Major Gen Ralph A. Loveland, one of the 107th's most illustrious soldiers, has departed from our ranks. The General, or "Bunny" as he was fondly but respectfully known particularly amongst his WWI compatriots, died at his home in Ann Arbor, Mich. on 5 Dec 1966 at 74 years of age. He was an Honorary Life Member of the 107th Engineer Association which he personally helped organize during the 1961 reunion in Marquette. It was appropriate, indeed, that he was the featured speaker for this initial and organizational convention of the Association. Although failing health made travel difficult, he also managed to attend the 1963 event in Ishpeming on a 'one-of-the-boys' basis. So far as we know the General was the only Association member whose active military career bridged the entire life span of the 107th Engrs. - from its counterparts of pre-WWI days to its CG of the post-WWII Nat. Guards era. Military funeral services were held 8 Dec in Ann Arbor with Co A 107th Signal Bn participating. The General had been in retirement since 1954 after a long military career dating back to 1915. Originally commissioned a 2nd Lt, Corps of Engrs after receiving an engineering degree from Mich. Tech University of Houghton, Mich. he rose through the various commissioned ranks to the grade of Brig Gen when he was selected to command the Mich Natl Guard in 1947 and appointed Presiding Officer of the Mich. State Military Board. He was promoted to Maj Gen on 8 June 48 climaxing more than 33 years of service in the Guards and Army of the U.S. Following duty on the Mexican Border in 1916 as a 2nd Lt under Gen. John J. Pershing he once again entered Federal service with the 107th Engrs in 1917. In Jan of 1918 he joined the AEF in Europe where he received the French Croix de Guerre for his participation in the AISNE-MARNE, OISE-AISNE, and MEUSE-ARGONNE engagements. Leaving service after WWI he was a vice-president of an oil firm

and a partner in a road construction company. Also, between wars, Gen Loveland rose from the grade of Major to Colonel and again led the 107th Engr Regt (32nd Inf. Div.) of the Mich. Natl. Guard into Federal service in Oct 1940. After training at Camps Beauregard and Livingston, the organization, then the 107th Engr Bn, was sent to N. Ireland early in 1942. In June of 1942 Gen. Loveland assumed the duties of Corps Engr. with the V Corps and later took command of the 345th Engrs in France. In 1945 he commanded the Supreme Hq. American Expeditionary Force Engr Construction Group under Gen Eisenhower. The General is survived by his wife, Helen; a daughter, Ellen; a brother, Kent; and a sister, Mrs. Harry Shepherd. Also surviving are many, many 107th members and veterans that had the pleasure and good fortune of serving with and under Gen. Loveland during his long, distinguished career.

RED FACE DEPARTMENT

In the last issue we reported upon the 'good soldiers' who continued their military careers via duty with the 107th Guards after WWII. And who did we unintentionally omit - no one but the present Bn Exec. namely Maj. Edwin K. Kohn - if you're going to goof, goof big is our motto. Anyway, after apologies to Ed, who left Calumet in 1940 with Co F and is recalled as our Sgt Major of the 2nd Bn under Maj. Robert Adams during the pine woods and bayous days, he took us off the hook - and didn't cancel his subscription to the BS either! Maj Kohn happened to be one of the many 107th boys on leave when the Regt was alerted for movement to Fort Dix, N.J. immediately after Pearl Harbor - and whose frantic efforts to rejoin their 107th units proved fruitless. At this time transfers were made from infantry regiments so the 107th could move out at full strength - and our highly trained engr specialists in turn were assigned to

32nd Div infantry outfits. Ed won his commission with the Crossed Rifles while 'Down Under' with the 32nd - although still a 'Ditch Digger' at heart, we'll bet, as witnessed by his return to the 107th after the war.

WALLENDORF EPISODE

More on the WALLENDORF, GERMANY and Battle of the Bridges as noted in Issue No. 2 thanks to Allen C. Scott (Co B 254) and Henry G. Ladd (Co A) of Bremerton, Wash. "Scotty", now of Traverse City, Mich. included this notation in a letter to HQ; "As some of the fellows will recall, I had a twin brother (Charlie) in the outfit, and he was reported killed in action while holding the bridge - I, of course, felt terrible until I found out he was still alive and OK - remember the date real well as Sept 15th was our birthday." From Henry: "The incident at WALLENDORF brings back memories. As a member of Co A, I helped to build the wooden bridge across the OUR RIVER. WALLENDORF was a spooky town - while working on the approaches to the bridge during the day we were in uncontested control of the town. At dusk, however, shots would start coming in at us, and we would come back to town the next morning thinking we would have to run the Krauts out, but would find no resistance. This continued until the Germans counterattacked hitting the 5th Armd Div very hard. There was also the story about a girl that frequently walked across the bridge - until someone figured out that her actions were tied in with German activity. Our outfit was concerned with keeping the enemy on the east side of the OUR and blow the bridge when it became apparent that all the elements of the 5th Armd were back across the river - that were going to make it back. I was a member of the demolition squad that was supposed to sneak up to the bridge in the morning under the German guns and blow it - to our surprise, and relief, the Germans beat us to it."

'LOCAL BOY' BREAKS BARRIER - NOW IN ORBIT

An announcement in Feb. informs us that Leonard C. Ward is a Colonel no longer. No sir! it is now Brigadier General Ward - and Assistant Commanding General of the 46th Inf. Div., Mich. NG, per appointment by Gov. George Romney. Tremendously exciting news to all of us that know and served with or under Gen. Ward! Interwoven with the hearty congratulations from many directions there is a great feeling of pride, too, over this outstanding accomplishment by one of the old 107th gang. As many will recall, Gen Ward entered Federal service on 15 Oct 1940 as a 2nd Lt. with Co. A (Escanaba Co.) then commanded by Capt. Loren W. Jenkins. Serving with the 107th and 112th Regt. in N. Ireland and England and eventually specializing in military intelligence, he was assigned to 1121st Engr. Gp. Hq. when Regt'l. Hq. of the 112th was redesignated the 1121st in 1943. As a Major he served as Group S-2 with distinction throughout the long trek from England to Pilsen, Czechoslovakia. Following a very brief tour as a civilian after war's end he rejoined the 107th on 10 Dec 46 when the Bn. was reactivated under the command of Lt Col William F. Milford. After assignments as Bn S-3 and Exec Off he was promoted to Bn CO, and subsequently Lt Col, and served in that capacity from 1951 to 1959. A promotion to full Col followed his assignment as 46th Inf Div G-3 in Lansing. During this assignment with Div Hq something new was added in the form of Mrs. Ward after the Gen. joined the matrimonial ranks as a raw recruit. Active duty was the next step in 1962, with the assignment as NG representative with the Deputy Chief of Staff for Operations, Dept of Army, in Washington, D.C. And here, too, not losing sight of his rear guard position in the marital echelon, he engineered his way up to the main body by attaining the grade of fatherhood - with support from the flanks by Mrs. Ward and new son. We are happy to report, also, that the then Col. Ward attended the very first reunion in 1961 whereupon he was elected one of the charter officials of the infant Association. As Association Historian, we can thank him for many of the facts and figures available for BS publication. Speaking unofficially but confidentially for every reader of the BS - a sincere well done and continued success, General Ward.

About a foot of snow on the ground and cold and hungry. The station was a half mile from the little town and we formed up and marched into town under 2nd Lt. C. W. Ball, the only officer on the train. The mayor had to make a speech of welcome and I had to explain that he would have to make it all over again when the Big Shots showed up which was after dark. However, the Town Major, an old French Sgt., had billets for all hands and served us hot soup in no time at all - and some Pea Soup Frenchman from Sault Ste. Marie, Mich. found a barrel of wine - and all hands made merry." Those present at the 2nd Annual in the Soo will long remember Col. Ball's talents as an after dinner speaker. Col Ball and Michigan Governor Swainson all at one reunion - good show, that!

FAREWELL RETIREMENT PARTY FOR MR. 107th

1st Sgt "Bing" Boberg, actually Yngve H. which will come as a surprise to many, was the guest of honor at a distinctively military style farewell party in late Feb. to commemorate his retirement from the military. Present and former Guardsmen gathered in Calumet, the Sarge's home town, to pay tribute to the widely known topkick after his completion of a 30 year military career that began with the 107th Guards of Calumet in 1937. After a 'time out' consisting of a five year tour of active duty with the 107th, 112th and 254th (who else) as 1st Sgt. and Bn. Sgt. Major, Bing picked up where he left off by rejoining the Guards again in 1946 - in his old familiar role as topkick. He retired with the distinction of being the 107th NG's longest serving member.
