MEETINGS AND MORE MEETINGS

Since the beginning of this year we have been rather busy. There have been a larger number of medical aids, accidents, and public assists calls.

However, for me there has been a larger number of meetings. It seems that lately all I have been doing is going to a meeting of one kind or another somewhere in the County. I am not much of a meeting person as I really do

not see much of anything coming out of them, especially when there are ten fire chiefs gathered around. In most cases about all that really gets accomplished is a significant amount of donuts get eaten. Afternoon meetings are the worst as the donuts are rather stale.

There have been some significant issues that have been developing in the County that do and will have an impact on this fire department. Most meetings are centered around medical concerns, such as transport, response times, and patient treatment. Since the medical response business is now the majority of what fire departments do, it only makes sense that medical concerns and our ability to serve the citizens should take up the majority of time. In our District the biggest concern is that of a faster response time for the ambulance. Outside of building a new bridge across the canyon the ambulance will not be able to get here any faster than it is currently doing. So for us the next best thing is to have those that are the quickest to respond, the volunteers, be the best trained. Our goal here at the fire department is to have the volunteers trained to a higher level so more advanced patient care can be given. Currently, the majority of the volunteers are EMT's and very capable of performing at that level.

The next higher level is an Enhanced EMT which would provide a volunteer with additional training and thus the ability to do more patient care. Such care could include providing a better airway for someone not breathing, or the administering of certain cardiac care drugs for one having heart problems. It is going to take many more meetings to get to that level, for any additional training has to be developed and approved by the County Emergency Medical Services Agency.

Another issue that has caused numerous meetings and consumed many hours has been the new automatic dispatching system being developed here in El Dorado County. This system has been in the development process for the past year. As with any new

computer software program many problems become apparent and have to be solved. This new dispatch software is designed to get the closest resource to the emergency. This means district boundaries have been

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dropped from a dispatching standpoint. It is now possible for an engine from a neighboring fire district to respond to an incident in another district. This has caused many meetings between the ten fire districts in the county, the California Division of Forestry, and the United States Forest Service. Everyone involved is trying to hammer out the who, what, when, and where equipment will respond. Fire Chiefs, being very territorial and turf driven, have had many meetings over the past several weeks to deal with this and in the process have eaten massive amounts of donuts. Once all the dispatching problems are worked out El Dorado County and Amador County should have one of the most advanced dispatching systems in the country.

Beside getting dispatch response programs dialed in, the low band frequency radio system we have been using here in El Dorado County for the past 30 years just doesn't seem to be working. Over the past 20 years fire departments throughout the country have been getting away from low band frequency systems and switching to high band systems. Low band radios are not being developed with new technologies, they are hard to find, and are very expensive. High band systems have more radios, repeaters, and pagers avail-

able, are less expensive and are systems that just plain work better. To switch from low to high band has been one of those tasks that again requires many meetings and a consensus from ten fire departments as to the best way to go about it. Once the high band frequencies are obtained and blessed by the FCC for us to use then all ten fire departments have to agree on what radios and pagers to purchase. The goal here is to have everything in the county compatible and interfacing properly.

A fairly recent problem has surfaced concerning the Summerfield Ditch. Swansboro Country and Finnon Lake obtain enough water throughout the summer to keep all the lakes in the area topped off from the Summerfield Ditch. This water is a valuable asset providing recreational opportunities as well as increasing my comfort level during the wild land fire season. Our community depends a great deal on the ponds and lakes in the area for fire suppression and I sure hate to see this water supply go away. Last month I wrote an article regarding the Summerfield Ditch, describing its history, its value to our community, and I asked for anyone concerned to contact me. I did have one individual state his interest and desire to help and fortunately he has participated in some meetings we have had. The Summerfield Ditch issue will be one that will require a great deal of time and is one that will require the help of not only the Volunteer Fire Department and Swansboro but also of the community.

Well, now that you have heard my long sorry story of all those lousy meetings I have to go to with all those donuts that have to be eaten, I have to close this article for I am late for a meeting.

Be careful. Winter will be around for a few more weeks. Show Mosquito Road and all those who drive it respect. We do not want to be responding to your accident.

SCPOA REPORT

Paul Hinds gave a presentation on the Summerfield Ditch. A committee has been formed to look into the water rights of the Mosquito District. A meeting is planned sometime in the near future to discuss the information.

A question and answer period was held from the floor. The dues increase and the roads repair was discussed. Attorney Michael Woodberry explained that the 20% increase in dues is permitted without a vote of the membership by the Davis-Stirling Act passed in 1985. The Davis-Stirling Act of 1985 over-rides the SCPOA DC&R's in this case. The increase in the dues is to help pay for the repair and up-keep of the roads and other legal requirements made of SCPOA by the Davis-Stirling Act of 1985, California Civil Code Section 1350 - 1376 and the DC&R's.

Treasurer's Report

Sharon Hern gave the Treasurer's Report. As of the 11th of February, there is \$19,871.16 in the Money Market Account and with the prepaid assessments for the year 2000 coming in, there is \$21,887.95 in the Checking Account for a total of \$41,759.11. SCPOA is a California Non-Profit Mutual Corporation and if any money is left in the SCPOA accounts on February 29, 1999, that money will be brought forward to the next year.

Committee Reports

The Road Committee report was given by Chairperson George Kellison. In the year 1999-2000, \$117,000.00 was spent repairing the roads. The roads most traveled are repaired first, such as Log Cabin, Stope, Lupin, and Buckboard with a petromat and a 2-inch overlay. Then the remaining potholes are repaired. It was suggested that if you have potholes that need repair, contact a Road Committee person.

The Architectural Review Committee report was given by Chairperson George Kellison. There were two sets of plans that were submitted and approved by the Review Committee.

Common Area/Fence Committee report was given by Chairperson Mel Joyner. The fences around Dyer Lake were replaced with vinyl fencing. The fence material that is in good shape will be used to repair other fences. We hope to replace the fencing around Trout Lake this year if there is enough money. Brushing around the lakes was done as well as the yearly chemical treatment needed to eradicate the water lilies. A hardy thank you was given to Roy Doll, Paul Hinds and Mel Joyner for their work on replacing the fences.

The Budget and Long Range Plan report was given by Chairperson Barbara Mikel. The Budget and the Long Range Plan was developed in the early 1990's by two volunteers. It has had various changes throughout the years. It is a plan that is required of the Association. It is a plan to develop the necessary budget in order to do what is required of the Association. We have legal requirements to maintain the roads, common areas and airport runway that must be met. We have had positive feedback from our CPA regarding the Long-Range Plan. Every change in the Long Range Plan was voted on unanimously by the Board. The increases in the dues projected for the future years in the Long-Range Plan will vary depending on how the maintenance is done and how the capital improvements are done. If more volunteers come forward to help maintain the common areas, then the amount SCPOA has to pay the maintenance person is reduced. If property owners would brush their property and repair their culverts then the amount of money the Association spends on this kind of maintenance would be reduced. If one of the ponds or the dam develops a leak, we have no emergency funds at this time to do the repair work. To the extent that the Community cooperates with the Association and the legal requirements that it has, then the increase in the dues will be less. If the Community does not cooperate the dues increase will be what is projected on the Long-Range Plan.

The Runway Committee report was given by Chairperson Barbara Atkins. The only expenditure the Runway Committee had this year was to replace the windsock, which was \$97.65.

The Bylaws and DC&R's report was given by Chairperson Mel Joyner. There were a few complaints this year which the Board of Directors responded to. The Board wanted to remind everyone to put their complaints in writing and be sure to sign the complaint so that they can take the appropriate action.

WET WEATHER

Puxatawney Phil emerged from his Pennsylvania (PA) burrow and saw a shadow. The satellite picture that cold morning had a thin layer of clouds over Pennsylvania, Ohio, Indiana, Illinois .. even New England and New Jersey. But, he did see a shadow and lore indicates more weeks of winter.

So, how cold was it? Nearby Du Bois, around 8:00a.m. PA time was all of 12° Fahrenheit under an overcast less than 3000 feet above ground level with wind gusting around 20 mph. The wind chill... about a minus 30° Fahrenheit. I'd scurry back to a sung cave, also!

Closer to home, the rainy days have ended but likely just briefly. (We'll look ahead later.) On the 24th of January, I measured three and three quarters inches (3.37") at 8:00 a.m. My 24 hour total is checked at that time daily. The last five days of January were rain-free except for the 31st when a tad more than an inch was measured.

Surface reports for the last days of January and early February showed weather systems ...frontal activity... spread all the way to Japan, China and Siberia. The atmosphere didn't change much. On February 13th four weather systems were lined up across the Pacific like cows near the barn at milking time. Cold Siberian air dictates, may times, weather over

the Pacific Ocean. And, the "reefer" cold Verkoyansk just above the Arctic Circle was colder than our own hemisphere's Dawson in Canada's Yukon. The former at minus 44°, while toasty Dawson was merely a minus 36°, all in world-wide use of Celsius (F= 9/5C + 32) do remember the algebraic method when working with negative numbers.

That cold, polar air chills the semi-permanent Gulf of Alaska low pressure area. Nudged south, that cold air will interact with the semi-tropical air warmed and moistened by ocean temperatures hovering in the seventies from Baja California to the lush Hawaiian Islands.

Then the weather systems move east, drenching California with moisture laden, low-latitude air triggered by contrasting cooler air. And, after crossing the Rockies, the weather systems either dissipate or redevelop from invigorating, moist Gulf of Mexico air headed north.

The on-off rain periods of the first days of February ended on the 9th and produced 2.31 inches of rain. And, through the 20th of February. 10.29 inches. Add January's 14.04 and this year add up to 24.31. The season (from July 1, 1999) would total 32.18 inches...not too shabby.

Enough of the dreary wet stuff. Cooled to a frosty 31° on February 2 and had a mild 62° on the seventh, just a few days later. What does the future hold? The 6-10 day outlook indicates wetter and cooler than normal the last several days of February.

If you would like to remain up-to-date, the Sacramento office of the National Weather Service has weather data broadcast via radio continuously from two transmitters. One is on Jackson Butte in Amador County, KEC-57, 162.55 mHz., the other on Wolf Mountain in Nevada County, WWF, 162.40 mHz. Forecasts are revised at 3:30 and 9:30 a.m. and 3:30 and 9:30 p.m. Severe weather watches and warnings are issued as weather conditions dictate.
