SUPPORT GROUP HELPS !

Last month I wrote about how fortunate the fire department was to have the volunteer fire fighters. Besides the volunteers we also have a special group of people referred to as Support Group members. These individuals are extremely important to the fire department as they make it possible for the fire fighters to place their emphasis on fighting a fire.

Our fire department's main responsibility as it is with any fire department is to save lives and then protect property. In order to do this it requires a large number of people. For example, a CPR call often requires at least 5 people to be as effective as possible. A vehicle accident, especially, one that has an individual trapped inside would require as many as 12 people. Each additional person injured in the accident would require two more fire fighters. A structure fire could require as many as 20 fire fighters. An initial attack on a small wildland fire requires at least 20 fire fighters. That number could greatly increase

depending on what the fire does and the conditions that exist. These examples do not take into account any additional problems that often arise or the many support activities that need to be performed. A vehicle accident in most cases requires that traffic be controlled, that people be controlled, that the use of helicopters be coordinated, and that many unknowns be solved. Wildland fires as with structure fires have many needs, such as the establishment of communications, roads to be controlled, the mobile pump be set up, the scene secured, the guiding in of mutual aid equipment, possible evacuations, the preparation of food and drinks, the delivery of supplies, and the many unknowns that always arise.

It is not possible for the volunteer fire fighters to perform the many functions that must be done in order for an event to be successfully completed. There is just too much to be done and not enough fire fighters to handle everything. All these other things, these problems that arise are done by the Support Group. These members make it possible for the fire fighters to place their emphasis on doing what fire fighters are needed to do. Without them I would have to assign a fire fighter to road control duties when that fire fighter may be needed to operate a hose line on a wild land fire. Without them our fire department would not be able to do what it does.

Our Support Group consist of members from the community that do not have a great desire to be a fire fighter but still want to help the fire department and the community. They meet on the first Saturday of each month for formal training. Some of the areas they train in are communications where all the department radios and their operation

along with procedure is learned. They train on a large mobile pump that is towed to the many water areas we have in the area. It is used to supply water to all the engines and water tenders that will be coming into the area for a fire. This unit has, on more than one occasion, been one of the decisive reasons why a fire is

controlled. The controlling of traffic (one of the most dangerous jobs) due to a vehicle accident, a fire, a CHP or Sheriff request, a mud slide or for any other reason is one of the most important functions performed by the Support Group. On a large working fire we simply do not have enough fire fighters to do this task and without the Support Group it just would not get done thus creating more problems. Several of the Support Group members are also medical first responders and EMT's. They respond to any medical emergency that may arise on an incident when the fire fighters are not capable of doing so. Just having a group of medical people standing by at the station whenever we are fighting a fire is a great comfort.

Another difficult task and not seen as a very glorious one is that of taking care of kids. The Support Group does that for us, that task allows fire fighters with kids to respond to a fire, and on many occasions they have helped watch kids stranded on the bus due to weather conditions or a fire. There have also been occasions when our Support Group has provided meals for up to 100 fire fighters, simply because we can do it and it would take the CDF too long to do it or they did not have the resources available at the time. Then there are the many other things that just pop up that require many people and the fire fighters must have the help of the Support Group.

As a community we are very fortunate to have these people. They provide us with a very valuable service and are a very important part of how the system works. So, if you see several fire fighters working on a fire of some kind, please realize that somewhere behind the lines there are several Support Group members that make it possible for them to be there.

We've accomplished the next major step in the Mosquito/Swansboro Community Action Plan process. A 20-question survey has been sent out to residents and property owners asking for input on key issues such as Finnon Lake, road conditions, the community's relationship with the County, and more.

The survey is part of an overall program to identify community assets, assess the challenges facing the community, and come up with a plan for achieving goals developed through the process. We're starting out with the survey to give us a "snapshot" of what people are thinking about certain key issues. We will follow up with a series of town hall meetings to get more information and input. Then I will use all the data collected through the surveys and town hall meetings to develop a draft action plan, including recommended actions and potential sources.

Your individual responses to the survey will be kept **strictly confidential!** I will be the only person who actually sees the returned surveys. No individual responses will ever be identified with the person who made them. All information received will be tallied up collectively and included in a summary report, which I will present at our first town hall meeting.

The RAINS Came!

Atmospheric

This day, Thursday, February 18, is wet and gloomy. Well, not all of it since the rain started to fall at about Noon and stopped around five this afternoon, leaving a little over ½ inch of rain. The system responsible for all this is on its way through this area and the prediction is for more rain and snow above 5-6,000 feet. It is then supposed to clear up Friday. However, there is another front coming through on Saturday that will be with us until Sunday. However by the time the *Byte* is in your hands all of this will be history.

February has been kind to us. The rain came early in the month and by the 10th it rained 7.37 inches which is about normal. Then for a week it was nice and dry almost like spring. This little storm has added 2.59 inches so the total is now 9.96 inches for the month. Last year on this date we had 13.61 inches of rain while the 120 year average is only 6.42 inches of rain for this month. We have at least two more storms headed our way this month. So, we will probably add to the above average number. So far this season of 98-99, we have had 31.71 inches of rain which is only 8 inches less than the average for the 120 year period recorded. February has been kind and gentle to us so far, we could hope that it stays that way.

Astronomic

We are having two months with Blue Moons in them this year which is not unusual as it could happen eleven out of the 12 months in any given year. This is because the Moon's monthly cycle is 29 ½ days. The exception being February with its 28 days except Leap Year which has the extra day or the 29th day. By the way Leap Year only comes on those years which are divisible by *four*. Don't ask me why because, I don't know why.

I do know that the year 2,000 will not be a Leap Year because every hundred years it is necessary to drop a day to keep our calendar on schedule and on the millennium it is not dropped for the same reason. There will be no Leap Year next February, although 2,000 is divisible by four. I did wander off the path and will get back to the Blue Moon bit. The term "Blue Moon" has been used for about 400 years. There are known times when the Moon actually did turn blue. When in 1883 the Indonesian volcano Krakatoa exploded, its dust turned sunsets green and the Moon blue all around the world for nearly 2 years.

In 1927, the Indian monsoons were late arriving and the extra-long dry spell blew enough dust for a blue Moon. In 1951 when particles from huge forest fires

was burning in western Canada enough smoke particles were thrown into the air to cause a Blue Moon. It meant and still means a fairly infrequent happening, not regular enough to exactly predict.

The author of this article Philip Hiscock states. "Finally we arrive at the most recent meaning of all, the second full Moon in a month. I first heard it in 1988. At the end of May that year, when a second full Moon occurred, radio stations and newspapers everywhere carried an item on this bit of 'old folklore' as they called it, drawing on an international wire story. -- I searched high and low for an earlier; example of this usage, or any other name for two full Moons in a single calendar month. But the search was in vain---this meaning seemed to have no history. I did find information on the other meanings of 'Blue Moon,' but not this one." At this juncture he lists his pursuits and the many documents he searched to no avail. He did say it did seem to be a truly modern piece of folklore, masquerading as something old. One source he found was in a children's book published in 1985, *The Kid's World Almanac of Records and Facts* (New York): World Almanac Publication). Where the authors, Margo Basta-McLoon and Alice Segel got their information was unknown. Another source was *The Maine Farmers' Almanac for 1937*. At any rate Philip Hiscock did a lot of research in order to submit this article to the publishers of *Sky and Telescope* for March 1999. One last point to finish this over length article; the next time a double month like the one we are having now will be in 2018 of our new .millennium. I do hope you will enjoy it.

SOMETHING DIFFERENT!

Never eaten kale? Don't let that stop you. This is a wonderfully thick delicious soup. Serve with french bread.

PORTUGUESE KALE SOUP

- 6 c water
- 2/3 c dry red kidney beans
- 1 lb. beef shanks cross-cuts
- 8 oz. Chaurico or Chorizo (or bulk Italian sausage)
- 2/3 dry split peas
- 2 1/2 tsp salt
- 6 c kale, torn (large bunch)
- 2 c peeled and chopped potatoes (2 medium)
- 2 c coarsely chopped cabbage

In a Dutch oven, combine water and kidney beans. Bring to boil – simmer uncovered 2 minutes. Remove from heat and let stand 1 hour (or soak overnight)

In skillet, brown shanks and sausage; drain well. Stir into undrained beans along with peas and salt. Bring to boil, reduce heat and simmer covered 2 hours. Remove shanks. When cool, remove meat from bones and cube. Discard bones – return meat to pan. Add kale, potatoes and cabbage. Simmer covered 25 to 30 minutes. Serves 8 to 10.

SCPOA ANNUAL MEETING

The Annual Meeting for the Swansboro Country Property Owners Association was held February 13, 1999. Between the proxies sent in by mail and the members that came to the meeting there was a total of 67. That doesn't seem like very many when you compare that to the 716 members.

Food was provided and served by the Mosquito Volunteer Fire Department Support Group. Lois Pearson was there and so was Chris Chaloux with a smile on their faces and a cookie or a sandwich in their hand. I don't think there was a single brownie or anything else left.

One thing that struck me as different from other Corporate Board Meetings, was the hugging and the hand shaking going on. Actually I haven't been to that many other board meetings, but I have an idea of what they are like, stuffy. This was a meeting of friends getting together trying to understand and run a business that we all bought into whether we wanted to or not. They may have different opinions as to how to run SCPOA but they all have the same goal. The people at this meeting don't want to see Swansboro deteriorate. Another thing that stood out was the announcement of a 100 pound pig found by Robert Yates. You just don't hear that at a Microsoft board meeting.

The meeting went smoothly as planned by the outgoing President Debbie Harris. Awards were given to the Directors who had served their terms. They were Debbie Harris, Roy Doll, Jim Szykowny and Barbara Mikel. A big thank you goes to each and every one of them. They worked hard and long hours. As Wayne Mikel said "It is a thankless job."

The new Directors and officers are as follows: Barbara Mikel, President; Bob Castleberry, Vice President; Sharon Hem, Treasurer; with George Kellison and Mel Joyner as Board Members. They will add to the already hard working members of Barbara Atkins and Jo Thomas.

Jo Thomas gave the Treasurer's Report. As of yesterday, February 12, 1999, the association has a total of \$34,591.94 in the bank, the bulk of which represents prepaid assessments for the upcoming fiscal year. All accounts payable are current. As this time there are 15 lots with delinquent assessments totaling \$11,117.64. This total includes collection costs and interest. When the fiscal year ends an independent audit will be done and mailed to each member.

Committee Reports

Jim Szykowny gave the Road Committee Report. Last year road work and patchwork was done. Major

repairs were done on Highgrade and Stope. Thanks were given to Barbara Mikel, George Kellison and Dan Schrupf for their help. The Committee has decided to try to pave ¼ to ½ mile of the roads each year concentrating on the main roads. Sanding of the roads were done at a cost of \$1,300.00. The association came under the amount of monies allotted for the road budget.

Sharon Hem gave the Architectural Review Committee Report. This year a total of 4 plans have been submitted for review and approved.

Roy Doll gave the Common Area Committee Report. It was reported that the major portions of the monies used for the common areas were for the up keep on the lakes. Three applications are made a year for the control of weeds and algae. A thank you was extended to Lee Hair for making the boxes that will hold trash. These boxes and the associations dumpster is not to be used for personal household trash.

Debbie Harris gave the Fence Committee Report. No more that \$500.00 was spent on the fences this year due to the need of the monies to be spent on the repair of the roads. It was recommended that painting and repair work be done on the most visible areas of the fencing, at a minimum, in the next year. This would be done depending on the road conditions after this winter.

Barbara Mikel gave the Budget and Long Range Planning Committee Report. We have a budget. We have a Long-Range Plan that is in need of review. The association did an increase in the dues this year to replenish the reserve funds that were previously borrowed to cover the legal expenses. The reserves are legally required to be repaid. At this time we have no legal reserves for the repair of the roads and require 50 % of our budget each year.

Jo Thomas gave the Runway Committee Report. Approximately \$260.00 was spent for maintenance on the runway this year. That is 50% of our \$518.00 budget. The main concern of the committee was the removal of a number of trees bordering the runway. This was done for safety purposes as requested by the Department of Transportation. The cracks in the chip and seal that were reported last year are still there this year, and will have to be addressed by the new board.

Sharon Hem gave the Bylaws/DC&R's Committee Report. This year the Board received 4 (four) written and signed complaints regarding alleged DC&R violation.

The first complaint was resolved and the violation removed. The second complaint required no action as the alleged violation had been removed. The third complaint required no action, as the alleged violation

was investigated and not found to be a violation at the time. The fourth complaint is still pending. One unsigned complaint was received. On October 10, 1999 a change to the resolution adopted by the Board on December 12, 1995 concerning the enforcement of the DC&R's was adopted. The change was for clarification that only written and signed complaints by a property owner would be reviewed. Also included was a clarification of how the complaint would be handled by the Board to insure confidentiality for all parties.

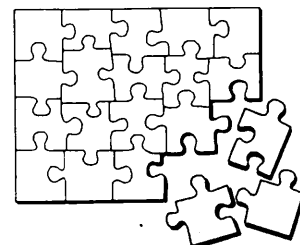
