And it is this interesting and challenging time we are living through that can

also give us a way to enter into these Holy Week services this year. I think it is fair to say that just as everything changed for Jesus and his disciples beginning with that Passover which was also His Last Supper and continued to open to unexpected experiences of arrest and trial and condemnation, with horrendous suffering and betrayal and abandonment, only to end in a gruesome death. And then all that came before was changed in an instant when God raised Jesus from death and ushered in the fullness of what only God's love could do. So now, in our very particular time and place, we are experiencing great unknowns and invited to trust in God's love, even though we cannot know the future.

The services of Holy Week capture all those dynamics for Christians. All the injustices exposed throughout the pandemic year, all the hatred and intolerance directed towards minorities and the powerless, all the unexpected moments of kindness and love and concern, all the exposure to violence and suffering and death. These are neither the far-away realities of a different time and place nor are they disconnected from Our Lord. Every human being of every age is directly connected to His last week and beyond.

As we enter this Holy Week, let us walk along with Our Lord, inviting His grace and companionship into this pandemic time as we eagerly await our own new life when this time of testing is over.

Easter Sunday - Noon Mass Just Added to the Schedule

This past weekend, considering the reservations we already have received for the Easter masses, and knowing we needed to add an additional mass to make room for everyone, we asked the parishioners in church if they preferred a 6:30 am sunrise Mass on Easter Sunday or a 12:00 pm Mass.

Overwhelmingly people voted for the noon Mass. So, our Easter schedule this year will be the Easter Vigil Mass on Holy Saturday at 7:30 pm, and on Easter Sunday Masses at 8:00 am, 10:30 am (this Mass will be livestreamed), and 12:00 pm.

If you are currently registered for an Easter Mass but would prefer to switch to the noon Mass, you are welcome to do so. You can go to <u>SignUpGenius</u>

and make the change there or call the Rectory at 773.764.3621 and our staff will make the change for you.

Growing in Faith

I can still remember the excitement of Palm Sundays in the 1950s when I was a child. That procession with everyone holding and waving palms as the whole parish processed and then entered our church was a thrill of emotional fervor that overtook me as an eight-year-old. It was the beginning of the most special and profound week of the liturgical year according to the sisters who taught us "religion" in our parish school.

My enthusiasm probably waned as the Gospel droned on in Latin while I tried to follow along with the English translation in my missal, if I even had one yet. Memories tend to blur after decades, though feelings can stay sharp.

I can recall well standing at Glenwood and Granville in the 1990s with my 8-year-old's hand in mine as we joined another Palm Sunday procession. I saw that same elation in my child's face as she squeezed my hand with a thrill of joy on her face. She was part of something BIG and she knew it!

Palm Sunday and Holy Week! What a time to "get caught up" in the joy, sorrow, and drama of our faith! May we catch Jesus' humility as we walk His Way this week!

Chicago Vaccine Angels Will Help Seniors and Essential Workers

Schedule a Vaccine

If you or a loved one aged 65 and over are having difficulty finding a vaccine, or have trouble using a computer to book one, a group called <u>Chicago Vaccine Angels</u> will help you. Started by an Evanston teen in February, the group has booked over 1,200 people for vaccines in the Chicago area for free.

The team is working on booking those people in PHASES 1A/1B ONLY - seniors and essential workers (without the chronic condition expansion just yet). Please fill out <u>this google form</u> for help.

Please note the following:

- The group will not re-book appointments that were made if you have significant schedule or location constraints, please ensure they are marked in the form!
- No vaccine hunter should ever ask for your Social Security number or money.
- You cannot request one vaccine brand over another.
- Due to the nature of the current pandemic, there is no assurance that they will be successful in booking your appointment.
- Your personal information shall be accessible only to the volunteers that are a part of the Chicago Vaccine Angels. Your personal data will not be sold. De-personalized data may be used by us to enhance the efficacy of this program.

How the Pandemic Will Affect Holy Week & Easter Services This Year

As you are probably already aware, the protocols for the services of Holy Week and Easter will have a significant effect this year. While we are in a better position than last year -- when we didn't have any services -- it will still seem different than what we have been used to.

First -- as is true for all services in church, everyone must make a reservation no less than one full day before the service you wish to attend. In some cases, you would be wise to make any reservation as far in advance as possible. The need for at least a day is to give the office staff time to prepare the various clipboards with the listings and maps that are filled out at every service. Please make a reservation here or phone the rectory office to make your reservations.

Second -- Because we are still limited to 15-20% of capacity for services, we may have to add an additional Mass if the other Easter Sunday Masses reach capacity, as we did at Christmas. Currently, we think the likely additional Mass for Easter, if there is one, would be at 12:00 pm.

What follows is a brief description of the changes in each of the services throughout Holy Week and Easter:

Palm Sunday: There are no Palm Sunday processions. All the Masses are to follow "Form Three" which means there are no processions and things should be kept very simple.

All the palms for the entire weekend will be blessed at the Saturday 5:00 pm Mass. Then palms will be available on the tables at the entrances/exits of church for all the masses. The scripture readings, including the reading of the Passion, will be done as usual. The 10:30 am Mass on Palm Sunday will be live-streamed.

Holy Thursday: There is no washing of hands/feet this year. There is no "formal" dressing of the altar -- it will be dressed before the Mass begins. After Communion, the procession to the Repository is very simple, with only the presider and a few adult servers going to the Repository.

Adoration will be available after Mass -- but only until 10:00 pm. There are to be no "pilgrimages" or the traditional visits to seven churches that many have done in the past. The 7:30 pm Mass of the Lord's Supper will be livestreamed.

Good Friday: Because Living Stations are not allowed, we will have the usual Stations of the Cross at 3:00 pm. Only an adult server with the processional cross will process. No members of the congregation are allowed to walk along with them. There is no Adoration of the Cross.

The Service of the Lord's Passion begins at 7:30 pm, as usual, with a short procession with the presider lying prostrate in the center aisle while the

congregation kneels in place. The scripture readings, including the reading of the Passion, will be done as usual. The Veneration of the Cross is only done 'en masse' -- that is, the presider holds the cross while all kneel for a few moments of silent veneration. There is NO individual veneration, no touching or kissing of the cross. The 7:30 pm Service of the Lord's Passion will be live-streamed.

Holy Saturday - Easter Vigil Mass: There is no lighting of the new fire at the front porch of church. The Paschal Candle is prepared and lit ahead of time and comes in a simple procession from the sacristy. The Preside intones, "This is the light of Christ" three times, then places the candle in its stand as the Exsultet is sung by the cantor. Scripture readings are done as usual.

The baptism and Rite of Welcoming for the RCIA candidates takes place as usual -- but with a large, glass bowl of water instead of a pool. There are no individual candles for members of the congregation. Baptismal promises will be renewed and the blessing of the congregation with the holy water will take place. After the Mass, there is no reception for the newly welcomed members. The 7:30 pm Easter Vigil Mass will be live-streamed.

Easter Sunday: The Masses on Easter Sunday will look pretty much as they usually do. But, as we have been doing since we reopened, there is no congregational singing, only singing by the cantor. There is the Renewal of Baptismal Promises and the sprinkling of the congregation with holy water. The 10:30 am Easter Sunday Mass will be live-streamed.
