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# From Fr. Rich

# The Fourth Sunday of Lent

Well into the heart of the Lenten season, in Sunday's scripture readings we hear three passages of the extraordinary things God has done and continues to do for God's people. Namely, reconciliation!

In the first reading, after having cared for the people wandering in the desert for 40 years, and satisfying their nutritional needs by providing manna, Sunday's reading marks the end of the wandering and, for the first time in 40 years, they no longer needed the manna, because their new land provides them with their food.

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In the second reading from St. Paul's letter to the Corinthians, St. Paul offers this succinct summation of the reconciliation God offers us through Christ Jesus.

And in the Gospel, the breath-taking story of what we have come to call The Prodigal Son. This parable makes it clear that God holds no grudges, God only wants us back in good relationship with God and always forgives all our sins, holding nothing against us.

I suspect we all have stories and memories of what we might call "partial reconciliations". By which I mean times when we have found our way to forgive or be forgiven for the wrongs done, but still lingering over those supposed reconciliations was the taint of a begrudging cooperation -- we say we forgive and we say we accept the other person's expression of forgiveness -- but still we treat them and ourselves differently. It actually means, that despite our spoken words, we haven't yet been able to embrace and truly accept and live that forgiveness.

But that is not how God forgives! God forgives and holds no grudges. God is not in heaven practicing the "silent treatment" which would let us know God is not at all happy with us. That is simply not God's way. As we see in the Gospel story, the father can barely contain the enthusiasm and joy that accompanies the return of the loved son who has done so much intentional damage to his father and their relationship. He holds on to none of that! Rather, he completely embraces (physically, but also emotionally) this now-returning son, without hesitation, returning him to his status as a loved son, refusing to re-hash any of the sins and betrayals and insults of the past.

We don't know what resurrection looks like in the world. We know his own disciples did not recognize the risen Lord. So perhaps we shouldn't be surprised that is equally true when it comes to the new life reconciliation brings. If it looks and smells and tastes and feels just like the way things used to be -- big, red "caution" flags should be waving in our faces! When we really practice reconciliation, it is not about what was, but about the new life that is just beginning.

This might be a good week to ask God to help us start letting go of the scars and the wounds and the hurts of yesterdays long gone. God has no desire that we wallow in guilt and shame and emotional self-abuse for what we

said or did in the past. Only that we recognize and acknowledge we were wrong, accept forgiveness and move into the new life of this moment.

### **Lenten Reconciliation Service**

Everyone is invited to join in the Parish Lenten Reconciliation Service next Sunday, April 3 at 1:00 pm in church. This is a reflective service, offering music, scripture, and a guided reflection/examination of conscience and then absolution. This service is under an hour and a great time for some quiet reflection in this Lenten season.

## **Holy Week**

It doesn't seem possible Palm Sunday is in three weeks -- ushering us into Holy Week, but it is! As I mentioned in an earlier column, the protocols of Holy Week this year are much less restrictive that the last two years during the pandemic. As things now stand, here's what we expect:

Palm Sunday Masses will all have the Blessing of Palms in the courtyard between the church and the Ministry Center (weather-permitting). At the Saturday 5:00 pm and the Sunday 8:00 am Masses, immediately following the blessing, we will process out of the courtyard and into the church through the front doors. At the 10:30 am (Combined) Mass, we will bless palms and then process around the block (weather-permitting) and then into church through the front doors.

Holy Thursday Mass of the Lord's Supper will still have some of the pandemic restrictions. The most evident is the limited washing of feet. This year, we will have the candidates for entrance into the Catholic Church at the Easter Vigil Mass (RCIA Catechumen and Candidates) represent various groups of people that Pope Francis keeps reminding us are on the peripheries, and it is up to us to move them into the center of our church and our lives. The procession of the Blessed Sacrament at the end of Mass

returns to its usual format this year.

Good Friday Service of the Lord's Passion once again will restrict Veneration of the Cross to only non-touching types of veneration (e.g. a bow, a genuflection, a brief moment in silence before the cross). The rest of this service should be pretty much as it usually has been before the pandemic.

Holy Saturday Easter Vigil Mass -- this year everyone will once again receive a taper on their way into church, which is lit from the newly lighted Paschal Candle, while the Exsultet is sung. We will use the large crystal bowl for baptisms in front of the altar, instead of erecting the pool in the sanctuary. The rest of the Easter Vigil should look pretty much as it did prepandemic.

**Easter Sunday** Masses should also pretty much look like pre-pandemic -- with the exception that Communion is still limited to reception in the hand (not on the tongue) and there will be no distribution of the Precious Blood. (Or, as one parishioner recently said to me, "I don't think we're ever going back to having the cup in church." And I suspect that may be true!)

As I have tried to caution before, we won't know any of this as certainty until we are closer to Holy Week. It is frightening that the number of COVID cases has increased in certain parts of the world -- but not yet here in the United States. And while I know we all hope that will be true, we will have to be prudent for our own health and safety and that of everyone with whom we come into contact.

**Growing in Faith** 

This week is the oh so familiar story of the Prodigal Son. Never one of my favorites, it has nothing new to say to me...until I encountered a poem which begins:

When he returned a second time, the straps of his sandals broken, his robe stained with wine, it was not as easy to forgive.

Yes, of course - there was second time, and maybe a third or fourth. It's not as easy to forgive a second time. It's not as easy to reject a second time either.

I find myself thinking about the older son in the parable. While the father seems to have the gift for forgiveness and no appetite for rejection, the older son has hardened his heart against his brother. Perhaps he could not help but do so. It's a challenge to love without limits. Yet to reject his brother means turning away from their loving father. That doesn't feel right either.

It's a challenge to reject without limits. This story suddenly feels familiar, not because it's oft-heard but because it's often lived.

Standing in the shoes of the older son, what's called for here? I'll start with prayer for a softening of my heart toward my brother and for understanding that reconciliation doesn't happen all at once. And I'll rely on hope that even though I'm still a long way off (from reconciliation, from forgiveness), my loving father will catch sight of me and come running.

# Thomas Dorsey Bio and the History of Precious Lord

For the past several weeks, we have been playing the soulful spiritual, *Precious Lord, Take my Hand* by Thomas Andrew Dorsey as our Lenten meditation piece. Thomas (1899-1993) was born in Georgia and grew up entrenched in the blues and jazz idioms of the day. A composer of hundreds of jazz and blues songs, it was gospel music that spoke to him on the deepest level.

In 1915, he moved to Chicago where he had a successful career as a jazz musician. After recovering from a severe illness in 1926 he became an active member of the Pilgrim Baptist Church in Chicago and served as the church's choir director for forty years.

Precious Lord was conceived at one of Dorsey's lowest moments when his wife, Nettie, died while giving birth to their first-born son. After he buried his wife and son, Thomas was overcome with grief and anger at God. "I didn't want to serve Him anymore or write gospel songs," he later recounted. One evening he went back to the piano and remembered an old melody from his boyhood by George Allen (1812-1877) with the text *Must Jesus Bear the Cross Alone*. He arranged this hymn with his inimitable style and added his own words, and this is how *Precious Lord* came to be. The tune eloquently captures the grief that not only Dorsey was experiencing but of anyone who has suffered a significant loss.

*Precious Lord* has been recorded numerous times by many famous artists including Elvis Presley, Mahalia Jackson, Roy Rogers, and Tennessee Ernie Ford. It was also a favorite of Martin Luther King Jr. and sung at the funeral of President Lyndon B. Johnson.




# Join the Bring Chicago Home Town Hall on Sunday, March 27 at 2:00 pm

# Coming This Spring—St. Gertrude Composting Program

Dear St. Gertrude Compost and Garden Team,

With the promise of warmer temperatures this week, it is time to start thinking about spring and our parish compost and garden projects. I think we had a great year last year and am hoping that many or most of you will return to be involved again this year.


We have some new changes with our compost program this spring. Last year, we had many people drop off their compostable goods; so many in fact that it required a huge labor-intensive effort to move the material from one bin to another bin to speed along the breakdown process. And while Grace and Paul were very helpful in getting us started, they both work full time jobs and manage their own composting project at St. Gregory, so they were often not available.

So, I have decided to go with a different system that is more user friendly and will produce compost at quicker pace. We have purchased a compost tumbler that is actually a large steel drum on its own stand that is totally self-contained with a removable door (for loading and unloading of compost materials), air vents and drainage units, and a gear driven spin handle. Simply spin the handle five times before loading your material, and five times afterwards and you are done! This unit is also impermeable for city wildlife to enter which is very important since we are close to an alley. I highly suggest going to <a href="https://www.mantis.com">www.mantis.com</a> for more information and watch a short video demonstration.

Because of this new system and the fact that we need to make a few revisions to our Do's and Don't's lists, I think it might be wise to set up a Zoom meeting with our group so I can better inform you of the coming changes and answer any of your questions. This will probably be on a Saturday morning in the near future. We hope to get this system up and running by mid-April.

# The Scrutinies/Introduction to the RCIA Group at St. Gertrude

Over the next two weekends at one of the Sunday Masses, the RCIA group will undergo the Scrutinies, where they will be examined about their own desires to turn away from sin and embrace the gospel of Jesus. These Rites invite all of us "old Catholics" to do the same in our lives, as we share the

common goal of being ready for the celebration of Easter. We are so pleased they are a part of St. Gertrude and ask that you keep them in your prayers during these final weeks of Lent.

Below is an introduction to one of our RCIA companions, Patricia Sullivan, who is helping guide the group's journey.

Hi, my name is Patricia Sullivan and I recently finished a Master of Arts in Pastoral Studies at the Catholic Theological Union in Chicago. My ministry focus is on incarceration, the criminal justice system and restorative justice. I am a lead volunteer at the Archdiocese of Chicago Kolbe House Jail Ministry, doing in jail service, as well as accompanying men released after incarceration. I am an active participant in the Catholic Prison Ministries Coalition and the Catholic Mobilizing Network organizations.

I joined St. Gertrude during COVID and feel privileged to be a companion on the RCIA journey this year. I am a Minister of Care in St. Gertrude's Heart to Heart Ministry, as well as a participant in the Peace and Justice Ministry. For me growing in faith is a lifelong process moving us to continual and constant development, advancing in spirituality, coming up against social justice issues, and taking action towards improving conditions in our society.



Why is the RCIA Dismissed?

After the homily, those participating in the RCIA, their sponsors, and members of the RCIA team are dismissed from mass to engage in reflective discussions that are meant to deepen the knowledge of God through connecting the scripture readings, the homily, and our lived experiences.

The RCIA has been gathering since September to learn about the faith and our sacred traditions in preparation for the sacraments of initiation that will take place at the Easter Vigil Mass on Holy Saturday night.
