Have you ever heard the expression "trying to fly the airplane while you're still building it?" Sometimes that is how it feels getting the Leadership Board up and running. Leadership Board members are simultaneously ensuring that the important business of CITD continues while refining the mechanisms of our new board. Here are just a few of the exciting things the board has been working on over the past few months.

- 1. A campus inventory was completed to ensure we have a thorough accounting of our assets in the unlikely occurrence of a catastrophic event. Pictures of everything are now "in the cloud" so they are accessible if needed.
- 2. A physical safety walk through of the campus was done and quite a few issues were identified. To achieve a fully safe environment a three-pronged strategy will need to be implemented:
 - a. Volunteers will be recruited to work on smaller but urgent projects that were identified which do not require large outlays of money.
 - b. Plans are being made to identify opportunities to raise funds to tackle larger, more expensive projects (details below).
 - c. A Safety Task Force will be implemented to address ongoing concerns that require additional planning, resources, or ongoing monitoring. If you would like to participate in this task force please contact me or Pastor Gina.
- 3. A Capital Campaign will be launched soon to raise funds for larger projects to address both safety issues as well as wear and tear. Stay tuned for more information.
- 4. As CITD rebounds from COVID-19 and looks to the future, so many of you have stepped up to ask what you can do to meet the needs of our church and serve our community. The Leadership Board will be implementing a program to recognize and thank volunteers, especially those who do so many of the behind-the-scenes jobs with few people knowing about their hard work and commitment. Stay tuned to learn who are first "YOU ROCK" recipients will be. Please contact me or Pastor Gina if you have thoughts on which unsung heroes should be honored.

Remember: Leadership Board meetings are open to all. You are encouraged and welcome to attend meetings to learn about all of the exciting work that is happening and express your thoughts on future plans.



Ida B, the Queen: The Extraordinary Life and Legacy of Ida B. Wells, by Michelle Duster

Ida B. Wells was a journalist, suffragist, and an anti-lynching crusader. She was born enslaved in 1862. In 2020 she won the Pulitzer Prize for her reporting on the violence being perpetrated against African Americans. The grant was bestowed upon the Ida B. Wells Society for Investigative Reporting. Desert Southwest Conference News



After more than 150 years of faithful service to the people of Phoenix and the greater United Methodist Church connection, **Central United Methodist Church** has made the difficult decision to close its doors.

The congregation voted on Sunday, April 21, to close based on their leadership's recommendation after using the faithful path process in consultation with their District Superintendent, *Rev. Melissa Rynders*, and their pastor, *Rev. Brandon Gilmore*.

The decision will be formalized during the Desert Southwest Annual Conference in Tucson, Arizona this summer.

In its rich history, **Central United Methodist Church** was responsible for planting several United Methodist Churches in the Desert Southwest Conference, including Paradise Valley UMC, and Mission church in Isinya, Kenya. Central UMC also established the Deaconess Hospital, now known as Good Samaritan Hospital in Phoenix, Arizona as well as Wesley Community Center and United Methodist Outreach Ministries. "Phoenix is a better community and the lives of countless individuals have been enriched because of the ministry of Central United Methodist Church, including their decision to be a reconciling congregation," said East District Superintendent, *Rev. Melissa Rynders*. "We know this decision was a difficult one for the congregation to make. The core of our faith as United Methodists is that we believe in death and resurrection. While the ministry of Central United Methodist Church has come to its faithful completion, we know that new ministry will rise out of the legacy and faithfulness of the people of Central UMC."

"As our siblings at Central UMC have discerned that they have come to the end of their life cycle as a congregation, we celebrate the ways that they have faithfully completed their mission and ministry through the years. We will actively discern what God is calling us to do next in that part of the city of Phoenix."
