○ OBITUARY ○

DOYLEEN AMICE TROTT was born 2 January 1937, the sixth of nine children—the second of two girls to Adolphus and Amice Lambert [née Burrows]. Doyleen grew up as the only girl among seven brothers following the death of her sister Peggy, who died as a baby. Her father was a mason contractor and did maintenance for schools, while her mother, Amice, was a homemaker who sometimes worked at a nearby questhouse.

Doyleen was christened at Mt. Zion A.M.E. Church and at a young age, gave her life to Christ there where she was an active member throughout her life. Her education began at the Southampton Glebe School, now Dalton E. Tucker Primary School, followed by the Girls' Institute of Arts and Crafts in Bermuda, and later at Durham Business College in Jamaica, where she lived with her niece, L'Tanya.

Upon her return to Bermuda, Doyleen was initially employed at Mt. Zion as a secretary due to racial barriers to employment elsewhere. Secretarial work was not her preference however, so shortly after, she took a position at the English Sports Shop as a seamstress, which she thoroughly enjoyed. She worked there until the birth of her son David in 1967. About a year later, she joined the Bank of N.T. Butterfield, working in the Ledger Department for nearly 30 years making cheque books. Doyleen married Loris Trott in 1966, but sadly the marriage ended shortly after. Upon retirement from the bank, she worked at C. & S. West Laboratory, and permanently retired from there in 2013.

Doyleen's love of sports was no doubt fostered through playing cricket and football in the back yard with her brothers. Whenever asked if they ever fought for her, she'd reply, "No way. I had to fight for myself or my brothers would beat me up themselves!" She became an active, competitive athlete. A fierce centre in netball during her school days, Doyleen was even a member of the Somerset Bridge Zebras women's softball team as a very capable catcher until she got married. Doyleen developed a passion for, and engaged in a LOT of dancing—She loved to dance. In her later years she would



attempt dance moves she'd do when she was younger, up until 2020 when she could no longer walk. Doyleen also enjoyed watching sports such as the Atlanta Braves baseball games, Serena and Venus Williams playing tennis, and her beloved Somerset Cupmatch team playing cricket.

In her church, Doyleen served as a Sunday School Teacher from her teenage years until she was close to 70 years old! She had also served as Sunday School Superintendent, and was a dedicated member of the Steward Board for nearly 40 years. Doyleen was President of Mt. Zion's Lay Organization for eight years and held roles such as Chaplain, Parliamentarian, and Consultant to the Executive Board of the Bermuda Conference Lay Organization. Additionally, she was a member of the Ada E. Simmons Women's Missionary Society, the Sanctuary Choir, the Stewardess Board, and served as a Consultant to Mt. Zion's Lay Organization.

At family gatherings, Doyleen always took charge in the kitchen, and created much laughter with her comedy. Known for her straightforward, humorous approach, Doyleen was described as refreshingly candid. Her love and concern for others were evident in how she nurtured relationships. She treated many as though she were their mother or aunt, which earned her the affectionate name of Aunt Doleen or other derivatives of her name, such as Doreen, or Darlene, along with Trotty or Dophus.

Two of Doyleen's favorite Bible passages were Psalm 121 and Proverbs 3:5-7, reflecting her deep faith and resilience even in the face of difficult challenges—such as receiving death threats for her work in Sunday School!

Doyleen was a unique and original shining star, a dependable and devoted child of God, whose life was marked by service to her God, her family, and to her community.

Personal Integrity | She would never compromise her principles.

Personality | A good nature — truly rare.

Relationships | Gave generously but also valued reciprocal support in her friendships.
