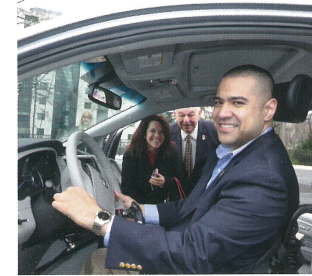
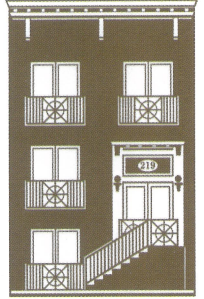


For over 50 years, the Garibaldi-Meucci Museum has been a vital part of relating the Italian American experience to visitors.

Sons of Italy Foundation®
