For the first time since its organization, the 107th Engineer Association will hold its annual meeting and reunion in a big city. The city, of course, is Detroit where two companies (H&S and Co C) of the World War II 107th originated. After seven meetings in the Upper Peninsula of Michigan, some 80 veterans of the 107th and its counterparts (of both wars) are eager to plan and host a reunion "downstate". Since Detroit was picked as the convention city for 1968, the reunion committee has already set the wheels in motion for a big time in the big town. The dates are Friday, Saturday and Sunday, August 9, 10 & 11th. The place will be the lavish Statler-Hilton Hotel in downtown Detroit - noted for the wonderful job they do for events such as our own conventions. Those of you who attended past reunions in the Upper Peninsula remember well the wonderful times we had at those seven meetings. Wait until 1968 and see what the "Detroit crowd" will have to offer! In choosing the Statler-Hilton Hotel as the headquarters for all reunion activities, the committee in charge feels that "everything under one roof" will be both convenient and enjoyable. We have been assured by the hotel management that they will go out of their way to help us enjoy their facilities, the reunion and Detroit. You will be amazed at the reasonable room rates at the Statler (\$10 single, \$15 double, \$17 twin and no charge for children regardless of age, when they occupy parents room). If you want to fly in, the airport limousine will take you directly to the hotel's front door. By auto, the expressways lead directly to downtown Detroit - there is no danger of getting lost on your way to the Statler and the hotel offers free parking facilities for its overnight guests. The committee has arranged with the hotel management to set aside a block of rooms for our members. Complete information will be sent to you in the annual reunion notice scheduled for mailing next April. In the mean-

time, keep August 9, 10 & 11 in mind - we don't want any AWOL's when the order is given to "fall in".

ASSOCIATION LOSES KEY OFFICIAL

While it is the painful duty of the BULL SHEET to report deaths as they become known, it has been our policy not to write obituaries - talent and space both lacking! Exceptions there will be from time to time, of course, and once again we depart thus to report with heavy heart the passing of Henry E. Warth of Marquette, Mich. on 14 Sept 1967 at age 73. Henry was at the time, so far as we know, the ranking member, service wise, of the 107th by virtue of having served on the Mexican Border back in 1916 followed by WWI service in Co A 107th as Supply Sgt. His intense interest and participation in veteran's organizations, including County and State Red Arrow Associations, throughout the years were brought to a climax with the formation of the 107th Engr Association - he expressed himself so both verbally and physically in many ways, many times. Henry was our Charter Treasurer during the crucial two formative years of '61 and '62, publicity man at times, our reunion photographer and a member of the Board of Directors when his number was called. Unofficially, he promoted Association affairs in countless ways digging in with vigor, enthusiasm and great common sense - always in a quiet, unassuming manner so characteristic of Henry. He was rightfully proud of a perfect reunion attendance record accompanied by his wife, Louise, who survives. Honorary pall bearers at internment in Marquette included: John D. Morrison, Francis X. Matthews, Oral J. LaCombe and Lloyd Buckmaster - all 107th vets of WWI and Henry's close personal friends of long standing. Also participating at graveside ceremonies was a volunteer firing squad composed of 107th Engr Guardsmen. Henry E. Warth - a grand Combat Engineer who will be sorely missed!

A SALUTE TO (1st Sgt) LYNN MC DONALD

A prior issue announced briefly the retirement of Lynn "Mac" McDonald from the Mich Guards; or more specifically, from the 1437th Engr Float Br Co stationed at Sault Ste. Marie, Mich. (which is attached to the 107th Guard Bn for training & administration). Since then, Mac, and his distinguished military career, were recognized at a retirement dinner in his honor engineered and attended by a composite group of WWII, NG and Association buddies, local dignitaries and even MC'd by a WWI 107th; namely, "Moose" LaCombe. Spanning some 26 years it all began when Mac joined the local Soo NG company, then Co B 107th Engr C Regt, in Sept 1940. He remained with the outfit throughout Louisiana, Fort Dix and North Ireland until Co F 112th shipped out of Glasgow, Scotland as the engr unit for a Reg'l Combat Team, Africian Invasion Force, which landed at Algiers in Nov 42. He served in all the major Mediterranean campaigns with the Company, later redesignated the 522nd Engr C Co until his discharge in late 1945 at wars' end. The post war Soo unit, reorganized in May 46 as Co B 107 Engr C Bn and looking for experienced combat engineers, enlisted a good one named Lynn McDonald. The Company, having by then been redesignated the 1437th Treadway Bridge Co. in late 49, was inducted into Federal service in Aug 50, shipped to Fort Lewis, Wash. with Lt Willard Littlefield (also Co B 107, Co F 112 & 522) commanding, and departed for Korea in Jan 51 for 15 months active duty in that conflict. This tour was completed in 1952 and Tech Sgt Mac was discharged for the second time. Again the Soo unit was reorganized in Feb 53; this time as the 1437th Engr Float Br Co. Mac's next tour of duty began in Oct 56 when the Company was commanded by Capt Sam Dubow (presently Maj Dubow of Hq 107th NG's). Mac officially retired on 14 Oct 66 as 1st Sgt of the 1437th; Capt Edward Leask Commanding. One of the real backbones of the Association right from the very start, Mac did yeoman duty on the Soo reunion committee in 1962, later "promoted" to Vice-Pres. and Reunion Chairman for the 1966 Soo maneuvers and at present serves on our Board of Directors. In addition to his official Association duties he has been a tremendous aid locating 522nd vets and promoting that group into active Association participation. Our compliments and congratulations both, Mac - with the reminder there is no length of service retirement out of the Association!

Of special significance to the writer was the passing of Ralph E. Soper (H&S & Hq 254) - who buttoned up shelter halves together many times. Well known throughout the Battalion by virtue of his duties and skills as Bn Construction Sgt, many will recall that he was commissioned in the field (Belgium) by Col Loren Jenkins and finished up with the 254 as a 1st Lt. Although he was a native of the Upper Peninsula, Ralph migrated to Chicago after the war where he ran a carpenter shop. He frequently returned to the North Country however, to enjoy a cottage he built on Lake Gogebic. Death resulted from a self-inflicted gun shot during a period of dispondency. Insofar as is known, Ralph was unmarried.

* * CIVILIAN OVERSEAS TOUR * *

Question for you ETO vets: "Interested in making a trip back to Europe?" Question for wives of ETO vets: "Interested in accompanying hubby on a European jaunt?" Well, in case its slipped your minds, June 6, 1969, will be the 25th anniversary of the landing on Normandy beaches. Although memorial services have been held on the beach each year, rumbles are heard that the 25th will be extra special meaning the invasion will be reenacted, relived and memorialized by great numbers of WWII, and WWI vets, servicemen from many countries. Most of us are aware that chartered flights and tours are laid out and available to organized groups such as our own 107th Association. For example, here is one such tour entitled "Special D-Day Anniversary Tour" offered by Air France during 1967 - as a result of some recon work by Donald "Duke" Duquette. June 1/New York - depart New York via Air France jet; June 2/London - arrive London; afternoon tour of old city; June 3/London - morning tour of West End; afternoon free; June 4/Newbury - to Southern England; visit Windsor Castle; June 5/Southampton; visit staging area locations in Southern England; overnight steamer to Le Harve; June 6/Caen - tour invasion beaches; attend anniversary ceremonies; June 7/Caen -tour of Normandy; June 8/Paris - motor to Paris; afternoon city tour; June 9/Paris - morning tour of modern Paris; afternoon free; June 10/Paris - morning free; afternoon tour to Versailles; June 11/Reims - through Belleau Woods, Soissons, to Reims; June 12/Bastogne - into Battle of the Bulge areas; June 13/Bastogne - tour of Battle of the Bulge sectors; June 14/Eidhoven - through Belgium into Holland; June 15/Eidhoven - full day tour of central Holland; June 16/Eidhoven - free day for independent activities; June 17/Amsterdam -afternoon tour of Amsterdam; June 18/Amsterdam - day at leisure for individual choices; June 19/New York - depart Amsterdam via Paris for New York. All-inclusive price from New York - \$711.00 per person which includes air travel, ground transportation, hotels, meals, transfers, sight seeing tours, tips and taxes, baggage costs and tour directors. The fare does not include; passports, visas, airport taxes, excess baggage charges, items not on the table d'hote menus, laundry, liquors, beverages with luncheons or dinners and any other expenses of a personal nature. Such a charter for an Association group would necessarily require a great deal of planning and coordination by Headquarters - but we're game to have a go at it if you are. Several have already indicated great interest - even to the extent of going in hock to make such a trip

so we already know, in the present talking stage, that a minimum group of 15 might easily be worked up. So, for a starter, Headquarters will need a written expression of your desire to participate - pronto, so we can get some idea whether or not to pursue the matter further.
