TIME TO GET READY FOR WINTER

Summer is now over and fall is here. With the days getting shorter and the temperatures getter lower now is the time that many of us start thinking about heating the house during the coming winter. Me, I am one of the greatest procrastinators around. I am an expert at finding something else to do besides doing what needs to be done. Fire wood is a prime example, my philosophy is never cut fire wood until you absolutely have to and then when you do have to, look for a reason for not doing it. Cutting fire wood is a lot like having to fix a leaky roof. If the sun is shining there is no need to fix it and if it is raining you can't because it is raining. I just hate cutting fire wood in the summer, there are bugs around chewing on you, poison oak to infect you, heat to make you miserable, and the constant threat of starting a fire to intimidate you. Any one of those alone is a good excuse for not cutting fire wood, and when I think of all of them it becomes a definite reason not to do it. If you are cutting fire wood now and for the next couple of months please be careful. Things are still real dry and could very easily catch fire and burn a lot of stuff up.

Now is the time to have your heating system checked out. If you utilize a wood stove and did not have your chimney cleaned and inspected last spring then you need to have it done as soon as possible. Pellet stoves also need to have their chimneys cleaned as well as having the hopper and the feed system checked. Propane heating systems need new filters installed, vents inspected, burners checked, and pilot lights lit.

Onto other things. Jerome Kristjanson is no longer working for the fire department as he has gone on to other things. Devery Minor is now working as a fire fighter mechanic. As the Chief I am fortunate to have Devery here. He has a great deal of background and experience in fire fighting and in providing medical care. He has been a resident of the area all of his life and he and his family have invested a great deal of their time and energies into the community. As a community we are all lucky to have him here.

Devery and I have changed days off. I am now taking Friday and Saturday off so that I can watch my son play foot ball. Devery will be taking Sunday and Monday off. SKY AND WEATHER!

This is the time in the year when the Atmospheric and the Astronomic tend to overlap. Allow me to explain. There is always a relationship between the two terms.

Atmospheric relates to the gasses that surround the Earth and the pressure exerted by them on us. (Air Pressure approximately 15.2 pounds per square inch- at sea level-which makes your "vacuum cleaner" work.) It is also the home to our weather, that is the clouds, winds, etc., that make up our atmosphere, all 621 miles of it.

Astronomic relates to all that is beyond our atmosphere and outward in all directions from us to infinity. So when particles (meteors large or small) reach our atmosphere we named them *Meteorites*. The term Meteorology is assigned to the study of our atmosphere and all that it contains. The main ingredient in this whole equation is our Sun that supplies us with light, heat radiation and much more that space does not permit me to enumerate. Let's just say we would not be here without it.

The overlap mentioned above occurs on September 22, at 11:37 p.m. Pacific Daylight Time when our Sun reaches the September equinox, which is the beginning of autumn in the Northern Hemisphere and spring in the Southern Hemisphere. Actually it is the time as we orbit the Sun that the Sun is directly over the Equator at 12:00 noon. From that time until just before Christmas the Sun apparently continues to move south and our fall weather leaves us for the winter season. On this date day and night are each 12 hours long, the Sun rises due East and sets due West, and most of the Summer heat records will be in the history books. (I hope)

Speaking of the past Summer's heat. (I did not record the month of July) I only recorded one day temperature over 95 degrees Fahrenheit for June, August and so far in September. The nights were something else. 16 days in June were above 65 degrees F. with some as high as 74 degrees. August gave us 13 nights above 65 degrees but only 3 days above ninety. It seems to be the nights that bother the most. Only two days were recorded in September that were 90 or above and again the nights came in with high recordings. Hopefully this is the end of the "hot" weather. Yes, we did get rain .50 inches Sept. 4, and Sept. 6, .45 inches. This does not add up to the Mountain Democrat's .77 inches for season to date. I recorded 67.67 inches for the season and they recorded 60.72. This is probably close enough for "Government Work." We could use some of that liquid Sunshine about now.

DELICIOUS CHICKEN DISH

SHORTCUT CHICKEN CORDON BLEU

- Prep time: 10 minutes Cook time: 20 minutes 1 Tbsp. margarine or butter
- 4 skinless, boneless chicken breast halves (about 1 pound)
- 1 can (10 ¾ ounces) condensed cream of chicken soup
- 2 Tbsp. water
- 2 Tbsp. Chablis or other dry white wine
- 1/2 c. shredded Swiss cheese (2 ounces)
- 1/2 c. chopped cooked ham
- 4 c. hot cooked medium egg noodles (about 4 cups dry)

In medium skillet over medium-high heat, heat margarine. Add chicken and cook 10 minutes or until browned. Set chicken aside.

Add soup, water, wine, cheese and ham. Heat to a boil, stirring often. Return chicken to pan. Reduce heat to low. Cover and cook 5 minutes or until

chicken is no longer pink, stirring occasionally. Serve with noodles. Serves 4.
