## Anointing of the Sick

At all the Masses this weekend, we will celebrate the Anointing of the Sick. To help everyone self-determine if they would like to be anointed, below is a brief article explaining the "rules" for this sacrament.

According to the Roman ritual, anyone among the faithful "whose health is seriously impaired by sickness or old age" not only may, but should, receive

the sacrament. Some examples include:

- A person who is considered in danger of death.
- A person who has a serious disease or medical condition (e.g. cancer, heart disease, mental illness, diabetes). The sacrament may be repeated if the person's condition becomes more serious.
- A person preparing for surgery, if a serious illness is the reason for the surgery.
- An elderly person if they have become notably weakened by age, even if there is no particular serious illness present.
- A seriously sick child.

## Repair, Renew, Refresh Campaign

This is the final week of our *Repair, Renew, Refresh* campaign. Our goal was to raise \$100,000 to address some specific needs in our parish buildings and to establish an assistance fund for parishioners with children attending NCA. I am very happy to report that we have received over \$158,000!

These funds will enable us to continue the mission of St. Gertrude by

maintaining our buildings and supporting Catholic education. The muchneeded repairs include: Exterior repairs to the church and rectory roofs, and
internal repairs from water damage, installation of two handrails between
the main floor of church to the sanctuary, and two handrails from the lower
sanctuary level to the altar level to increase accessibility, re-carpeting the
church, rebuilding the deteriorated entrance stairs to the parish
hall/gym/classroom building and the stairs at the south (accessible)
entrance to the church.

Additionally, we will establish a Fund for Catholic Education for parish families with children attending NCA in need of financial help to enroll, as well as to have funds available for families in crisis due to health, employment, or other unexpected situations.

# Essay Contest for Students in 7th & 8th Grade



**Growing in Faith** 

"My heart is glad, and my soul rejoices." That's the message in Psalm 16, this weekend's responsorial, and, over the years, that's often been the spirit at this time of year when St. Gertrude parish has celebrated the feast of its saint on November 16.

This, though, is one of those years when the pain of life is more likely to prompt mourning rather than celebration. For new members of the parish who have come from St. Ignatius, there is sorrow at the loss of a spiritual home that nurtured neighborhood Catholics for more than a century.

And it's been a struggle for all members of the St. Gertrude parish, old and new, to find ways to get to know each other — ways to blend together in a new faith family — at a time when the COVID-19 pandemic keeps pushing us apart. Midway through this year, it was a joy to be able to come to Mass without wearing a mask. And then we had to mask-up once again.

The writers of the psalms were familiar with difficult times. So was our

patron, St. Gertrude the Great, a mystic and great theologian. She taught that the powerlessness we feel when events are out of our control is a source of joy rather than fear — joy because it helps us recognize that all we can do is to love. To love God and love each other. The rest will take care of itself.

Biography of our Patroness, St. Gertrude

St. Gertrude the Great, or St. Gertrude of Helfta, was born on January 6, 1256 in Germany. She eventually chose to follow the Lord by pursuing a vocation as a Benedictine Nun. Her deep relationship with the Lord in prayer led to her being hailed as a mystic. She was also regarded as a

great theologian.

Although little is known about Gertrude's childhood, it is widely accepted that at just four-years-old, she was enrolled in the Cistercian monastery school of Helfta in Saxony, under the governance of Abbess Gertrude of Hackerborn.

The Cistercian movement was an effort to bring the Benedictine religious community back to a stricter and more faithful adherence to the original "Rule" or way of life encouraged by St Benedict. Some sources speculate that Gertrude's parents offered their child as an oblate, a lay person especially dedicated to God or to God's service, while others believe she may have entered the monastery school as an orphan.

St. Mechtilde, the younger sister of the Abbess Gertrude, took care of young Gertrude. Gertrude and Mechtilde had a strong bond that only grew deeper with time, allowing Mechtilde to have a great influence over Gertrude.

Gertrude, known for being charming and able to win people over, entered the Benedictine Order at Helfta and became a nun. She devoted herself to her studies, and received an education in many different subjects. Gertrude was both fluent in Latin and very familiar with scripture and works from the Fathers of the Church, including Augustine.

In 1281, 25-year-old Gertrude experienced her first series of visions that would continue until the day she passed away. Her visions altered her life and she saw this moment as her new birth. Her priorities turned away from secular teachings and focuses more on studying Scripture and theology. Her life became full with this awakening and she was an enthusiastic student, writing for the spiritual benefit of others.

Gertrude once had a vision on the feast of John the Evangelist, described in Gertrude's writings. As she rested her head near Jesus' wound on his side, she could hear the beating of his heart. She asked St. John if he, too, felt the beating of Jesus' Divine Heart on the night of the Last Supper. He told her he was saving this revelation for a time when the world needed it to rekindle its love.

She went on to become one of the great mystics of the 13th century. Along with St. Mechtilde, she practiced what is known as "nuptial mysticism," seeing herself as the bride of Christ. She embraced charity for both rich and poor, she was a simple woman with a deep solidarity with those not yet ready for the beatific vision, who are still being purified in the state of repose known as purgatory.

Gertrude assisted at the deathbeds and mourned for the loss of both Abbess Gertrude of Hackeborn in 1291 and her dearly loved St. Mechtilde in 1298. Gertrude's health began to deteriorate, but she continued to only show her love for the Lord.

"Until the age of 25, I was a blind and insane woman... but you, Jesus, deigned to grant me the priceless familiarity of your friendship by opening to me in every way that most noble casket of your divinity, which is your divine Heart, and offering me in great abundance all your treasures contained in it".

On November 17, 1301, Gertrude passed away a virgin and joined her Bridegroom forever.

Throughout her life, Gertrude produced numerous writings, although only a

few still exists today. One of her longest surviving works is *Legatus Memorialis Abundantiae Divinae Pietatis (The Herald of Divine Love*). Her other standing works include, her collection of *Spiritual Exercises and Preces Gertrudianae (Gertrudian Prayers). The Herald of Divine Love* is composed of five different books. Book two is the core of the work, and was written solely by Gertrude. It is a notable piece of writing, because it includes detailed descriptions of Gertrude's visions and a veneration of Christ's heart. The other four books are believed to have been composed by other nuns.

Although Gertrude was never formally canonized, Rome approved a liturgical office of prayer and readings in her honor. To separate her from Abbess Gertrude of Hackeborn, Pope Benedict XIV gave her the title, "the Great," making her the only woman saint to be called, "the Great."

St. Gertrude the Great is the Patroness of the West Indies and she is often invoked for souls in purgatory. Her feast day is celebrated on November 16.

## Friday, November 12 is Vaccination Awareness Day

As <u>Pope Francis has said</u>, getting vaccinated is an act of love, but not just of self-love: "Love for oneself, love for our families and friends, and love for all peoples. Love is also social and political." Health is also a social and a political issue; our personal health decisions affect our friends, our families and our larger society—especially its most vulnerable members.

His comments make clear that vaccines are an integral part of our lived Christian faith. More than that, it is an obligation that we care not only for ourselves, but also for our sisters and brothers with whom we may come into contact at any time.

There are two groups, in particular, this week, upon whom we focus in the ongoing battle against the COVID virus and the need for vaccinations.

The first group is the children from ages five to 11 for whom there is now a

vaccine available. Last week, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) took the important step of approving the COVID-19 vaccine for children ages five to 11.

On Friday, November 12, all CPS schools will be closed to provide an opportunity for parents and guardians to take their children five years of age and older to get vaccinated at their pediatrician's office, at a healthcare provider, at a CPS school-based site, or community vaccination event

Vaccines are safe for children five years and older. Getting vaccinated against COVID-19 is the safest and most effective way to protect children and adults from the virus. The CDC has approved the vaccine for children five years of age and older based on clinical-trial data showing that the Pfizer shot is safe and effective at preventing symptomatic infection.

Children ages five to 11 years old will receive child-sized doses of the Pfizer vaccine, which is just a third of the amount of the adult vaccine. This will reduce the likelihood of side effects—such as sore arms, fever, or aches. The needle used to administer the vaccine to children is also much smaller.

The second group is our senior population. The Chicago Department of Public Health (CDPH) announced a number of initiatives aimed at encouraging even more Chicago seniors to get vaccinated against COVID-19. While vaccination rates in Chicago are steadily increasing, rates among seniors, especially those 70 and older, continue to lag.

The City is reaching out to individuals who received in-home vaccinations throughout the duration of the *Protect Chicago At Home* program to begin scheduling in-home appointments for booster doses, starting with homebound Chicagoans and seniors who received in-home vaccinations

earliest. To make an appointment for in-home vaccination, call (312) 746-4835 or register at Chicago.gov/AtHome.

Chicago Public Schools is offering clinics. They include:

- Make an appointment at a CPS Mobile Event.
- Make an appointment at a CPS School-Based Health Center.

Select children's hospitals will host pediatric vaccine events—check hospital websites for dates and more information.

The COVID-19 vaccine is free for all, and no proof of insurance or citizenship is required.

In addition to first doses, CDPH is also encouraging seniors to receive a

COVID-19 booster dose. All COVID-19 vaccinations, including booster doses are free, no insurance or government ID required.

The Refugee and Immigrant Ministry is hosting an online event on Thursday, November 18 at 7:00 pm featuring Kathy Kelly. Reflecting on an Afghan phrase, her talk is entitled, "Blood does not wash away: finding new ways forward as we seek to abolish war." The Zoom link is below.

For those who don't know of Kathy Kelly's work, she is a peace activist who has been nominated three times for the Nobel Peace Prize since 2000. In 1996, she helped to found Voices in the Wilderness, a group which bears

witness to the suffering which the U.S./U.N.-imposed sanctions have visited upon the people—especially the children—of Iraq. She has traveled to Afghanistan dozens of times and coordinates the Ban Killer Drones campaign, reminding us that it will be important to keep international focus on the people of Afghanistan.

# Catholic Campaign for Human Development: Working on the Margins


We all depend on workers in America's meat processing plants and animal-feeding operations, who are essential to the food supply chain. Many of them are immigrants facing language barriers that leave them at a disadvantage when they advocate for safe working conditions, just wages, and fair treatment from employers. The Rural Community Workers Alliance (RCWA) in Missouri helps these essential workers by advocating on their behalf for safe working conditions and by promoting gatherings to address racial divisions in the community as a way to help immigrants and nonimmigrants discover similarities and share their experiences.

The COVID-19 pandemic revealed working conditions at a pork-processing plant that placed workers at risk of infection due to shoulder-to-shoulder work areas and a lack of protective gear. Workers brought their concerns to

RCWA and ultimately filed a lawsuit demanding that the company follow health and safety guidelines established by the federal government. Even before the court ruled on the lawsuit, the company took action to protect workers by installing protective barriers, sanitizing stations, providing masks, and conducting temperature checks. When you support CCHD's mission of working on the margins, you help groups such as RCWA advocate for the health and safety of the essential workers that we all depend upon.






### Care for Real Needs Volunteers
