people forgetting the Eucharist is sacred. He lamented that, since Jesus consecrated the bread and wine and shared it with friends, we have been trying to wrest the

cup from his hands and replace it with a chalice. In his words "Jesus isn't losing any sleep that we'll forget that the Eucharist is sacred. He's anxious that we might forget that it's ordinary." It sounds like his riff on the Ignatian principle that God is in all things.

As I type this, I can think of moments of connection with a loved one or a stranger. I realize now that those moments were sacred. I think of places and times in my past where I grew and changed, often accompanied by pain, loss or my own resistance. It dawns on me how holy that ground I stood on was.

Perhaps this Lent, I might focus on paying attention so I know when I need to be taking my sandals off.

Music This Sunday at the 10:30 am Mass in Church to Feature Chicago Composer Florence Price

This week, we are fortunate to hear two recently published spiritual arrangements by noted Chicago composer, Florence Price (1887-1953) at the 10:30 am Mass in Church.

Born in Little Rock, Arkansas, Florence was a child prodigy in music and quite accomplished on the piano, violin, and organ. She graduated from New England Conservatory with advanced studies in piano and organ and taught in Little Rock until racial tensions became too threatening to her family and precipitated a move to Chicago in the early 1920's.


It was in Chicago that Florence's musical career truly blossomed, and she became a recognized figure in the classical music world. Her award-winning Symphony No. 1 in E Minor garnered the attention of CSO conductor, Frederich Stock and was performed at the Century for World Progress Exhibition fair in Chicago in 1933. This was the first time a major American orchestra performed a work by an African-American woman.

Throughout her life, Florence remained active as a pianist, organist, private teacher, and composer. A prolific composer of over two hundred works, she worked tirelessly throughout her life to get her compositions published to no avail. In the past five years, though, there has been a renewed interest in publishing her works and many of her large works are now readily available and are being performed throughout the country.

Jennifer Dunne and I will perform two lovely spiritual arrangements for Violin and Piano at the 10:30 am Mass in Church. The prelude will be the haunting *Sometimes I Feel Like a Motherless Child* (six minutes) and our meditation piece will be an arrangement of *O Lord*.

The music will also be on our 10:30 am Facebook live-stream and featured on the home page of our parish website, <u>stgertrudechicago.org</u>, on Monday.

Anti-Racism Discussion Groups: Small prayer and discussion groups will be meeting in the morning and evenings using the book *The Spiritual Works of Racial Justice*, by Patrick Saint-Jean, S.J. The Scrutinies/Introduction to the RCIA Group at St. Gertrude

Over the next three weekends at one of the Sunday Masses, the RCIA group will undergo the Scrutinies, where they will be examined about their own desires to turn away from sin and embrace the gospel of Jesus. These Rites invite all of us "old Catholics" to do the same in our lives, as we share the common goal of being ready for the celebration of Easter. We are so pleased they are a part of St. Gertrude and ask that you keep them in your prayers during these final weeks of Lent.

Below is an introduction to one of our RCIA candidates, Iverson Moore.

A native of Northwest Indiana, I grew up there and on the South Side. I later lived overseas many years working for the government and multinational business. At one point this involved providing Chinese language services to the United Nations staff for the meetings with the Chinese Communists at Panmunjom, Korea.

When I retired a few years ago, I returned to Chicago to live near relatives, who were by then on the North side. Some of them were members of St. Gertrude's parish, and I sometimes attended services there. One granddaughter was a pupil at NCA.

My religious background is Episcopalian. A few years ago, I began to be concerned about some of that denomination's policies and teachings. About four years ago, I became interested in the apparitions of Our Lady at Fatima, Portugal. Eventually, this led to my praying the Fatima Rosary on a daily basis, as Our Lady requested of all Christians.

While praying the Rosary, I came to understand that I wanted to be a Christian, that is, a member of the church Jesus Christ founded while on earth —not one founded by a European king, as in the case of the Anglican/Episcopal denominations.

Once I came to this decision, the next step was to seek out RCIA to guide me in the next stop of my journey.



Why is the RCIA Dismissed?

After the homily, those participating in the RCIA, their sponsors, and members of the RCIA team are dismissed from mass to engage in reflective discussions that are meant to deepen the knowledge of God through connecting the scripture readings, the homily, and our lived experiences.

The RCIA has been gathering since September to learn about the faith and our sacred traditions in preparation for the sacraments of initiation that will take place at the Easter Vigil Mass on Holy Saturday night.
