# AIRPORT VANDALISM REPORTED

Recently we had some damage done to an aircraft parked in the parking area at the east end of the runway. Some kids were heard and seen walking away from the aircraft around 11:30 p.m. Footprints were found all over a wing and the right aileron was bent. There was also spilled beer and a beer can on the ground. It is unlikely that anyone was trying to cause damage intentionally, but rather the damage resulted from playing around. Now the owner is faced with an expensive repair bill and is unable to fly the airplane. Tampering with an aircraft is not just vandalism but is a federal offence. If the damage is not seen before take off, a crash could occur possibly resulting in the death of the pilot, passengers and people on the ground.

Another incident involved some younger kids who were at Dyer Lake swimming and then came close and stood behind an aircraft that was running up prior to take off. They were standing in the wind created by the prop. This may sound like fun, but the propeller wash also picks up small rocks which can be blown at high speed and if they strike an eye could cause serious injury. These same kids then went up to one of the parked aircraft and were seen turning the propeller. Under some circumstances the engine may turn over if the propeller is moved. If the engine should start the propeller would turn very rapidly. Needless to say this could cause serious injury or even death to anyone standing in the propeller arc.

The airport is not the place for unattended children or Saturday night parties. There are too many opportunities for accidental injury or damage. Anyone who is interested in the airport or airplanes should contact one of the many pilots who would be happy to give information or show off an aircraft. Otherwise look from a safe distance and please don't touch!

This is a great breakfast to do for a brunch or if you are going to have a special breakfast!

#### **BREAKFAST OF CHAMPIONS**

Lightly butter a 9" x 13" x 2" baking dish

Butter 10 slices of Sour Dough French Bread and cut into cubes

Put in baking dish and set aside.

Cook 2 lbs. bulk sausage until it changes color, then drain.

Arrange sausage over bread, then add  $1 \frac{1}{2}$  c. grated cheddar cheese

Salt and pepper to taste.

In a mixing bowl, beat 6 eggs and add 3 c. milk.

Pour over bread, sausage cheese mixture. Cover with foil and refrigerate overnight. In the morning, top with  $\frac{1}{2}$  c. grated cheddar cheese. Bake, uncovered, in a 350° oven for 35 to 45 minutes. Let stand 15 minutes before serving. Cut into squares. Serves 8 to 10.

### SUMMER IS HERE ! Jim Hinds

#### Monday, June 21<sup>st</sup> and it is a wonderful day to do this article. First, this is the first day of summer as of 12:49 PM, our time. Second, our Sun has reached its most northerly position of 23° north latitude. This will allow the rays from the Sun to shine more directly on those of us who live in the Northern Hemisphere, thereby warming our end of the globe, while the Southern Hemisphere begins its winter season due to the lack of sunlight. Now if you do not believe this, keep a sharp eye on the weather reports for the next two or three months.

On this day it was reported to be  $94^{\circ}$  in Sacramento with a promise of over the century mark coming soon. The warmest recorded to date at my location, since last summer, was today with  $79^{\circ}$ . I suppose the rainfall totals might be of some interest although we have been very short of rain the past month or two. We had 46.03'' of rain so far this year and June is going to be short, I hope. You see, I am having new roofing put on my place and I'm pretty exposed at present. Maybe the rain will pass me by for a little longer.

In checking sources, I ran into some interesting material in *World Atlas Hammond, 1965.* We all are traveling around our Sun every 365 days, 23 hours, 56 minutes and 4.1 seconds and have been doing so for some four and one half billion years. This trip or orbit is 595,000,000 miles and our speed is 66,600 miles per hour. This figure is subject to change due to tidal forces which may be slowing things down a bit. Also, new techniques and improved instruments give better and more accurate measurements. 1965 was a long time ago when we consider all the progress that is being made in this area today.

Another factor that affects us is that our polar axis is tilted toward the Sun by 23.5° and, of course, this gives us our change of seasons and the length of our days and nights. Speaking of nights, this is a wonderful time of year to go out and see what the night sky looks like. Take a telescope or field glasses outside, get comfortable, and enjoy your beautiful dark skies.
