We are happy to report that HEADQUARTERS has 500 copies of this brochure just waiting to be mailed out first-come, first-serve so if you want a copy (Gentle reminder - here send in the requests. is your opportunity to jot down and send in those names (and addresses, of course, if known) of your buddies, those in your squad or section, etc .- the ones you've intended to send in right along but never got around to it.) In behalf of all who get a copy, we thank Willis D. Dickens (107, 112 & S-4 of Gp Hq as Major) who brought his 1945 original with him to the Soo reunion and Anton "Pops" Crnkovich (1940 to the 254) who took the original home with him and had it reproduced at no cost to the Association.

* * * REPORT FROM HEADQUARTERS * * *

Locating Ames T. Minor (Capt. and CO of Co. B 254) just prior to the 1966 reunion resulted in a real bonanza - 1945 name and address rosters of the 254th Bn. officers and his entire Company B. The assist in this case goes to (1st Sgt) William H. Davey, Negaunee, Mich. for reporting Bethlehem, Conn. as his old CO's present address. These two rosters resulted in another 125 new leads to work on! Fingers are crossed in the hope that somewheres along the line we will receive similar rosters (even with just bare names) on A. C and H&S of the 254 and the preceeding 107th Regt and Bn. If not, we continue to remain entirely dependent upon you guys to send in information - even a bare name sent in is a beginning - and don't just take it for granted that someone else has already sent in the name of so and so. Surprisingly, too, new addresses for the WWI 107th are still coming in from time to time these 'ol timers have done a real job on locating their comrades.

Since the last BS and prior to the Soo reunion our informational and "get acquainted" mailing has been sent to some 275 men of the old 522nd Engineer Combat Co. who, as many will recall, were Co F of the 112th Regt (and old 107th before that) when they were transferred out in N. IRELAND to be Combat Engineers for a Provisional outfit formed for the invasion of N. AFRICA - with SICILY and ITALY to follow for the 522nd who remained as such throughout hostilities. Thanks to rosters complete with 1945 addresses we successfully reached about 45% of the Company. The rosters were sent in by Lynn "Mac" McDonald and Duane H. White - an assist to these two for the many responses received from the 125 or so thus located. There was a sizeable group of 522nd registrants at the Soo who, from all indications, had a happy reunion (within a reunion) all of their own. Help! on the other 150.

The 107th Engrs. was formed at Camp MacArthur. Texas, on or about Sept. 18, 1917 with Colonel Paul Stanley Bond in command. The 1st Bn. was recruited and organized in N. Mich., the 2nd Bn in Wis. Only Co. A (later Co. E) existed prior to 1917. Its history dates back to the "Calumet Light Guard," organized in 1881, and redesignated Co H, Third Inf., Aug. 8, 1881. In Dec. 1891 it became Co D. Fifth Inf. When the volunteers for the Spanish-American War were organized at Island Lake in April and May, 1898, it became Co D, 34th Mich. Volunteer Infantry, and participated in battles in and around SANTIAGO, CUBA. In Dec. 1899, it became Co. E, Third Mich. Inf. On June 1, 1906, this company was transferred to the Corps of Engrs. and became Co. A, Corps of Engrs., Michigan National Guard. During the winter and spring of 1916-17, Co. A served on the Mexican Border at Camp Bliss, El Paso, Tex. Late in the spring of 1917, it guarded the locks at Sault Ste. Marie, Mich. In Oct. 1917, after detached service (camp construction work) at Camp Custer, Mich., the company entrained for Camp MacArthur, Texas, where it joined the 107 the Engrs. The men composing the 107th Engrs. were for the most part from the copper, coal & lumber regions. They were rough and hardy, well skilled in the use of engineer tools. Their early training stressed construction of roads, bridges and trenches. The regiment trained at Camp MacArthur until Jan. 2, 1918, when it was ordered to leave for embarkation at Hoboken, N. J. Arriving in BREST, FRANCE, Feb. 14, 1918, the regiment (less one company assigned to the Engr. School for demonstrating purposes) was employed in construction of cantonment areas until it entered the combat zone. On June 26, 1918, it rejoined the 32nd Division in the ALSACE defensive sector in the vicinity of BEL-FORT and remained with this division for the It took part in the folduration of the war. lowing offensives: MARNE-VESLE, OISE-AISNE, MEUSE-ARGONNE, and served with the Army of Occupation (east of the RHINE RIVER) from Dec. 1918 to May 1919. Embarkation for the U.S. was effected May 4, 1919. The regiment arrived in Philadelphia on May 18, 1919. After a few days at Camp Dix, it was moved to Camp Custer, Mich. where it was mustered out of the service on May 25, 1919. During WWI, the activities of the regiment were governed by the theory, which remained in effect in the U.S. Army and most foreign armies, that the engineers can be used to much better advantage behind the front units in the maintenance of routes of communications. While in division and corps reserve, the regiment continued its engineer operations. Its front line action was by small parties on raids, as wire cutting details, in the reconnaissance of the ground and attempted river crossings. Total casualties due to fire were less than 10% of its strength. The regiment was often left in the forward areas to continue with its engineering work after the remainder of the division was withdrawn to rest. But no matter what its duties, the 107th Engrs. performed them faithfully, bravely and efficiently, establishing a most admirable wartime record. More next issue!

Victor A. Coppo (Co A WWI, Detroit, via a special letter asked specifically to be remembered to his WWI comrades. In it he informs your editors that: "As a member of Co A, I happened to be one of the first Americans to crossthe International Bridge at ECHTERNACH, LUXEMBOURG on the 1st of Dec. 1918 being with Major Ganser's outfit at the time as Demolition Sgt. A few kilometers from the bridge, Major Ganser told us - see that light to the left a few miles away - well, thats where I was born. "Anymore WWI anecdotes? You send 'em, We'll print 'em! Providing they pass our Board of Censors!

Victor's bit of history immediately brings to mind the fact that once again here in LUXEM -BOURG we find parallel routes for the parent WWI outfit and the offspring 254th for it was just a short distance north of ECHTERNACH and west of ETTELBRUCK, LUXEMBOURG that the 254th made their very first crossing of the German border. To do so they first constructed a Cl. 40 timber bridge and approaches across the OUR RIVER at WALLENDORF, GERMANY and a Treadway Bridge with approaches at NIEDERGEGEN, GERMANY - this while attached to the 5th Armored Div . and under the direct control of the CO, 22nd Armored Engineer Bn. During the period 15-23 Sept. 1944, the 254 crossed into Germany over their own bridges in direct support of the armor, cleared mines from the German side and completed destruction of 43 massive pill boxes in the SIEGFRIED LINE. After retiring back across the OUR again the 254 was deployed infantry and repelled two enemy attempts to take or destroy the bridges. During this period the Bn. suffered 4 KIA's, 3 MIA's and 24 wounded. The enemy paid heavily including 102 prisoners taken by Co. B. Ironically, however, and a sad ending to this busy week, the enemy was finally successful in blowing both bridges - after the defense of same was taken over by an Infantry unit and the 254 was pulled out. That was one time a certain Combat outfit had its nose out of joint! There were many odd and interesting (now) facets about this particular week - any personal observations or experiences we can pass along in future issues?

Loveland was CG of the 46th Inf. antry Division (Mich. NG's) for which his old outfit in both wars, the 107th, who else, were Division Engineers. Lynn "Mac" McDonald (Co B 107, 522) retired last June from the 1437th Engineer Co. (Float Bridge) whose home station is the Soo. His post-war tour included service in the Korean War with the 1437th. Mac is our Past Vice-president and 1966 Chairman of the Reunion Committee.

That Richard T. Bussiere easily holds the long distance record for paying Association dues - all the way from Vietnam where he is now serving as a Captain in Advisory Team #99 following a tour of duty in Germany. Dick's military career began with Co B 107th NG's at Marquette, Michigan.
