OVERNIGHT COLESLAW

12 cups shredded cabbage (1 medium head)
1 green pepper, chopped
1 medium red onion, chopped
2 carrots, shredded
1 cup sugar
DRESSING:
2 tsp. sugar
1 tsp. dry mustard
1 tsp. celery seed
1 tsp. salt
1 c. vinegar
¾ c. vegetable oil

In a large bowl, combine first four ingredients. Sprinkle with sugar; set aside. In a saucepan, combine dressing ingredients; bring to a boil. Remove from the heat and pour over vegetables, stirring to cover evenly. Cover and refrigerate overnight. Stir well before serving. Yield 12-16 servings.

ATMOSPHERIC [Compiled June 16-20]

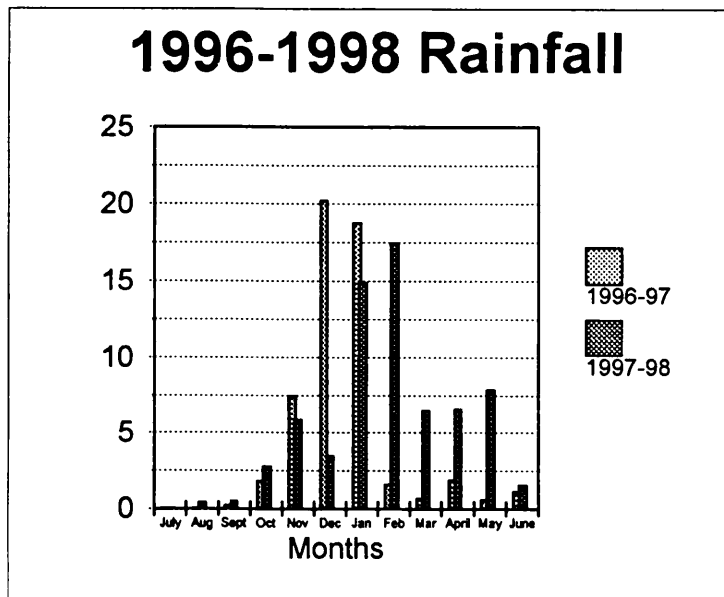
Peculiar Weather don't you think? Just think in a few more days it will be

Summer, by the calendar anyway. On day 21, at 7:13 a.m., Pacific Standard Time, of this month, we will experience the Summer Solstice for the 1,998 year of this Millennium. That puts us mighty close to year 2000 and the beginning of the New Millennium. Or does the New Millennium begin with the Calendar year of 2001? We have at least a year and a half to figure it out and I'm confident someone will. Let's take a look at how this year compared with 1996-97. This graph represents the past 12 months as well as the weather year of 1996-1997. The weather year for '97-'98 ends June 30. There is not much rain predicted for the rest of June that is now 10 days away.

It is so nice to see the bright Sun out and about these days it has been long time in coming. I think the one of the weather prognosticators indicated that we had 101 days of rain this year. I haven't counted the number for our part of the World. One thing is certain; we did get our fair share — 67.67 inches of the wet stuff to date. This is one of our record years. 1994-1995 gave us 72.08 inches that was second best. Our record year was 1982-1983 with 81.77 inches. [Please remember these are my findings for the past 25 years only]. The official measurements published by the *Mountain Democrat* shows the year 1890 with 78.13 inches as the most rainfall recorded "From files of the

Mountain Democrat and Pacific Gas and Electric Company." Our rainfall average has been about 10% higher at this location than in Placerville.

ASTRONOMIC
We begin this episode with a **BANG**. This is not your ordinary Big Bang but a serious Bang. It is being touted as being on the scale of the Bang, which



one theory claims, as the of the beginning of our Universe. According to an article in the March edition of *Smithsonian*, by John P. Wiley, JR., "Whether caused by colliding neutron stars or something else, gamma ray bursts release in 15 seconds more energy than the Sun will over ten billion years." Or to put it another way, than the Sun will release in its ten billion year lifetime. *The Christian Science Monitor*, in an article by Peter N. Spotts gave a more up to date report which gave better details as to direction and distance. The Bang has been traveling for about 15 billion years from the very edge of our known Universe in the direction of the Big Dipper. The afterglow was picked up by the Hubble Space Telescope and telescopes in Arizona and Hawaii. (Incidentally, this glow was traveling at the speed of light or something like 6 trillion miles per second for all of those 15 billion years).

Because Summer with its bright skies came upon us so dramatically and we had no sky view to work with for so long, the following are some of the wonders you might like look for now that the clouds have gone: Vega Altair and Antares are the bright stars easily seen in the almost overhead view after 11:00 PM. and are in the Eastern half of the sky. Arcturus and Antares are to the West. Antares is the giant red star in the body of Scorpius in the southern part of the sky. These are all naked eye objects. The Summer Constellations of special note in the Southern sky are Scorpius and Sagitarius. Near Sagitarius there are at least 10 star clusters and globular clusters visible with field glasses. The Milky Way, of which we are a part, is about halfway from the horizon to the zenith in the eastern sky.

The Moon will be Full on the 9th of July and it might be nice to see it again. Jupiter will become a viewable object later in the month and Saturn will be also in the southeastern sky and should be very visible by month's end. Some information from *Sky and Telescope*.

Others may have different opinions, and the political process will allow the board to change again in February '99, in the meantime work with us and make constructive suggestions and together maybe we can do things better. We welcome you to our meetings and I hope to use the gavel much less in the next meeting.

We now have a new secretary, Deborah Arsenych who began on June 1st. We have hired an outside accountant to do the monthly financial and budget reports for us, we're getting both services done within our budget for what we used to pay the sec./treas. Welcome Deborah.

The road committee, Jim Sykowny, Barbara Mikel and Barbara Atkins are spending many hours marking the roads, preparing for bids. Jim Sykowny's 3 year experience shows in the way the potholes are marked (and by the way, Jim had a quadruple bypass around May 1st, now that is a volunteer for you). I know we are all anxious this year to get the roads done as soon as possible. We would like to spend some money on painting and repairing fences, but need to see road bids first.

The financial statement for the year ending 2-28-98 has been mailed to all of our members. The next board meeting is August 8th at 9 am at the fire station. We may need a special meeting before then to discuss the road bids. A notice will be posted on the bulletin boards. Please read on for the secretary's report of the June 13th SCPOA Board meeting.

MEETING REPORT

I would like to say something first before I get started. My name is Deborah Arsenych and I will be writing

an article for the *Mosquito Byte* every time there is a regular meeting of SCPOA. My intent is to give you important information discussed at the meetings, not a minute by minute detailed description of what happens. If you are interested in what transpires at these meetings, please come. It's your SCPOA.

The regular meeting of SCPOA was held on Saturday, June 13, 1998 at the Mosquito Fire House. Attending Board members were Debbie Harris, Sharon Hern, Barbara Mikel, Jim Sykowny and Jo Thomas. Deborah H. Arsenych, Secretary, was present. There were 16 other members and non-members present.

John Warden is the new CPA for SCPOA. He will be generating monthly reports, and reconciling the bank accounts, as well as performing other accounting functions.

The annual audit review of the financial statements for the fiscal year 1997-98 were completed by Karl F. Gunther, Jr. and it was approved by the board.

Delinquent Accounts were discussed. Last month there were 82 members not current with their assessments. By June 13 the number had dropped to 36. A total of \$16,095.90 is owed in assessments, collection costs, and interest from past years to the present.

COMMITTEE REPORTS:

Before the committee reports were given a question was put to the Board by Brian Martin about the road conditions and how a vendor is selected to repair the roads. Jim Szkowny responded and a discussion began. Barbara Mikel suggested that a proposal be made to have competitive bidding.

Airport Committee: We have approximately \$500.00 in the budget to spend on maintaining the Airport. How the money is spent will be discussed at future meetings.

Architectural Committee: Sharon Hern approved a set of plans for Rob Kirkpatrick on Swansboro Road.

Budget & Long Range Plan: Roads and Insurance are our largest expenses.

Bylaws & DC&R's: A letter was written from the owner of lot 652 concerning complaints made against him. The

letter will be turned over to the lawyer for a response.

A discussion was held on the resolution made to the DC&R's that referred to having to make all complaints in writing. Sharon Hern will research the resolution and get back to the board.

Several suggestions were made on how the association should handle violators of the DC&R's. A proposal will be written by Lionel Rogers within 30 days and presented to the board at the August meeting.

Common Areas: Barbara Atkins will write an article for the *Mosquito Byte* restating that the common areas belong to every member.

Fences: Fences are in need of repair. No major repairs have been done to them in the last 10 years. In the long range plan it was suggested that we replace the fencing by setting up a reserve account. In the meantime the fences need to be power washed and painted. A quote to Debbie Harris from Terri O'Neill was \$1.10 a linear foot. SCPOA doesn't have the money to do all of the fencing at this time but a start would be around Dyer Lake and Trout Pond. Nothing will be decided upon until the quote from the roads is reviewed, since it comes from the same budget. It was suggested that Lucky, our maintenance person, is covered by the insurance and is able to repair the fences. At the next meeting we should have a proposal for the fences.

Roads: The roads were the main concern for all members at the meeting. They will be repaired in the order of the amount of traffic that each road encounters. With the main roads having top priority, the interconnecting roads being done next and the cul-de-sac repair work done last. Work should begin in August.

Legal: A discussion was held on the impending legal action. On September 4, 1998 the State of California Worker's Compensation Appeals Board will be hearing the case of Jim George vs. Swansboro Country Property Owners Association. The members will be notified as soon as there is a final decision.

OLD BUSINESS

Proposed School Site: The association has not been notified yet of a potential

school site. The association is in the process of setting up a meeting with Dr. Helms on this issue in order to make sure that if property is selected within Swansboro that they are aware of the DC&R's. There is no deadline for the site selection and the projected date of the school opening has been set for the 2000. As soon as the association knows something, the members will be informed.

Contract for Collection of delinquent accounts. Accounts have been turned over to Cimmeron Collections Agency.

Status of the Gallagher account: The Gallaghers will be billed for the legal expenses and the account will be handled as any other delinquent account.

NEW BUSINESS:

It was suggested that a way be found so that volunteers could work at the airport. At this time our insurance policy does not cover volunteers who work on common property. It was suggested that we could have a planned week-end for volunteer work and obtain extra insurance to cover that event. SCPOA will check into the Liability Insurance to see exactly what the policy says about volunteers and how much it will cost.

FROM THE FLOOR:

A letter was submitted by Jim George for Cheri Aspenleiter to serve on the SCPOA Nominating Committee. It was accepted for review. Debbie Harris will look into the procedure of the Nominating Committee and have information at the next meeting.

The next Regular Board Meeting will be on August 8, 1998.

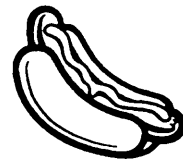
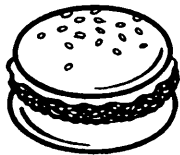
