TWO IN —
TWO OUT RULE

Fire fighting is and always will be a risky business. Over the years many fire fighters have been injured or killed while performing the business of fighting fires. One of the most important aspects of the job is doing as much as possible to make sure that fire fighters are not injured or worse killed. Many safety rules, regulations, mandates, and policies have been developed and implemented in an attempt to make a very dangerous job a safer one.

Within the last two years the Federal Occupational Safety and Health Administration has implemented a regulation that now requires interior structural fire fighting procedures. Before any interior fire fighting activities can take place, at least two fire fighters enter the structure and two more fire fighters remain outside the structure at the building entry point This regulation is known as the "two-in/two-out rule" and must be adhered to anytime it becomes necessary for a fire fighter to put on a Self Contained Breathing Apparatus in order to make an interior attack on a burning structure. As with most small rural fire departments in this country the ability to put in place within moments an Incident Command system (mandated), a Safety Officer (mandated), along with the implementation of the two-in/two out rule is a very difficult one. This requirement has made the necessity of having a large number of fire fighters available much more important.

If as an Incident Commander for example, I arrive on the scene of a small very smoky fire confined to the kitchen area, I cannot order an interior attack until I have established a safety officer, two fire fighters at the entry door with a water charged hose, radios, and breathing apparatus on, along with two additional fire fighters who will remain outside at the entry door with water charged hose and breathing apparatus on. Also, on this scene is the operator for the engine along with operators for the water tenders if they are required. At this point 9 fire fighters are assembled and ready to attack the fire. The other required fire ground operations such as ventilation, salvage and overhaul haven't even been put into place at this point and will not be until enough volunteers arrive.

The two-in/two-out rule is a good one. It is designed to keep fire fighters from getting hurt. It's only drawback is the difficulty that small rural fire departments such as ours have in acquiring a large number of dedicated volunteers who can respond at any moment of the day. Even the majority of paid fire departments cannot meet the intent of the two-in/two-out rule. Placerville for example, only has two people on an engine at a time and one of them must engineer the equipment. They must wait for additional engines from other departments or for their volunteers to arrive on scene before any serious interior attacks can be made.

Another problem with the two-in/two-out rule is it takes away some of the discretion that an Incident Commander used to have as to how and when to make an interior attack. At times, because the fire is so small, it is possible to make a quick interior attack with just two fire fighters putting the fire out and not giving it the time it needs to develop into a larger problem. Another problem is that of having one engine company with three fire fighters arrive at a house fire and not be able to do an interior attack while the home owner watches the home continue to burn. As fire fighters we will not allow the home to continue to burn. We will take action from outside the house, such as knocking



out windows or cutting holes into walls to get the burned area ventilated and water into it. From a tactical standpoint this is another method of putting out a house fire even though it may not be as good or as effective as an aggressive interior attack. As additional resources and fire fighters arrive tactics will change and everything will be done to save as much of the home as possible.

There is one exception to the two-in/two-out rule. That is if a "known" rescue is necessary then two fire fighters properly equipped can enter the building to do the rescue. The problem here is that it is has to be a known rescue. We have to know for sure, from seeing someone in the building or being told by an occupant or a witness that someone is in the building. If we do not have the information then we cannot do a routine search of the building until all aspects of the twoin/two-out rule are in place. Again, tactical decisions that used to be made by the Incident Commander are influenced by this rule. I have to report by law to the state all structure fires, the tactics used in fighting that fire, and if a rescue was performed. So even if a rescue is necessary and is successfully carried out our fire department will be cited by OSHA for violating the two-in/two-out rule. The citation will not have a monetary penalty to it, but will be recorded and used to determine if the fire department is making too many rescue entries.

Fighting fires is a complex business and many times people will question why things are done the way they are not knowing that decisions are often made in order to satisfy rules, regulations, and the law. Please realize that our list of priorities is always that of first protecting life, than property. Everything, with what resources are available, will be done to carry out those priorities.

The most important part of saving a home on fire is the notification. The quicker a notification to 911 takes place after a fire is discovered the more successful we will be in saving that structure and it will be done in a much safer way. Two problems exist when it comes to notification. One is the distance between homes up here. In many cases a fire may not be discovered by a neighbor or passerby until it blows out the roof or a window. At this point the house is very well involved with fire and very difficult to save. The other problem is someone who is at home and discovers a fire in their house. In many cases instead of immediately calling 911 they attempt to put the fire out themselves. No matter the size of the fire, please immediately call 911 and take the advice of the dispatcher and get out of the house. Many people have died trying to put out a house fire. Remember, use the same priorities we do, that is lives first and property second.

WE ARE VERY PROUD

We are real proud that Chris Chaloux has just

received the "Light The Way" award given by the San Juan School District to Special Education Teachers. There were only 12 people in the entire district that received this award. This is one award that she has definitely earned and it is very special as it recognizes her dedication, skill and talents when it comes to the special students she teaches and how she tries to have them included in all aspects of their school. She was nominated by staff members at her school, by the administration, by parents, and by past as well as future students. She has taught Special Education and Resource at San Juan now for 13 years.

It's clear that residents of Mosquito/Swansboro take their community seriously. Responses to the Community Action Plan survey have come in at an amazing rate! The usual return for such a survey is a mere 1% - 3%. Anything above 5% is considered a really good return. Well, I've received over 230 surveys back, with more still coming in. That's close to a 16% response rate so far and it's only going to go up. You all should be congratulated!

Not only that, but about 35 of you gave up your Saturday morning to attend our first town hall meeting, held on March 13. For those of you who couldn't make it, I'll try to summarize some of the key survey results here. A full report will be included in the final community action plan.

But for now, here are some highlights:

1,450 surveys were sent out

230 people responded so far (I'm still accepting surveys, so if you haven't filled yours out yet, please take a few minutes to complete it and turn it in at the Fire House)

The three top reasons why people chose to live/move here included: the geography/natural beauty (68%), the rural location (67%), and the so-called small

town atmosphere (51%) -- even though Mosquito/Swansboro isn't exactly a small "town." Other characteristics mentioned included the friendly community and the quiet, privacy and solitude.

About half the people felt that there should be no effort put into increasing tourism. But most did want to see more effort in making improvements to the restaurant at Finnon Lake (71%), improving camping there (56%), and improving the day-use area (64%). In addition, more than 50% of the respondents wanted to see more effort put toward getting a school in the community and protecting open space and agricultural lands.

As you might imagine, most people (85%) wanted to see the County do more to improve conditions on Mosquito Road. Some people got very specific, saying they wanted road widening, improved turn-outs, and improvements or reconstruction of the bridge and the approach to the bridge. On the other hand, there were plenty of other folks who didn't want to see any improvements because they believe the road and bridge conditions act as a natural barrier to too much growth.

Three-quarters of people responding said they wanted a store of some kind in the community. And 66% wanted at least a K-3rd grade school. Others mentioned a post office, a community church, and more activities for youth, including older youth.

Despite what some people might say about all those "newcomers," more than half of the Mosquito/Swansboro residents have lived in the community for at least six years, with 26% having lived here for between 11 and 20 years. Three people responded that they've lived here all their lives. I'll leave it up to you to guess who they might be!

In terms of what to do with Finnon Lake, 69% said to improve day use, and 54% said to improve camping, use the facility for educational projects or activities, and add hiking trails. Others mentioned fixing the dam/filling the lake, cleaning up the place in general, improving fishing, and using it for outdoor education programs for the schools. It was pretty clear, though, that most people wanted Finnon Lake improvements to be focused on local use and have more of a family orientation.

Some great ideas came out of the survey and the town hall meeting. All of this information will be used to create a draft community action plan with some potential recommendations for how the community might achieve some of these goals. The draft plan will be discussed at the second town hall meeting, scheduled for Saturday, April 10, from 10 am to12 noon. Hope we see you there!

This information will be invaluable to us as we attempt to chart the future of the Finnon Lake property. Thanks to all who attended the meeting, as well as those who returned their surveys.

Atmospheric and Astronomic

This is a very good time to begin this article as today the 20th of March is the beginning of spring at 5:46 this afternoon Pacific Standard Time. So now you know why we had that rain last night all .27inches of it. Anyway we now have 34.66 inches to report for the season. Last year on this date we had accumulated 47.70 inches and the 122 year average through March is 33.98 inches of rain. The rain has not been very consistent. March so far has had 17 days without rain and this is one of our most dependable "rain months." February had 14 days with rain and 14 days without rain. Our temperatures have been mild for the season. My records indicate three days of February and one day in March where 32 degrees was recorded. The rest of the time we were between the 35 to 55 degree range. There are still the months of April, May and June left in this weather year.

Now about the Astronomic that is a part of this article and a very important but often forgotten or neglected part of our very existence on this Earth of ours. We hear all the problems i.e., global warming, or cooling as the case may be or something else that we have or done or are doing but seldom is the Sun brought into the picture when it is the primal cause of many activities.

The Sun being the center and only *star* we have around this area, we revolve around it.

In today's language it might be said that we *orbit* the Sun which of course we do. A number of factors come into play now. This orbit or revolution as it is more generally called has a series of consequences related to it with which you are all familiar. Because of Earth's revolution we experience the four seasons spring, summer, autumn and winter.

A GREAT STEW

If you want to try something really good – try this! Beef and Two Pepper Stew

- 1 1/4 lbs boneless beef chuck cut into 1 inch pieces 1/2 c coarsely chopped onion
- 1 large clove garlic, crushed
- 1 tbs vegetable oil
- 1 1/2 tsp dried oregano leaves, crushed
- 1 tsp ground cumin
- ½ tsp each crushed red pepper pods and salt
- 4 medium tomatoes chopped and divided ½ c water
- 1 can (4 oz.) whole green chilies, undrained
- 1 tbs comstarch
- 1/4 c sliced green onion tops (optional)

(Note: can reduce or omit red pepper and use 1 large can tomatoes in place of fresh tomatoes.)

Brown beef, onion and garlic in hot oil in Dutch oven. Pour off drippings. Sprinkle oregano, cumin, pepper pods and salt over beef. Add 3 cups tomatoes and water, stirring to combine. Reserve remaining tomato. Cover tightly and simmer 1 hour 55 minutes, our until beef is tender. Meanwhile drain green chilies, reserving liquid. Cut chilies into ½ inch pieces; add to beef mixture. Dissolve cornstarch in reserved chili liquid. Gradually stir into stew. Cook, uncovered, until thickened, stirring frequently. Stir in reserved tomato. Garnish with onion tops. Serves 4.
