

All dinners include French /garlic bread, soup and salad, soft drinks. You may select from the following entrees:



- 7. **USPS proposes temporary price hikes for holiday season** The United States Postal Service is proposing temporary price increases on packages to help cover its costs during the busy holiday mailing season. The additional temporary charges would be imposed on packages effective on Oct. 2 and remain in effect until Jan. 22, 2023. The increases would affect Priority Mail Express, Priority Mail, First-Class Package, Parcel Select and Retail Ground services. Among the increases would be a 75¢ surcharge on flat-rate Priority Mail and Priority Mail Express boxes and envelopes for commercial customers, and a 95¢ surcharge on these same products for retail customers. **NSSS** –





Definitions

The following definition of EFO and other terms are here in support of the ongoing Editors Corner series on Varieties, EFO's and Counterfeits.

EFO is the shorthand for "Error, Freak, or Oddity". It's a term applied to philatelic items that were formed unintentionally abnormal.

Errors: Are usually "major" errors having catalog status where something in the process has gone entirely wrong. **Examples of "errors" are** consistent, unintentional deviations from the normal. Typically errors are stamps that are wrongly perforated, both between or completely imperforated, Full incorrect, shifted or omitted color(s), inverted centers or frames, multiple impressions, missing/inverted surcharges, missing or wrong watermarks or tagging and FULL stamps on either side of an interpane gutter, factually wrong or misspelled information etc.

Freaks: Also called "varieties". are generally defined as a lesser degree of production problem. Typically freaks have flaws that are not consistent or do not have catalog status. Examples of freaks include ink smudges, off center perforation shifts, partially missing colors or partial/random color shifts, pre-printing paper folds, paper creases, over or under inked stamps, and so forth. Freaks often sell for less than their "error" counterparts. Printing plate cracks, wear and other flaws such as repairs or reentries are freaks and not typically considered to be errors.

Varieties & EFOs

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THE 1847 #1 Plate Variety
The "E" Double Transfer or "MOWER SHIFT"
Revisited

When I find new information on previously documented varieties, I attempt to provide it to our readers as an updated article. As such, the information for the "Mower Shift" transfer type "E" has been updated in this article. Above, is a stamp originally owned by my grandfather and then later by my father. Years ago, when I first found this stamp (unmarked or identified), I wondered why my grandfather had kept it? The stamp (**Figure 1**) is an interesting looking Scott #1, 1847 5¢ Red Brown Franklin. After much scrutiny, I determined that the stamp showed some significant and unusual doubling in its upper left corner. The stamp, hand cancelled, is an excellent early impression with 3 huge margins, unfortunately the top margin is sorely lacking with what appears to be a pre-print paper fold error from right third, top to bottom of the issue.

Oddities:

The catch-all category for anything that is left. Oddities can be subtle problems that do not have catalog status. Examples can be cancel and plate varieties, inverted USPS cancels, very minor perforation shifts, minor color shifts, etc. Most oddities are a curiosity and have lower EFO values.

There continues to be a debate about the definition of freaks vs oddities. This is one area where a classification can be a matter of personal opinion. Frequently the debate is over pre-printing paper folds and centers on how minor (oddity) or how major (freak) a fold is. As it turns out, one mans freak, is a another mans oddity.

Counterfeit, Forgery, or Fake.

Counterfeit: Fraudulent reproduction of a stamp meant to defraud the issuing authority. (Typically used as postage)


Forgery: Fraudulent reproduction or alteration of a stamp meant to defraud (not the issuing authority), In philately, forged stamps are altered to defraud the buyer.

Fakes: An imitation stamp, or reprint. There are many fakes on the market, typically sold as fakes they are rarely sold as genuine. In philately, fakes are an expression of art are not offered as genuine to defraud. (reprints may be considered fakes)

I later learned that this stamp, a Scott "Type E" variety, was discovered in the 1920s by the San Francisco stamp dealer R.H. Mower. The variety was added to the Scott catalog in 1993, at the recommendation of Mr. William Hatton. The Robert Siegel Auction Galleries listed a copy of this stamp in sale 993 on Sept. 2010 calling it "One of the **great rarities** of the issue." Early on there had been some question as to whether the variety was a double transfer even though 1847 expert, Duane Garrett has called it one.

More Important Definitions

Reissues

(A reprint of a currently available stamp)

Reprints

(Copies of the obsolete originals, or previously issued.

They are sold by the Government they are not classified as proofs and sometimes printed for collector's purposes only)

Special Printings

(Original plate stamps for nonpostal use, while originals are still valid for postage)

Government issued Reproductions

(Not printed from the original plates, not valid postage, considered likenesses.)

Examples US Scott 3-4

Se-tenant Pair

A planned pair, strip or block of adjacent stamps (either horizontal or vertical), which were printed from the same plate and/or sheet. The stamps must be un-separated and deliberately different from each other by design, color, denomination or overprint.

Type-Variety/Combination Pair - An unplanned pair, strip

or block of adjacent stamps (either horizontal or vertical).

The stamps must be unsevered and are different from each other by variety, meaning that at least one member of the pair/strip/block differs in some detail from the "normal" issue. The detail may or may not be an actual philatelic "error".





Figure 5. 1847 5c #1 Type E also known as the "Mower shift," from Chronicle 265/ Feb. 2020 1

For comparison Figure 5 shows another example of the "Mower shift" presented by Gordon Eubanks in his Chronicle article Plate Varieties on 5c 1847 Stamps; the three characteristic lines of the 1(E) the two examples in this article are nearly identical to one another.

The Type E double transfer, also known as the **Mower shift**, was described in the writings of 1847 student Duane Garrett who was published in *Chronicle 92*, *U.S. Philatelic Classics Society*.² The article provided many useful details, including its discovery in the 1920s and that there has always been some doubt if the variety is a double transfer. Historically Garrett called it a Double Transfer. "Ashbrook in correspondence called it a "double transfer" in quotation marks, suggesting he had doubts." and in his *Special Service* (page 436) he wrote: "I do not know whether this is a plate variety or a very minor double transfer, but whatever it is, it is rather outstanding as a variety of the 5¢ 1847."

Scott's U.S. specialized catalog now lists the item as (SC#1e), a **double transfer**. The variety is clearly shown in the plating diagram in Lester Brookman's The *United States Postage Stamps* of the 19th Century (1966) at page 38 of Volume I. The identifying characteristics of the Type E variety, as highlighted in red circles in the enlargements of Figures 4&5: faint background lines that appear to extend through the S and T in POST and less clearly through the U at upper left. Importantly, Garrett's article also cites a letter from Ashbrook speculating that, since the marks are shallow, they probably wore down quickly and so are not visible in the later printings. The "E" variety is very scarce, and much rarer than either the type "A" or "B" varieties. It is believed that "due to the fact that the extra lines were not cut very deep on the plate and soon wore away, that the "E" variety can only be found in the very earliest prints of the plate. Others have stated that the variety is certainly scarce; with **perhaps only 10 copies** recorded.




What was the cause of this variety? Some have speculated that the variety is a uniform and consistent double transfer, and that the DT is of background lines. This is illustrated by the fact that the lines are horizontal and of the same thickness, gap, and structure as those found in the background. It is presumed that an early entry was unsatisfactory which was "pounded" or "burnished" out and then a fresh entry was made. The pounding or burnishing process was not done perfectly, and several background lines remained. Similar transfers are known on the 1c 1851 issue².

Again, Varieties & EFO's make an exciting and educational addition to any stamp collection for they speak to us about how stamps are produced and how mistakes can be made during the production of stamps.

Clipper Ship Mail from 1938

I always look out for mail sent from Hawaii to California, hoping to find one being sent to San Diego. The next best thing is to acquire a cover that is sent to a close neighbor; Long Beach fits the bill perfectly.



January 1938 Cancellation, U.S.S. Louisville, Honolulu, Hawaii

The cover presented is a beautiful color illustrated example of the allure of Hawaii and the importance of our navy associated with these wonderful islands. Thanks to Bob Eygenhuysen, President of the San Diego County Philatelic Society for allowing me to purchase this exemplary example of scenes of what was back in the day, the Territory of Hawaii. The depiction of scenes associated with Hawaii, Honolulu, and the impressive Pan American clipper "ships", which are of course sea planes, beckoned the mainlanders to visit and enjoy the hospitality of the friendly islands.

The cancellation is from the USS Louisville, a light and then heavy cruiser, which spent most of its life in the Pacific, particularly during World War II. The ship suffered damage particularly from Kamikaze attacks and even friendly fire. The ship eventually became redundant, and was sold for scrap to a New York company, September 14, 1959. The ship's bell is located at the Navy Operational Support Center, Louisville, Kentucky.

Our affiliation was made possible by the anonymous donation of the affiliation fee by a member of the club. The ATA publishes a large number of topic checklists which are now available for purchase by the members through the club representative. The checklists are priced based on the size of the list. An ATA checklist includes the following:

- **Stamp ID** the unique identification number for the stamp within the d**ATA**base.
- Type the specific of philatelic issue such as "stamp," "semipostal," "souvenir sheet," etc.
- Country the nation issuing the stamp
- **Year-Mon-Day** columns containing the issue date of the stamp listed by year, then month and finally date.
- **Denom.** the issued denomination of the item.

- **Description** notes and additional keywords describing the item.
- **Want** an empty column for your management of the stamps you have (or need) in the list.
- Notes an empty column for your personal notes.

Stamp News 2022:



The U.S. Postal Service has announced several new stamps to be issued in 2022. The following describes the announcement.

"The new 2022 stamps are miniature works of art, designed to be educational and appeal to collectors and pen pals around the world," said USPS Stamp Services Director William Gicker. "As always, the program offers a variety of subjects celebrating American culture and history. The vivid colors and unique designs of this year's selections will add a special touch of beauty to your envelopes." The following is a partial list of the 2022 stamp program. These designs are subject to change.

Christmas: Virgin and Child. This Christmas stamp features *Virgin and Child*, an oil-on-panel painting from the first half of the 16th century by a Florentine artist known as the Master of the Scandicci Lamentation. Depicting the tenderness of a mother and child, interpretations of the Virgin Mary with the Christ Child take innumerable forms in the Christian art of the Italian Renaissance. Imbued



with a sense of dignity and grace, this stamp offers a traditional touch for cards and letters in a season of celebration, reflection and family. This painting is in the collection of the Museum of Fine Arts, Boston. Art director Greg Breeding designed the stamp. Single (58¢) forever special stamp, double-sided pane of 20.

Fall, Hanukkah. The Postal Service continues its tradition of celebrating the joyous Jewish holiday of Hanukkah with a stamp design that features an original wall-hanging. The fiber art was hand-dyed, appliquéd and quilted to form a colorful abstract image of a hanukiah, the nine-branch candelabra used only at Hanukkah.



Jeanette Kuvin Oren was the stamp designer and artist. Ethel Kessler was the art director. Single (58¢) forever special stamp, pane of 20.

Holiday Elves

The Postal Service evokes the holiday spirit with four new se-tenant stamps featuring a colorful digital illustration of elves preparing toys on a winding conveyor belt in a snow-laden forest. Like many beloved Christmas traditions—including Santa Claus himself—elves did not become a well-established part of the holidays in America until the 19th century. In the 20th century, as elves became firmly rooted in American Christmas lore, they eventually took center stage in



beloved holiday television specials, films and books. Don Clark was the artist and stamp designer. Antonio Alcalá was the art director. Four (58¢) forever special stamps, double-sided pane of 20.

Kwanzaa. This year the Postal Service issues its ninth stamp in celebration of Kwanzaa, a holiday with origins in ancient and modern first-harvest festivities from across the African continent. Kwanzaa incorporates and reimagines many communal traditions as a contemporary celebration and reaffirmation of African American culture. The stamp design depicts a girl and a boy dressed in robes akin to spiritual garments, with a kinara (candleholder) and seven lit candles



(mishumaa saba) in front of them. The kinara is the focal point around which friends and family gather and place meaningful objects. Art director Antonio Alcalá designed the stamp with original artwork by Erin Robinson. Single (58¢) forever special stamp, pane of 20.
