From Father Rich

Friday began the annual Week of Prayer for Christian Unity. Begun in 1908, this observance grew in stature beginning in 1968 following the Second Vatican Council and the expressed hope of so many Christian Churches to find their way back to being unified. Older Christians remember the years of trial and experimentation which paralleled some extensive working groups of various Christian churches, seeking to reconcile some of the differences that had caused divisions. There were even times when some churches were open to letting members who agreed upon Eucharistic theology to share Holy Communion.



While there has been some extraordinary progress among many different Christian Churches, many divisions remain, still searching for a solution. At the same time, there is also a much greater acceptance among the churches themselves of their fellow Christians. And many churches now work together on various projects and in various ministries.

The goal will always be, “That all might be one.” It is important to remain hopeful, solidly grounded in the progress that has already been made and the clear desire of so many of the Churches to continue to walk together on this journey. One of the constant themes of the ecumenical movement is that we all pray for one another, for unity, for an end to divisions among the Body of Christ. During this annual celebration, how might each of us recognize the truth in our fellow Christians and how we might be supportive of what we have in common as we continue to work for that unity?

The Epistle readings for this Sunday and the next five Sundays offer an extended reflection on what it means to be Christian and how within that unity there is so much room for diversity. A wonderful reflection during this Week of Prayer for Christian Unity!

Don’t forget the ECRA Service for our local celebration this week. It is Tuesday, January 22 at 7:00 pm, and is being hosted by Sacred Heart School at their chapel at 6250 Sheridan Rd. Please consider joining others from the 22 Christian churches in Edgewater in this opportunity for prayer. This is a Taize Prayer Service, offering time for reflection, prayer and music.

Monday is our national holiday in observance of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.’s. Birthday. As the immigration controversy continues nation-wide, and the in-grained racial prejudices are exposed across our nation, what individual steps can each of us take today to learn more about people who are of different races or ethnic backgrounds than ourselves? What negative stereotypes can I identify in my own upbringing and background that need to be addressed? There are few causes for violence more powerful among human beings than fear of those who are different, unknown, strangers, living in an apparently different world. How can each of us build bridges to cross those divides?

Growing in Faith

After the celebrations of the Christmas season, the sights and sounds of the 24/7 news cycle feel particularly harsh to me. War, famine, gun violence, poverty, misogyny, domestic violence, government shutdowns, racism, scandals in our church, inadequate education or healthcare, internment camps for children within our borders, mistreatment of migrants and immigrants—the list goes on. Our local and global community is suffering, and I feel helpless and overwhelmed. How do we maintain hope and optimism?

The Wedding at Cana is a miracle story of abundance and hope. The first of many. And like much of the Gospel of John, it invites us to reflect on how we are in relationship both to Jesus and to our extended community. It is a story of prayer leading to action. Mary, aware of the needs of others and steadfast in her belief, asks her son for help and he in turn guides the actions of others. Their dialogue leads to a miracle.

The invitation of this story is for us to engage rather than turn away. To do what is before us. To take a stand. Like Mary, we can open a dialogue with Jesus

because we see a need to serve others. Like the servants, we can respond to the call to action by following through knowing that each little thing helps.

“Like the servants at the party, let us offer what we have, little as it may seem. Like them, let us not be afraid to ‘lend a hand’. May our solidarity in the commitment for justice be part of the dance or song that we can offer to our Lord.” ~ Pope Francis

Celebrating MLK Day



MLK Jr. Day of Service: Dr. King once said, "Life's most persistent and urgent question is: 'What are you doing for others?'" Each year, Americans across the country answer that question by coming together on the King Holiday

to serve their neighbors and communities. There are many events taking place on this MLK Day of Service that need volunteers. Visit www.nationalservice.gov for a list of service opportunities.

Free Entrance and Special MLK Events at Local Museums on Monday, January 21: The Chicago History Museum, 1601 N. Clark St., is hosting an event to commemorate the life and legacy of Dr. King. Enjoy a production of *The MLK Project: The Fight for Civil Rights* by Writers Theatre, a musical performance by the Chicago Chamber Choir, and a reenactment of Dr. King's "I Have a Dream" speech, along with storytelling and crafts that reflect Dr. King's messages of peace and justice.

The Museum of Science and Industry, 5700 S. Lake Shore Dr., is hosting a Black Creativity Family Day 2019. Families can participate in a community art experience, and design and test a prototype during the opening of the Innovation Studio, and explore the Juried Art Exhibition.

Additionally, the Art Institute of Chicago, the Adler Planetarium, and the Shedd Aquarium will be free.

Northwestern University's MLK Celebration to Feature Maggie Anderson: On Monday, January 28, Maggie Anderson, the founder and CEO of The Empowerment Experiment (EE) Foundation and the author of *Our Black Year*, will be the keynote speaker at Northwestern University's MLK celebration at 6:00 pm at Pick-Staiger Concert Hall, 40 Arts Circle Drive in Evanston.

Maggie and her family made headlines around the world for using exclusively Black businesses, professionals, and products for an entire year. This unique case-study in self-help economics showed how incremental increases in support for Black businesses and entrepreneurs, as well as for the mainstream firms engaging them as suppliers, vendors, franchisees and agencies, could have a dramatic effect on the Black community and the American economy as a whole.

Care for Real is Available to Help Federal Employees

Care for Real is prepared to help anyone in need of food assistance, including federal workers who might be experiencing hardship due to the government shutdown.

Furloughed employees should present a "legitimate authorities" ID to receive the groceries at 5339 N. Sheridan Rd., Chicago.

Care for Real is suspending the usual requirements for service (income below federal guidelines and geographic boundaries) to help those impacted by the government shutdown.

Families can receive grocery staples—meat,

dairy, beans, rice, pasta, peanut butter, canned fruits and vegetables and lots more—once a month and can come up to four times a week for fresh produce and bakery items.

Food is distributed Monday, Wednesday and Friday from 9 am to noon and Saturday from 9:00 am to 1:00 pm.

St. Gertrude has been a strong supporter of Care for Real since 1970, providing financial support to help Care for Real's goals of providing loving support for our neighbors and acting as a safety net for the entire Edgewater community.

Catholic Matching Grant Program

A group of generous donors has agreed to pool their resources and offer a two-for-one matching gift program to schools run by the Archdiocese of Chicago. For \$1 designated to a qualifying school through *Empower Illinois* between December 1, 2018 and February 28, 2019, the school will receive \$2 in matching funds. The donations are capped at \$100,000 per school.

After April 1, 2019, any matching gift program funds that are not awarded at a designated school will be reallocated to low-income students at schools with unmet demand.

Crispina and Her Sisters: Women and Authority in Early Christianity
