What to Expect and Do When Coming Back to Church

The Feast of St. Francis is also a great reminder of Pope Francis' encyclical, *Laudato Si*, about the care for our home, planet Earth. Perhaps as a follow up to my article last week about doing our "homework" about people running for office, *Laudato Si* presents a strong and uniquely Catholic perspective on how we live and how all those daily decisions affect the long-term health of our planet — and all those who live on it.

Any candidate for public office should be concerned about global warming, environmental policies, how these decisions affect the poor around the world, and the minorities in our own backyard. Those who deny science need to be held accountable for their behavior toward our home! Just because someone doesn't believe that the consequences of centuries of bad policies which have made some of the planet's inhabitants wealthy while endangering the health of the entire world population does not make the end result different. Much like a three-year-old having a tantrum, denying the reality of what is going on can only speed up the even greater destructive consequences of our actions.

Perhaps, like me, you have found the events of the past few weeks and the relentless pressure of the pandemic to begin taking a toll. Depression is what I am talking about. On some days, not so bad. And on others, truly oppressive. None of us is alone during this time. And reaching out to others

is one of the keys to managing and eventually emerging from depression. Part of the significant problems we have during this time is our social isolation. We have known for a long time that human touch is vital and essential for all human beings. If babies are denied this in their early months, they will suffer repercussions throughout their lives. And people of any age -- but especially striking older people in hospitals and nursing homes -- are often craving some human contact re-connecting them to their humanity. The social restrictions because of health obligations of the pandemic have greatly reduced casual human contacts many of us took for granted -- simple handshakes, a touch on the arm, a hug from a friend we haven't seen in a while, and so on. When this deprivation is coupled with the seemingly endless stream of negative news and our own society ripped apart by some politicians and then we watch this negativity over and over again on television or social media, it begins to take a terrible toll.

There are some very positive things most of us can do to counter this situation. Among the most important is to severely limit or disconnect from certain media. If you are watching too much television news and commentary, cut back on the amount of time you watch. Sometimes limiting news intake to the printed word can be helpful. Videos are much more invasive into our psyches — so spending too much time on Facebook, Instagram, and the other social platforms can be devastating. Removing them or restricting the amount we watch can be very helpful. Once we have got some control over these types of things, we can then move into patterns of quiet reflection which always lead us back into contact with God living within us. And if we go there, it soon becomes clear all the noise and the distractions are not of God! So we really do want to be careful and be very cautious about how much that is not of God we want to expose ourselves to.

It is important to remember with the pandemic continuing that if we are stricken with depression, this is a serious illness and we should never make light of it in ourselves or others. If it continues over weeks and then into months, it may be time to reach out for some professional help. Counselors and therapists can help us manage our lives and also direct us to professionals who can determine if medication can be helpful in treating depression. As it now becomes clear we will be in this pandemic situation for many more months, please be considerate of yourself and of others. And, without placing yourself or others in unhealthy situations, do try to reestablish whatever social contacts that can again be part of your life. And

don't forget the spiritual dimension! Turn to God in quiet moments and make God your active partner. God is always available to us. We just have to remember to turn to God and ask for God's help.



Fr. Mike Bradley will run 26.2 miles through the streets of Edgewater for Heart to Heart on Sunday, October 11! Beginning at 6:00 am, Fr. Mike will start his endeavor at Glenwood and Granville.

There will be four different legs of his run, with the Church corner (Granville and Glenwood) being the center of it. He will run the route four times to complete the 26.2 miles.

Leg 1

- Starting point the church corner of Granville and Glenwood
- West to Clark
- North on Clark to Highland
- · East on Highland to Glenwood
- South on Glenwood back to the church

· Back to the church

Leg 2

- East on Granville to Sheridan Road
- South on Sheridan Road to Glenlake
- West on Glenlake to Glenwood
- North on Glenwood to Granville
- Back to the church

Leg 3

- West on Granville to Greenview
- South on Greenview to Elmdale
- East on Elmdale to Broadway
- North on Broadway to Glenlake
- East on Glenlake to Sheridan
- North on Sheridan to Granville
- West on Granville to Glenwood
- Back to the church

Leg 4

- North on Glenwood to Rosemont
- East on Rosemont to Broadway
- South on Broadway to Granville
- · West on Granville to Glenwood
- · Back to the church



Readings for Sunday, October 4

Reading 1: Is 5:1–7

Let me now sing of my friend,
my friend's song concerning his vineyard.
My friend had a vineyard
on a fertile hillside;
he spaded it, cleared it of stones,
and planted the choicest vines;
within it he built a watchtower,
and hewed out a wine press.
Then he looked for the crop of grapes,
but what it yielded was wild grapes.

Now, inhabitants of Jerusalem and people of Judah, judge between me and my vineyard:

What more was there to do for my vineyard that I had not done?

Why, when I looked for the crop of grapes, did it bring forth wild grapes?

Now, I will let you know what I mean to do with my vineyard: take away its hedge, give it to grazing, breakthrough its wall, let it be trampled!

Yes, I will make it a ruin: it shall not be pruned or hoed, but overgrown with thorns and briers;

I will command the clouds not to send rain upon it.

The vineyard of the LORD of hosts is the house of Israel, and the people of Judah are his cherished plant; he looked for judgment, but see, bloodshed! for justice, but hark, the outcry!

Reading 2: Phil 4:6-9

Brothers and sisters: Have no anxiety at all, but in everything, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, make your requests known to God. Then the peace of God that surpasses all understanding will guard your hearts and minds in Christ Jesus.

Finally, brothers and sisters, whatever is true, whatever is honorable, whatever is just, whatever is pure, whatever is lovely, whatever is gracious, if there is any excellence and if there is anything worthy of praise, think about these things. Keep on doing what you have learned and received and heard and seen in me. Then the God of peace will be with you.

Gospel: Mt 21:33-43

Jesus said to the chief priests and the elders of the people: "Hear another parable. There was a landowner who planted a vineyard, put a hedge around it, dug a wine press in it, and built a tower. Then he leased it to tenants and went on a journey. When vintage time drew near, he sent his servants to the tenants to obtain his produce. But the tenants seized the servants and one they beat, another they killed, and a third they stoned. Again he sent other servants, more numerous than the first ones, but they treated them in the same way. Finally, he sent his son to them, thinking, 'They will respect my son.' But when the tenants saw the son, they said to one another, 'This is the heir. Come, let us kill him and acquire his inheritance.' They seized him, threw him out of the vineyard, and killed him. What will the owner of the vineyard do to those tenants when he comes?" They answered him, "He will put those wretched men to a wretched death and lease his vineyard to other tenants who will give him the produce at the proper times." Jesus said to them, "Did you never read in the Scriptures: The stone that the builders rejected has become the cornerstone: by the Lord has this been done, and it is wonderful in our eyes?

Therefore, I say to you, the kingdom of God will be taken away from you and given to a people that will produce its fruit."



Order a Breaking Bread Hymnal for 2021 for Personal Use

Due to COVID-19, we do not know when we will be able to put hymnals back in the pews for communal use. Parishioners are welcome to order their own personal copies of Breaking Bread 2021 for use at home or brought to/from church. The hymnals contain the scripture readings for Sundays and the music we use in church. The start date for using it is the First Sunday in Advent (November 29).

Missals are being sold at a discounted rate of \$7.00/hymnal. This includes tax and shipping. Your order, along with payment, must be received by Monday, October 26.

When the missals arrive, you will be contacted and can pick it up at the Rectory or at church when you come to Mass.

when you come to Mass or at the Rectory. Checks should be made out to St. Gertrude with *Breaking Bread hymnal* in the memo line.


Please note, while you may bring your personal missal to St. Gertrude, you MUST bring it back home. Any missals left in the church will be discarded.

Interested in Becoming Catholic?

The Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA) is a process by which adults learn more about the Catholic Church. This free program begins in late September and meets until Pentecost.

Many people who begin RCIA are non-Catholics seeking to become Catholic or at least to explore whether Catholicism might be a good home. Those who complete the process and decide to become Catholic are initiated into the Church at the Easter Vigil Mass on Holy Saturday. Others who take RCIA are already Catholic but want a deeper understanding of their faith foundation.

The RCIA process does not ask those who have been baptized in another faith to give up their denominational experiences. Rather, the RCIA process seeks to add new colors and designs to their existing faith life tapestry. In addition to attending Mass, the RCIA process includes weekly gatherings of breaking open the Word of God, sharing our stories, and learning about our faith traditions.

This year, RCIA gatherings will be a mixture of Zoom meetings and inperson gatherings after Mass.




