On the page one header is 1861 Lake 2¢ - #66 reclassified as #66TC. This was not an issued stamp, it was created as a trial color probably in June-July 1861 in "Lake" Trial Color Proof. The stamp was originally designated SC #66 an then later re-numbered as a proof. The stamp was produced by "THE NATIONAL **BANK NOTE COMPANY CITY OF NEW YORK"**

- **10. Stamp Catalog** A **stamp catalog** (or **stamp catalogue**) is a catalog of postage stamp types. Although basically just a list of descriptions and prices, in practice the catalog is an essential tool of philately and stamp collecting. Stamp catalogs are part of philatelic literature.
- 11. Michel Catalog The Michel catalog (MICHEL-Briefmarken-Katalog) is the largest and best-known stamp catalog in the German-speaking world. First published in 1910, it has become an important reference work for philately, with information not available in the English-language Scott catalog.
- 12. Stanley Gibbons Catalog The first Stanley Gibbons stamp catalogue was a penny price list 1865 and issued at monthly for the next 14 years. The company produces numerous catalogues which are largely defined by country, which are reissued annually.

- 13. Scott Catalog The Scott catalogue of postage stamps, published by Scott Publishing Co, a subsidiary of Amos Press, is updated annually and lists all the stamps of the entire world which its editors recognize as issued for postal purposes. It is published in large volumes and is also produced in non-printable CD and DVD editions. The numbering system used by Scott to identify stamps is dominant among stamp collectors in the United States and Canada..
- 14. Coil Stamps A coil stamp is a type of postage stamp sold in strips one stamp wide. The name derives from the usual handling of long strips, which is to coil them into rolls, in a



manner reminiscent of adhesive tape rolls.

Definitions

The following definition of EFO and other terms is here in support of the ongoing Editors Corner series on Varieties, EFO's and Counterfeits.

EFO is the shorthand for "Error, Freak, or Oddity". It's a term applied to philatelic items that were formed unintentionally abnormal.

Errors: Are usually "major" errors having catalog status where something in the process has gone entirely wrong. **Examples of "errors" are** consistent, unintentional deviations from the normal and typically are stamps that are wrongly perforated, both between or completely imperforated, FULL color(s) omitted, inverts, multiple impressions, missing watermarks or tagging and FULL stamps on either side of an interpane gutter, etc.

Freaks: Also called "varieties", are generally defined as a lesser degree of production problem. Typically freaks have flaws that are <u>not consistent</u> or do not have catalog status. **Examples of freaks include ink** smudges, off center perforation shifts, partially missing colors or color shifts, pre-printing paper folds, paper creases, over or under inked stamps, and so forth. Freaks often sell for less than their "error" counterparts. Printing plate cracks, wear and other flaws such as repairs or reentries are freaks and not typically considered to be errors.

Shanghai Surcharged Overprints

Shanghai Overprints - Most U.S. Collectors and specialists are conscious of the Washington-Franklin Shanghai overprints, but few know the story behind these rare and unusual U.S. stamps.

What were the Opium Wars - The Opium wars were two armed conflicts in China during the mid-19th century between the West and the Oing dynasty that ruled China from 1644 to 1911/12. The conflicts centered on China's resistance to massive opium imports from India into China. The first Opium War (1839–42) was fought between China and Britain. It was during the First Opium War that China ceded the island of Hong Kong to the British. In 1839, one of Britain's first acts of war was to occupy Hong Kong, a sparsely inhabited island off the coast of southeast China. In 1841. After Britain won the war China ceded the island to the British, and in 1842 the Treaty of Nanking was signed, formally ending the *First* Opium War. The Second Opium War (1856–60), also known as the Arrow War was fought by Britain and France against China. In each case the Western powers were victorious and gained commercial privileges and legal and territorial concessions in China. The treaties that ended these conflicts established the opening of foreign trade to the ports of Amoy, Canton, Foochow, Shanghai and Ningpo.

Oddities: The catch-all category for anything that is left. Oddities can be subtle problems that do not have catalog status. Examples can be cancel and plate varieties, inverted USPS cancels, very minor perforation shifts, minor color shifts, etc. Most oddities are a curiosity and have lower EFO values.

There continues to be a debate about the definition of freaks vs oddities. This is one area where a classification can be a matter of personal opinion. Frequently the debate is over pre-printing paper folds and centers on how minor (oddity) or how major (freak) a fold is. As it turns out, one mans freak, is a another mans oddity.

Counterfeit, Forgery, or Fake.

Counterfeit: Fraudulent reproduction of a stamp meant to defraud the issuing authority. (Typically used as postage)

Forgery: Fraudulent reproduction or alteration of a stamp meant to defraud (not the issuing authority), In philately, forged stamps are altered to defraud the buyer.

Fakes An imitation stamp, or reprint. There are many fakes on the market, typically sold as fakes they are rarely sold as genuine. In philately, fakes are an expression of art are not offered as genuine to defraud. (reprints may be considered fakes)

After the wars had ended, treaties also allowed foreign countries to establish their own postal systems for the purpose of sending letters and packages back to their home countries. The Americans & merchants established many commercial interests in Shanghai, but for a number of years, used the German and Dutch ships for dispatches out of China. This initial service was expensive and unpredictable. As a result a new Postal system was needed and in 1865, a contract was awarded to the Pacific Mail Steamship Co. and the U.S. consul became the postal agent.

U.S. Postal Agency in Shanghai - During this "Treaty Port" era, foreign postal services were organized through each country's respective consulate. Mail to and from the U.S. was sent through the nation's consulate in Shanghai. At first regular consular employees regularly stopped their duties to process mail, but a paid clerk was eventually hired. Branch offices elsewhere in China and Japan were later added by 1868. U.S. stamps were sold and letters were mailed for 10¢ per half ounce until the U.P.U. rate of 5¢ per half ounce was implemented in 1907, as custom duties became too complicated.²

By the end of World War I, Washington saw the advantage of surcharging some stamps in Chinese currency due to the increased mail volume and continuing deterioration of the Chinese dollar. By 1919, the Chinese dollar was worth roughly 50% of the value of an American dollar. Sixteen Washington-Franklins were over-printed with Chinese currency values on stamps showing the U.S. value (Scott numbers K1-K16). For example, the listed have surcharges of half the value of the face amount.

The stamps are

unwatermarked and perforated 11 x 11. They were established on July 1, 1919. The stamps were sold to those buying stamps with Chinese currency, while un-surcharged stamps were also available to customers with U.S. currency. The stamps were printed in Washington at the Bureau of Engraving and Printing (BEP).

More Important Definitions

Reissues

(a reprint of a currently available stamp)

Reprints

(copies of the obsolete originals)

Special Printings

(original plate stamps for nonpostal use, while originals are still valid for postage)

Government issued Reproductions

(Not printed from the original plates, not valid postage, considered likenesses. Examples US Scott 3-4

The 18 Shanghai surcharged overprint stamps can be difficult to acquire. The stamps were lightly issued 100 years ago and were only sold in three Chinese cities.

Mint stamp availability far exceeds the genuinely cancelled copies because most mailers in Shanghai were well aware that purchasing the un-surcharged stamps with U.S. currency was a far better value than buying and using the overprints. When issued, there were many collectors who purchased mint copies. A quantity of the surcharged stamps was sent back to Washington in 1922 when the Post Office Department opened the Philatelic Stamp Agency. Subsequently, these unused items were purchased by collectors and survive today as mint items. The postal agency in Shanghai was closed effective December 31, 1922.



US Scott K1-16 Franklin Shanghai China Overprints

The Overprint stamps are listed and valued in the Scott *Specialized Catalogue of United States Stamps and Covers* with the prefixed with the letter "K." The stamps range in surcharged value from 2¢ to \$2. Most U.S. collections are missing the \$2-on-\$1 violet brown Benjamin Franklin stamp (Scott K16).

The Scott U.S. Specialized catalog value is over \$700 in used condition with the value marked in italics. **Warning:** Used examples must have the proper U.S. Shanghai roller, oval or dated circular date-stamp. If a stamp is unrecognizable as postmarked in the U.S. agency in Shanghai, you should not buy it or get it expertized. Forgeries exist of all Shanghai overprints on stamps in mint never-hinged condition in grades of very fine or higher.

Irish International Exhibition

Labels and Post Card of the Irish International Exhibition, 1907, Dublin.

The Great Exhibition of 1851, held at the Crystal Palace, in London, is perhaps the best known of the modern exhibitions. Ireland's International Exhibition of 1907 followed in the great tradition of the many international shows of the preceding half century.

These official labels were issued in brown, green, blue and black; these labels seem to emphasize a nostalgic view of Ireland, even though the exhibition was promoted in part to show Ireland's manufacturing capabilities.

Purpose of column is to focus on stamps that are very attractive, very different or just cause you to wonder. I welcome your candidates for inclusion.

Columbia Scott # 495 issued on November 21, 1942, caught my eye. Scott describes this stamp "40th anniversary of the signing of the Treaty of the Wisconsin, Nov 21, 1902.

When you see Wisconsin on a stamp from Columbia makes you wonder what's up. Here's the story in a nutshell: the Thousand Days' War (October 1899-November 1902) was a civil war between the Liberal and Conservative parties (I am not making this up) in Columbia. The Liberals had support from President Castro from Venezuela and towards the end of the war President Theodore Roosevelt sent the Navy to protect US interests (this helped the Conservatives). The peace treaty was signed aboard the USS Wisconsin. The instability of the government and the economy lead to loss of the Department of Panama and the creation of the Republic of Panama in 1903.


New Stamps 2020 United States Postal Service Stamps

The following Issue dates, stamp subjects and formats are tentative and subject to change. They are based on Linn's listing of projected 2020 releases.



American Gardens Forever Stamps May 13 | Winterthur, DE

The Postal Service celebrates the beauty of American gardens. This pane of 20 stamps features 10 different photographs of botanic, country estate and municipal gardens taken between 1996 and 2014. The gardens include: Biltmore Estate Gardens (North Carolina); Brooklyn Botanic Garden (New York); Chicago Botanic Garden (Illinois); Coastal Maine Botanical Gardens (Maine); Dumbarton Oaks Garden (District of Columbia); The Huntington Botanical Gardens (California); Alfred B. Maclay Gardens State Park (Florida); Norfolk Botanical Garden (Virginia); Stan Hywet Hall & Gardens (Ohio); and Winterthur Garden (Delaware). Art director Ethel Kessler designed the stamps with existing photographs by Allen Rokach.
