Solemnity of the Ascension of the Lord

This weekend's Feast of the Ascension of the Lord fits in perfectly with the season of graduations many families are already celebrating. Just as we call graduations "commencements", so also this feast always points in two directions -- upwards where the Lord has now returned to heaven, and sideways as he freely hands over responsibility for spreading the good news to all of us. The Teacher (or Rabbi) has completed his lessons -- culminating in summing up everything he has spoken in words with the actual flesh and blood of his own life, now given freely for all of us. Part of the dynamics of this feast that have always fascinated me are the many ways in which the Lord places his complete trust in his followers! What a great act of love for us. He trusts us completely. And, of course, he will also send us his Spirit which will allow us to live as he has taught us.

As you consider your own children, whether your family members or those you have some responsibility for teaching, what are the most important things you want to be certain you have given them? And when you have done your best to pass on those truths, how can you let go and place them and their future in God's hands so that, guided by the Spirit, they may

Looking forward a few weeks

On Sunday, June 6 at the 10:30 am Mass, we have invited any interested parishioners of St. Ignatius to join us in prayer to get to know our parish. This is the second part of a “conversation” that began a few weeks ago when some parish members and I went to St. Ignatius and celebrated Mass with that community and then stayed after Mass for a conversation/Q&A session. Some of our parish volunteers may be reaching out for assistance in the hospitality we would like to offer after Mass. We are hoping for nice weather to be able to share hospitality outdoors right after the 10:30 am Mass. Please plan on joining us to welcome the St. Ignatius parishioners as they seek their new parish home.

Updated Protocols

As I mentioned last week in the announcements, Governor Pritzker announced the state is moving into the “Bridge Phase” on Friday, May 14. And, if the tracking numbers continue to be good, he hopes to move the state into Phase 5 on June 11. Phase 5 is an almost complete re-opening with certain protocols to remain in place for all our safety -- wearing masks, washing hands, maintaining distance -- especially when we are not certain if everyone has been vaccinated.

Because of this quick change happening, we are not going to change any of

our in-church protocols until then. We will be waiting to hear from the Governor, the Mayor, and then any clarifications from the officials at the Archdiocese. Hopefully, in about a month we may begin to return to a new normal.

I already know one thing when the protocols end, I am very much going to miss everyone coming to church and leaving church from the same door! It was great to be able to greet everyone either coming in or going out! While I am grateful we have lots of doors to make it easy for everyone, it was great during these past 14 months to see everyone at every Mass.



Growing in Faith

It could be a scene from a Monty Python movie. The resurrected Jesus has spent a month and a half with his disciples, and, now, it is time to go home. From their midst, he rises up into the clouds. But his followers keep looking intently at what is now an empty sky.

If it *were* a Monty Python comedy, the angels who show up would say

something like: “Hey, dummies, can’t you tell he’s gone? Get back to work!”

Since it isn’t a movie but a story told in the Acts of the Apostles and in Mark’s Gospel, the angels are gentler: “Men of Galilee, why are you standing there looking at the sky? This Jesus who has been taken up from you into heaven will return the same way you have seen him going into heaven.”

It’s one of the many moments in the New Testament when the followers of Jesus reveal themselves as pretty clueless. For 2,000 years, that sort of dopiness has been easy for Christians to relate to since we are all pretty dopey a lot of the time, needing a nudge or reminder or bolt of lightning to push us to do the right thing. We are all sinners, as Pope Francis says, and we’re all like those believers looking up at the empty sky.

In Mark’s gospel, the angels aren’t the ones who tell the disciples to get to work. Jesus did that just before the ascension: “Go into the whole world and proclaim the gospel to every creature.”

It’s not rocket science. Just go into the world and love everyone you come in contact with, just as Jesus did.

Composting Basics

What is compost?

Composting is the cultivation of organic waste into a nutrient-rich soil amendment. This is a natural process of decomposition that breaks down food waste into a fertile substance ideal for gardening. "Compost" can refer to the material at any stage of the process, either freshly deposited or ready to put in the garden.

Why is compost good for the environment?

50% of typical municipal garbage is in the form of food waste and decomposing food waste in landfills produces methane, a harmful greenhouse gas. Our Resurrection Compost will repurpose and recycle the waste for the benefit of others. Compost, as it processes, actually sequesters CO2. Not only does it lower our carbon footprint, but it also reduces the need for chemical fertilizers and encourages contact with the earth.

By keeping the lid on your compost, depositing weekly, and rinsing your empty bucket, there should be no noticeable smell or interested critters.

Why compost at St. Gertrude?

From the beginning, God made us as stewards of creation. By caring for creation through practices like composting, we honor that responsibility with gratitude for nature's wonder and abundance. Moreover, Pope Francis' encyclical *Laudato Sí – On Care for Our Common Home* urges Catholics to reject consumerism and waste and work together to develop sustainable practices for the sake of our planet and our sisters and brothers. Resurrection Compost Program is St. Gertrude's effort to answer these biblical and Church-wide appeals.

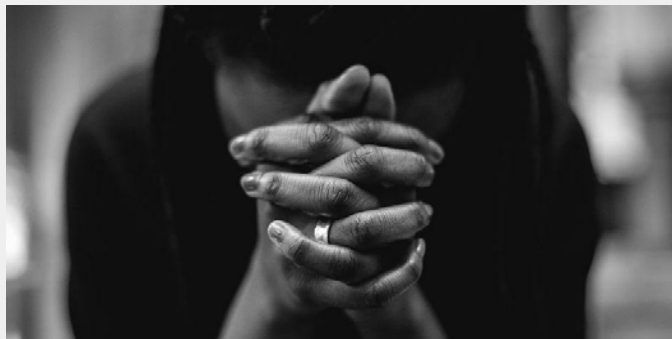
