### The Jovs of Being A Volunteer

If you are a volunteer fire fighter one thing that always hangs on you, always strapped to your belt or

tucked into a pocket is the pager. Little square electronic boxes that run on nickel cadmium batteries during the day and rest in a battery charger at night. Never turned off they become the

first thing you reach for in the morning and the last thing you put away in the evening. They become such a part of your dress, that you find yourself constantly reaching for it. You touch the case to make sure it is still there. You turn the monitor switch to see what if anything is going on somewhere. You press the squelch bar to make sure the batteries are still good. When the dumb thing just becomes a part of your life then you realize that you are truly a volunteer fire

It is the pager that sounds off a very unique series of tones designed to wake you from any sleep, or get your attention from any activity you are doing. When those tones go off, no matter what you are doing or where you are, you stop and strain your ear towards the pager. Usually at this point you think of how busy you are, what you have to do in the next hour, how upset your kid or spouse will be. You may even think of turning the darn thing off but still you pause and wait for the announcement to come over from Camino Dispatch. Once the announcement is made it seems that no matter what you are doing you drive to the fire

station to put on the proper protective clothing and get in a fire engine. The only reason why is that you are a Volunteer Fire Fighter.

Our community, just like the majority of communities throughout the United States, receives its fire protection and medical services from volunteers. In this county seven out of ten fire fighters are volunteers. In our community 25 out of 27 are volunteers and yet many in the community do not know how fortunate they are to have these people. In fact the majority of people do not even know what a Volunteer Fire Fighter does. They are often very grateful when a Volunteer arrives on scene to take care of the many problems that occur. Often the only contact, the only knowledge the average

person has of that volunteer is they came, they helped,

and they left.

The days of a bunch of good ole boys getting together once or twice a month to check out the

equipment, tell a few war stories from past fires, and drink some beer are long gone. Volunteer fire departments are no longer loose organizations consisting of people with the best of intentions helping a neighbor when something caught fire. Today a volunteer is a highly trained and skilled individual ready to serve their communities by being the best of problem solvers.

Today a volunteer must be a highly motivated and dedicated individual because of new laws from Federal OSHA, Cal OSHA and El Dorado County Health Department along with mandates from the State of California, the Department of Motor Vehicles, and Insurance Companies. To walk in and say you would like to become a Volunteer Fire Fighter is taking on a great commitment. The commitment starts with taking mandatory classes; such as an 80 hour basic fire fighter class, an 8 hour CPR class, a 40 hour First Responder medical class, a 60 hour Emergency Medical Technician class, and a 24 hour Ventricular Defibrillation class. At this point you are allowed to fight fire and provide medical care but not operate fire equipment. To do that requires a written test at DMV for a Class B fire fighters license, for the average

person about 80 hours of driving time, and about another 20 hours of engineering training in order to operate the pump. While all this is going on a volunteer is continuously doing training on every Tuesday evening of the year. Some of the guys and gals want to learn and do more so they take on additional classes, such as Command, Hazardous Materials, over the bank rope rescue, swift water rescue, and on and on.

With a person doing all of the above and the time commitment to do so there is still one other aspect of what a Volunteer Fire Fighter does. That is answering that pager at any time, stopping what you are doing, leaving your family, driving to the fire station using your own gasoline, and doing one of the most dangerous jobs in the country.

How many people are willing to do all of the above and do if for free, do it for absolutely nothing? Fortunately, for this community there are some very special people that live here and serve as Volunteers.

On January 17, the Finnon Lake Planning Committee (FLPC) met to discuss the latest developments at Finnon, and to continue our plan of action to remodel the facility. Now that the restaurant is closed, we are only waiting for the permits from the county to begin the actual remodeling. And let me say that working with the various county departments to obtain the necessary permits and approvals has been an eye-opening experience for all of us. Even though we thought we covered our bases by meeting with all the department heads last April, we are now constantly surprised by new requirements that have to be met in order to have the county's blessing on our every move. It has been very frustrating to realize that everything takes 3 to 10 times as long as we originally expected it to.

However, we continue to press on, because we realize we have a unique opportunity here to create a facility that can add immeasurably to our community. We actively seek input from everybody in the community as to what we should do with the 121 acre recreational site we now own, and we urge you to complete and return the Community Action Plan survey you will be receiving in the next few weeks. # Read on to Find Out About Blue Moons Jim Hinds

**Atmospheric** 

This is a good time to begin a weather report mainly because it hasn't rained all day and the Sun did come out and shine for a few minutes during the afternoon hours. We did some catching up water wise during the previous 5 days however. The 24 hour period ending today, the 21st of January, left us with 19.50 inches of rain for the year to date and 7.07 inches for the five rainy days which began on the 16th. Since we had only 2.75 inches of rain in November the season from July 1, looked pretty bad. The new look is a little better. The 120 year average is 28.76 inches of rain through January. We have ten days left this month and we just might make it. Our weather people point to the two or three Hawaiian storms heading our way as the Jet Stream has changed direction and is bringing these storms directly to toward mid-California. The first storm is due Saturday or Sunday. Since they are gathering moisture as they cross the Pacific, we may get a lot more rain. Any way that is the prediction from the Weather prognosticators. These estimates are from our local weather people in Sacramento. It is a little after 10:00 P.M. The stars are shining brightly which is a nice sight after so many nights without any sign of them or the Moon. Anyway we needed the rain. So, if you feel like, doing a little "Rain Dance," we could use some more of the wet staff. Please don't over do that "dance." We are in no mood for another January and February like last year. In The Mountain Democrat, Wednesday January 20th, there was an article on weather about the snow piling up in the Sierra. On page 7 there were some references made by former supervisor Bill Center about what happens to snow when it begins to melt in the spring. He pointed out that the snow pack so far is below normal as December had little rain or snow so far this year. His primary concern is the amount of water that spills over the Chili Bar dam. It has reached the 2000 cubit feet per second

when the overflow occurs. He explained that the normal summer rafting flow is between 1500 and 2000 cubic feet per second (cfs). He indicated that as the cfs. flow increases serious consequences are the result. I quote. "In the 1997 floods the river topped 80,000 cfs". If memory serves me right, this was the year when nearly all of the boat launching area was washed away at Chili Bar. Just how much water is going down river at 80,000 cfs. I think you will be surprised. To make this calculation, we used a 1,000 cfs as a basis. You will understand why, shortly, 1000 cfs = 7,300 gal. per second = 438,800 gal. per minute = 26,880,000 gal. per hour.

This would be enough water to fill more than 4,000 Trout Lakes every hour. This may give you some idea as to the amount of water going down our river and under the Mosquito Bridge during Spring runoff or during long and heavy rains. Thank you Steve H. and Leo C. for helping me get this data together. You out there who bother to read all this stuff can see if one of you find an error in all these numbers, I will have someone to blame.

#### **Astronomic**

This is the second time for this part of the article. It is a copy out of the March 1999 issue of *Sky and Telescope* which arrived the 23<sup>rd</sup>. This is about Blue Moon months. I quote directly from the article. "It's not rare to see two full moons in a month. Because the Moon's phases are out of sync with our calendar and all the months but February are longer than the lunar cycle of 29 ½ days, this happens about seven times in every 19 years. Months have different lengths, so the phenomenon moves around a bit.
