## Quiet summer ----- so far !!!

So far this summer has been a rather quiet one. We have not had a single wildland fire in the district. On the 6<sup>th</sup> we were dispatched to provide mutual aid to the U. S. Forest Service for a wildland fire at Mosquito Road and Sand Mountain Boulevard. It wasn't much of a fire and was quickly contained.

Even though we have had some days where the temperature has been well over 100 degrees the relative humidity has remained high. The lowest humidity we have had so far has been 17%, but the average has been in the mid 30% range. From a fire hazard stand point that has been good as it is more difficult for a fire to start and if it does the rate of spread is a little slower.

September is the critical month for us. Historically it is the time when large fires develop either in our district burning things up or usually in the Kelsey area and then burning things up. September and October are usually bad due to the ground fuels being as dry as they can possible get and to the changes in weather. With the coming of fall and winter the weather patterns become a little more active with higher and more erratic wind conditions. Often it is possible to get wind that either comes straight out of the north or even worse out of the east. The north winds are hot and can be gusty making it easy for a fire to start and even worse to contain. However, it is the east winds that really provide erratic fire behavior. They usually come from off the Nevada desert and as they come down the west side of the Sierra Nevada they pick up speed and compress becoming hot and extremely dry.

About ten years ago in December we had an east wind that even though it was not very hot was extremely dry. This wind had dropped the humidity in this area down to around 4%. The velocity of the wind was clocked at Bald Mountain by Georgetown at over 110 miles per hour and was probably doing around 80 in our area. A tree was blown over into some power lines starting a fire on Stope Drive. It was a very frustrating fire to fight due to the high winds pushing the fire in every direction and blowing down trees every where.

Any spark could have the potential of creating a large fire destroying hundreds of acres and many homes. During this

time of the year our focus on training at the fire department is on suppressing wildland fires and protecting structures. Each one of us is constantly aware and has the attitude that every fire from the size of a match head up is a 10,000 acre fire. The potential is definitely there so we go after them very aggressively with as many resources as possible and hope that we can get them contained before they do reach a massive size such as 10,000 acres.

We all have to be very cautious with everything we do outside now. Please beware that a spark could be caused by many reasons and could be capable of starting a fire that could be devastating. So be careful as you are working around your yards, cutting fire wood, checking your house heating appliances, even getting ready for hunting, or the many other things that we do.

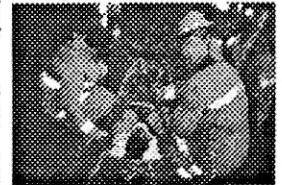
## Mosquito Firefighters well trained!

Most of you are aware that our firefighters have "formal" training at least four times a month, every Tuesday night, and often again on one Saturday a month. The training team of Chief Leo Chaloux, Captain Pat Keene, and Captain Devery Minor endeavor to train on everything that could possibly occur in our District. Recently, Captains Devery and Pat put together a scenario for training that we all fear, but we all know is likely to happen, that is an "over the bank" vehicle accident.

In this training exercise, victims Leslie Keene and Orval Minor were traveling along Rock Creek Road, lost control of their vehicle and went "over the bank". Leslie was trapped in the vehicle, now on it's top, and Orval was thrown from the vehicle. To make the scene as real as possible, an actual wrecked vehicle that is on it's top off of Rock Creek Road was used and Leslie and Orval were "made up" with fake blood, torn clothing, dirt, protruding bones, and the like, all possible because of the Fire Department's purchase of a medical trauma "moulage" (makeup) kit. To make it even more real, the scenario was kept a total secret, even from the Chief!

At the end of the exercise, every firefighter proclaimed that it was the most real training exercise they had every experienced. They were exhausted, having had to extricate one victim, try to save the life of another, and then use their low angle rescue training to haul the victims up an embankment. As you can see, the rescue was successful!



## A good crunchy bread

Another Marshall Hospital Cook Book winner. I make these and they freeze well. Nice to take out to slice if your have people over for coffee.

### COCONUT BRUNCH BREAD

- 4 eggs
- 2 c. sugar
- 1 c. salad oil
- 2 tsp. coconut flavoring
- 3 c. flour
- ½ tsp. baking soda
- ½ tsp. baking powder
- ½ tsp. salt
- ½ c. buttermilk
- ½ c. Angel Flake coconut
- 1 c. chopped nuts

Beat eggs, sugar, salad oil and flavoring until light and fluffy. Alternate dry ingredients with buttermilk. Add coconut and nuts. Put into two greased and floured loaf pans or 1 prepared Bundt pan or 6 mini loaf pans. Bake at 325° for 50 minutes

#### Glaze:

- 1 c. sugar
- ½ c. water
- 2 Tbsp. butter
- 1 tsp. coconut flavoring

Boil first 3 ingredients for 5 minutes. Remove from heat and add coconut flavoring; pour over warm bread. Cool 4 hours before removing from pan/pans.

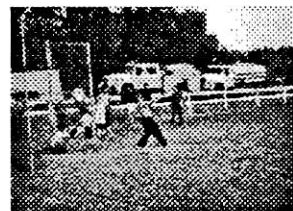

## Finnon Lake projects move forward

Please let me apologize up front. If there are areas in this column that seem a little vague to you, it's because all my Finnon Lake Planning Committee notes are on my desk at work, instead of here at home where I need them!

And, it's all good news, even though it still moves slowly. The Community Action Plan process has been started, with the sending out of a *Request for Bids* to several consultants. Debbie Minor is coordinating this process and we have also established a partnership with the Swansboro Country Property Owners Association, who will be working with us throughout.

We have received a waiver of fees for the road crossing permit needed to cross Rock Creek Road from where our water meter is located. We will be working with the road repair contractor hired by SCPOA to see if they can do the road crossing for us when they are here repairing Swansboro roads. So the waterline to the resort is within reach!

And another great piece of news! The Division of Safety of Dams has officially granted our request to extend the requirement to repair or breach the dam a full year to October, 1999. We have lined up an engineer who is willing to engineer the project and the Operating Engineers have committed to do the work.

We also have a commitment from an attorney to work for us, pro bono, especially on the wording for the permanent concessionaire contract. The interim contract expires on 12/31/98 and prior to that we will be soliciting *Request for Proposals* from any interested party.

But, as I've said before, this all takes an enormous amount of time so we must be patient. Nothing critical is standing in our way at this point and we are all looking forward to watching each progressive accomplishment come to fruition.

Our next Finnon Lake Planning Committee meeting will be held on Sunday, September 20<sup>th</sup>, at 6:00 p.m. at the Firehouse.

## What's it like outside?

### ATMOSPHERIC

It is difficult for me to start out admitting that I made a mistake in my last article for the July Edition of the *Mosquito Byte*. You see, light does travel at a speed of approximately 186,000 miles per second. This would multiply out to about 6 trillion miles per year not per second as stated. The reason I remember this is that it is close to our national debt figure that is about 6 trillion *DOLLARS*, plus or minus a few billion. I simply got the time wrong by a few billion or trillion miles. Please accept my apologies.

The 30th of June being the last day of the 97-98 Weather year there are a few loose ends that need to be mentioned. The rainfall for the season starting July 1, 1997 and ending June 30, 1998 was 67.67 inches. My neighbors, Ellen and Don Penrod, registered the same amount for the same period of time. It is really nice to have some back up on ones figures now and then. By the way the *Mountain Democrat* for August 13, 1998, showed their total for the season 97-98 as 60.72 inches of rain. This is the 10% difference between us Mountain

Folks and those who live nearer the "Flatlands." The following is a comparison of the last two years of rainfall.

There was a report that to June 13 there had been 102 days of rain for the season. Somehow it seemed it rained every day and night too.

At any rate the rains dried up and the heat arrived with a vengeance. There was a statement made by a high official in our government that this was the hottest July in History. What History? G.D. Fahrenheit (1686 1736 AD.) didn't design the scale for a thermometer until sometime between the above dates. The month of July dates back to the Roman Empire more than 2000 years ago. Our Calendar (the Julian Calendar) was adopted sometime in the fifteenth century AD. when July and August were added to the

Calendar that put us back on schedule with our orbit around the Sun. This was a worthwhile activity as the old calendar was turning up with Christmas in July, instead of December.

### ASTRONOMIC

We seem to be having a run on movies about Asteroids in the past few months. The latest being *Armageddon* which has some pretty outrageous special effects. (At least it will keep you from falling asleep.) Back in May, the Movie *Deep Impact* was the thriller of for our Spring enjoyment. In each case our great knowledge and scientific expertise enabled mankind not only to destroy the comet or asteroid that threatened us but to survive the results of the impact.

What does history tell us? According to *June 1998* issue of *Popular Science Magazine*: under the heading of "Greatest Hits (and Near Misses)" Fragments of a Comet may have created 5 large impact craters and led to mass extinction in the Northern Hemisphere which could have ended life on Earth at the end of the Triassic period *214 million years ago*. *65 million years ago an asteroid* left a huge crater in the Yucatan Peninsula and may have wiped out the dinosaur at the end of the Jurassic Period.

50,000 years ago a rock 150 feet in diameter blew a hole in the Arizona landscape near Flagstaff. It is known as the *Arizona Crater*. In 1908 an asteroid blew apart over the Tunguska Valley in Siberia, flattening trees in the region for miles around its impact point. In 1994 fragments from the Comet Shoemaker-Levy collided with Jupiter that is a distant planet in our Solar System.

You have probably guessed that the likelihood of the Earth being hit by one of these Near-Earth objects is not promising. There is a world wide net of observers keeping watch for any intrusion into our "Airspace." The best guess is Asteroid 1997 XF11 which is estimated to swing by us at a distance of 600,000 miles in 2028 AD. (*Sky and Telescope*, July 1998).

Just in case you are feeling low because you didn't get to take that pleasure cruise you had planned to take.

Consider the following: The Earth rotates on its Axis at about 650 miles per hour (1000 mph at the Equator). It revolves around the Sun at 18.6 miles per second or 6,696,000 mph. The Sun and its Solar System is moving toward the Constellation of Hercules at some 20 mps or 46,800 mph. We are traveling with our Sun for a total of 150 miles per second or 540,000 miles per hour. Does anyone have a desire to get off and walk? I haven't totaled up these figures. You are certainly welcome to do so. All I can say is that we are moving toward somewhere at a very rapid pace.

The Sun is about to come to its highest outbursts in its eleven year cycle and will be returning to normal in 5.5 years. Jupiter is the brightest object in the sky as it rises and is very viewable around 9:00 PM. Mars and Venus are in the ENE sky for you to check. It is nice out in the open spaces to look out and into the beautiful late Summer skies.

### August 1, 1998 Board of Directors Meeting

A motion was made and seconded to give speaking time at the beginning and the end of each meeting to members, with a 2 minute limit per person and a total time limit of 15 minutes. It was passed unanimously by the board members.

Frank Mosbacher, with the Forest Service, came to inform residents of the Rural Assistance grant given to the Mosquito Area to prepare a Community Action Plan. It is a \$15,000.00 grant intended for the hiring of a consultant to inquire within the community, by way of meetings and questionnaires, what the people see in the future for the Mosquito/Swansboro Area. Once a plan is in place the Mosquito/Swansboro Area can apply for other grants to help fund new projects. SCPOA and the Mosquito Volunteer Fire Department will be working together in Pursuing a Community Action Plan.

The Treasurer's report was given. More of a break down in the Financial Statements is needed.

The Delinquent Accounts report was given. It was suggested that all Delinquent Accounts be identified with a number to respect the privacy of the different parties.

### COMMITTEE REPORTS

**Airport Committee:** Jo Thomas, Chairperson. At this time there is an untouched balance of \$518.00 in the budget. Some of the weeds around the strip have been sprayed by maintenance. A committee meeting will be scheduled.

**Architectural Review Committee:** Jim Szykowny, Chairperson. Nothing to report at this time.

**Budget & Long Range Plan Committee:** Barbara Mikel & Jo Thomas, Co-Chairpersons. The committee is working on a plan to allocate funds to a reserve account for the roads and fence repair.

**By-Laws & DC&R's Committee:** Debbie Harris & Sharon Hem, Co-Chairpersons. Complaints received will be discussed in an Executive Meeting. On a previous complaint involving an improperly stored trailer, the trailer has been removed and requires no further action. An amendment to the Resolution, adopted 12-1-95, concerning Complaint Procedures is being studied and will be presented at the next regular meeting. Other suggestions and recommendations will be considered.

**Common Areas:** Roy Doll, Barbara Atkins & Jo Thomas, Co-Chairpersons. Graffiti was reported on the fences and in the bathrooms at Dyer Lake. The sheriff was notified, pictures were taken and the graffiti was removed. Garbage cans that can't be raided by animals are being re-searched. The maintenance person is not insured for the cutting of the roadside grass and SCPOA members are again urged to keep the grass on their property trimmed. Reducing fuel as a Community Action Plan will be considered. A committee meeting will be scheduled.

**Fences:** Debbie Harris & Barbara Mikel, Co-Chairpersons. There are approximately 3 miles of fencing. To replace the fencing with the plastic fencing will cost approximately \$125,000.00. To repair both sides of the existing fence by power washing and painting will cost \$1.10 a linear foot. To replace the post and long board in materials and labor will cost about \$20.00 each. Discussion was held as to the Liability of volunteer help. Barbara Mikel will look into our insurance coverage.

**Roads:** Barbara Atkins, Barbara Mikel and Jim Szykowny, Co-Chairpersons. All bids have not come in yet and when they do come in they will be discussed in an Executive Meeting.

An Executive Meeting was set for Monday, August 17, 1998 at 10 A.M..

Status of School Site. No contact with School Board at this time.

### New Business

A tree limb has fallen on a common area fence from a members property. It was decided it was the members responsibility to repair the fence.

It was restated that the President sign all contracts entered into by the Association.

### Comments from the Floor

Members discussed and gave suggestions concerning the fences, and the roads. George Kellison was asked to join the Road Committee with his expertise. Suggestions concerning written complaints, the DC&R's, Committee meetings, Financial Statements, Treasurer reports, and cost and distribution of the minutes, and the treasurer's report were discussed. Lionel Rogers has volunteered to distribute a copy of the minutes to members who want them, free of charge.

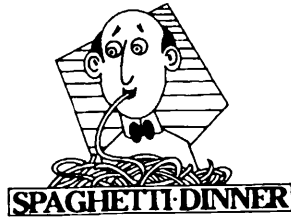
