Context

The northern Iraqi city of Mosul, the historic home of the Assyrian capital, Nineveh, and in continuous habitation ever since the seventh century AD, was Iraq's most culturally diverse and inclusive city for centuries. In the aftermath of ISIS warfare and extensive destruction between 2014 and 2017, the old city lost not only many of its historic sites, institutions, and fabric, but, more critically, many communities and minority groups were displaced. Once a centre of culture and trade, much of that rich culture, heritage, traditions, and crafts are endangered and at risk of irreversible disappearance.

The Research project Preserving the Disparaging Cultural Heritage of Post-War Mosul has been undertaken with the aim of contributing to the documentation and preservation of Mosul's disappearing cultural heritage. It seeks to implement a strategic approach to revive local traditions and reactivate the cultural heritage of the old city through memorialisation, preservation and dissemination of shared heritage as a catalyst for sustainable socioeconomic mobilisation of the heritage economy. For around two years, through community engagement and co-creation workshops with local communities, the project team has been working on researching and documenting places of memories as well as recording and analysing the memories of heritage practices, festivities and crafts that used to define the preconflict society of Mosul.

Evolving outcomes of the project demonstrate that the people of Mosul, once again, embark on a journey of rebuilding, recovery and reclaiming their memory. Not ready to abandon their cultural diversity or tolerance, they wake up every morning more determined to preserve local traditions, architecture, history, and culture. This event is designed, curated, and dedicated to analysing, recording, sharing and learning about this monumental and collective resistance, resilience and relentless effort to preserve and rebuild Mosul's most celebrated values, identity and spirit.

Event Plan

This event is a gathering of carefully selected speakers with specialist research interests, experience and scholarship on Mosul and Iraq's cultural heritage. It focuses on presenting and discussing heritage management, recovery efforts and challenges in the country to conclude with useful lessons and innovative plans for preserving the country's heritage. Also, the event includes celebrating and disseminating the outcomes of the two-year-long UK-Iraq collaborative work on exploring and recording the cultural heritage of Mosul.

This is a 3-day event. The first day will be of two sections. The first section will focus on tracing the history of Iraq and Mosul and their rich tangible and intangible heritage. The second section will include delivering talks demonstrating the present standing of cultural heritage in Iraq and Mosul, and the challenges that face the preservation of the country's traditions and historic assets due to decades of conflicts and instability.

The second day will be of two sections as well. The first section will include delivering talks by pioneering researchers working on research studies and excavation missions in Iraq and the Middle East with aim of presenting ongoing efforts to preserve the history of this region and concluding lessons for future efforts. The second section will focus on presenting the research project *Preserving the Disappearing Cultural Heritage of Post-War Mosul*. It will include presenting the undertaken research work by the project team and its novel outcomes. This session will conclude with presenting and discussing the project's outputs and exploring future collaboration opportunities. This day will conclude with a private opening and reception of the exhibition: *The Afterlife of War: Capturing Everyday Culture and Heritage of Old Mosul*.

The third day of the event will involve the formal opening of the Mosul exhibition. This is a month-long exhibition that will be on display as a companion to the British Museum's Ancient Iraq Exhibition at The Lakeside Museum at the University of Nottingham. This event will conclude with a talk delivered by Professor Mohamed Gamal Abdelmonem, NTU-CAUGH lead and the project PI, entitled *Hearing the silence of Old Mosul: uncovering disappearing spaces and sounds of culture and tradition of a historic Iraqi city.*
