If a ministry or volunteer activity requires training, we will provide the training; if it requires a background check and the Virtus training for the

safety of all children or vulnerable adults, we will help walk you through the process.

Some ministries or volunteer opportunities are recurring -- e.g. being a Lector or Minister of Communion might mean being scheduled to assist at one of the weekend Masses once or twice a month; and some activities have more and some have less frequencies in their usual schedules. Please give it some thought! Other ministries -- such as praying for the sick and homebound -- you can do on your own schedule at your preferred location.

Special places of need this year include the three **Parish Advisory Boards**: the **Parish Pastoral Council (PPC)**, the **Parish Finance Council**, and the **Parish Development Council**, as well as the newly-forming **Social Justice Committee**.

Please consider your own talents and how they might of be service to the broader parish community.

## Repair, Renew, Refresh

This is week 3 of our *Repair, Renew, Refresh* campaign to raise \$100,000 to supplement a recent gift from Ray Simon and the Polk Bros. Foundation. As of Wednesday, September 29, we have received \$23,613.00. With these funds, we hope to be able to address five needs in the parish:

1. Exterior repairs to the church and rectory **roofs** from some long-term damage, and the damage from February's severe snowstorm. This includes repairing and replacing certain sections of roofing, and all the **interior water damage** in both buildings.
2. Installation of three new **handrails** to provide accessibility for anyone stepping up from the main floor of church into the sanctuary, and from the main floor of the sanctuary onto the altar platform.
3. **Re-carpeting** the church. The current carpeting is over 30 years old and can't get any cleaner, nor can it be repaired any more.

4. Rebuilding the entrance **stairways** to the Parish Hall main entrance, and the south (accessible) entrance to the church.

5. Establishing the St. Gertrude **Catholic Education Support Fund** to assist parish families with children enrolled at NCA. This fund will be available for families in need both for enrolling new students, and for assisting families dealing with crises due to health, employment, or other unexpected situations.

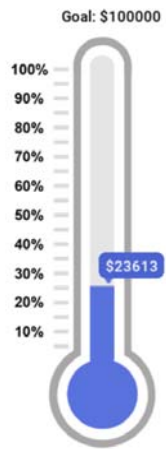

## Sign-Up Sunday Information

This Sunday, October 3 is Sign-Up Sunday! Please consider how you can serve our faith community. There are many different ministries and groups that truly make St. Gertrude special.

They include

- **Parish Advisory Boards** (*working with Fr. Rich*)
  - **Parish Pastoral Council (PPC)**: The PPC meets about once a month (but usually takes the summer off). This is the group of parishioners who consider the pastoral direction of the parish. Members listen to parishioners to get a sense of where the overall direction should be focused. They bring this wisdom to the PPC meetings in order to determine how we might best respond to the needs and directions that are brought forward. The PPC goes through an annual discernment process to determine membership each year of both general members and then the PPC officers.



- **Parish Finance Council:** This team meets about four or five times a year. Members review monthly, quarterly, semi-annual, and annual financial reports to keep updated on the financial condition of the parish. With this information, they are able to make informed decisions about the annual parish budget and how we are staying on track or need to modify certain activities in order to stay within our budget. The Finance Council also approves the budget, and at the end of the fiscal year, also approves the Annual Report. Membership is open to any parishioner.
  - **Parish Development Council:** This group tries to anticipate upcoming financial needs and how they might best be met. This includes everything from considering if the Sunday Offertory collections are meeting the budget and, if not, what fundraising steps need to be taken. They also look at some extraordinary needs -- such as maintenance and repairs to the buildings.
- **Religious Education and Youth Ministry** (*working with Eloy Escamilla, Pastoral Associate, Religious Education and Youth Ministry*)
  - **Catechist:** Sign up to become a Catechist in the Religious Ed program on Sundays from 9:15-10:15 am to help children to find the presence of God among us.
  - **Kids Word Volunteer:** On Sundays during 10:30 am Mass in church, volunteers share age-appropriate scripture readings with children ages 5-9.
  - **Youth Group Volunteer:** Help facilitate activities supporting our parish youth's faith and personal development.
- **Liturgical Ministries**
- (*working with Kevin Cheers, Pastoral Associate*)

- **Eucharistic Ministers:** Administer Holy Communion at Masses.
  - **Lectors:** Proclaim the Word of God at Masses..
  - **Ushers/Greeters:** Welcomes parishioners to Masses, takes up the collection.
- *(working with Mary Clare Barker, Music Director)*
  - **Cantors, Vocal Ensembles, Musicians:** Opportunities abound to cantor at weekend Masses, participate in small vocal ensembles at the 10:30 am Sunday morning Mass, or accompany our Masses on a string, woodwind, or brass instrument.
- **Social Services**
  - **Heart to Heart Ministry for Seniors** *(working with Jane-Callahan-Moore, Director of Parish Social Services)*  
Volunteers help their neighbors aged 60 and above who need support to sustain their independence by driving seniors to medical appointments, procedures, and more. Other volunteers are needed to call homebound seniors weekly to ensure their well-being, while others commit to praying for those who have requested prayers at least once daily using the Ministry of Praise letter mailed monthly.
- **Social Justice Ministries**
  - **New! Social Justice: Peace and Justice Committee** *(working with Fr. Mike Gabriel)*  
As people of faith, we are commissioned to call out many of the injustices in our world. There is an urgent need now more than ever for us to be a church not only of statements and prayers but one of action, where God's love, justice, and mercy can grow. We are looking for people who would be willing to be part of this committee, to help focus on specific injustices and to facilitate parish social justice activities.

- **Refugee and Immigrant Ministry**  
This group sponsors refugees and immigrants, providing both financial and emotional support as they settle into their new lives in Chicago.
- **United Power for Action and Justice**  
United Power works with faith communities, including St. Gertrude, to help them connect and put their power behind the issues that matter most to them. The group is currently working on issues related to gun violence, health care, affordable housing, immigration, and violence prevention.
- **Laudato Si': Care for our Common Home**
  - **Resurrection Compost** (*working with Mary Clare Barker, Music Director*)  
This seasonal project combines composting and a vegetable garden. Parishioners lease a composting bucket and deposit appropriate materials in the parish's compost bin. The compost is then used to fertilize our vegetable garden, tended to by volunteers, that feeds patrons of Care for Real and the St. Thomas of Canterbury soup kitchen.

In addition to the above groups, there are several other liturgical, social justice, environmental initiatives, social, and neighborhood groups affiliated with our parish! ## Letter from Cardinal Cupich about the COVID and Flu Vaccines

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

The recent escalation of COVID-19 cases in Illinois is a source of frustration for us all, particularly if we know someone who has been stricken by this virus or has even died from it. Even more disturbing is that with the change

of seasons we now are entering a new flu season, which is leading some health officials to warn of a “twindemic.”

It is out of a concern for you and your families that I write to encourage everyone to get the COVID-19 and flu vaccines. While one vaccine does not protect both viruses, neither do the vaccines interfere with each other. It is safe to receive both vaccines and in some cases your health care provider or local pharmacy can provide both in one visit.

The Catholic Church has been a consistent voice in defense of human life and that must continue in this moment. Everyone at the Archdiocese of Chicago, from pastors to administrators, teachers, principals and custodial staff, has been working hard during the pandemic to ensure that our churches and schools operate safely. We must go that extra step now. Ideally, everyone should be vaccinated for the flu by the end of October.

According to the public health officials, additional considerations for groups of people include:

- Children should be vaccinated as soon as possible. Some children need two doses of flu vaccine. For those children it is recommended to get the first dose as soon as vaccine is available, because the second dose needs to be given at least four weeks after the first.
- Women who are in the third trimester of pregnancy can be vaccinated for the flu, since doing so will help protect their infants during the first months of life when they are too young to be vaccinated.

Common flu symptoms such as fever, cough, sore throat and extreme fatigue are similar to COVID-19 symptoms. Our health care providers are already overwhelmed by patients infected with the coronavirus, or people mistaking one infection for the other.

Influenza can be, in itself, a deadly illness. More than 200,000 Americans are hospitalized each year with the flu and, while most people recover completely in one to two weeks, some develop potentially life-threatening complications such as pneumonia.

Over the past decade, influenza and pneumonia have been linked to an annual average of 3,500 deaths in Illinois, alone.

Nobody likes getting shots, especially children. But the flu shot is easy to find, inexpensive and recommended for just about everyone, even children over the age of six months. Most insurance plans and public health clinics or pharmacies provide a flu vaccine. I encourage you to contact your health care provider to determine which flu vaccine is right for you.

This week, I will roll up my sleeve for the flu vaccination and I encourage you to do the same in order to protect yourselves, your families and your neighbors. It is a small but heroic thing to do. You may just save a life. At the least, you will help make this flu season less deadly for our community.

My prayers are with all of you, and I ask that you pray for me.
