When you call the Chief first, precious moments are lost getting the right people and equipment to the scene. If you do not have an emergency and Leo is not at the station, please show Leo some courtesy and call again later. I have known Leo for a good many years, and have found him to be a nice guy who can't say no. He has an equally wonderful family, his wife Chris and his son Nathaniel. When we disturb Leo's "away" time we also affect his family and their "quality time" together. It is easy to forget that the Fire Chief is also a husband and a father. One phone call may not be a big deal, but when

everyone does it, it gets to be a big deal. Let's learn to give the Chief a little more space and the opportunity to have of a life.

PET SKUNKED???

FINNON LAKE UPDATE

You have probably been wondering over the past months, "What in the world is happening at Finnon Lake?" It doesn't appear that anything has changed there, and you haven't received any recent news from the Mosquito Byte, so it's high time for an update, I'd say.

Unfortunately, the reason you haven't had any news of Finnon lately is that there's not much to tell. Yes, there is still a lot of work going on behind the scenes, but it hasn't translated into visible progress, which has been a source of frustration to all of us. The main projects we are working on right now are: rehabilitation and reopening of the restaurant, complete installation of the water line, and the eventual repair of the dam.

First, the restaurant: we have been stuck in the same position for quite some time now, and that is that we can not begin the remodeling of the building until we have a building permit. And we can not get a building permit until we have acceptable plans drawn up by an architect or engineer. We have been working on this for more than a year; first with a person who agreed to help us at low cost, who ended up wasting a whole lot of time and coming up with something unacceptable to the county. Then we were fortunate enough to have Vic Garcia donate some time to work on the half-completed plans, but he can't do everything that needs to be done. Thanks, Vic, we really appreciate your assistance! But now we are still at the same juncture of needing

a qualified architect/engineer to prepare our plans in a form that is acceptable to the county. Please help us find someone! If you know of anyone who can do this job, WE WILL PAY!! We just need to get it moving. If you know of anyone who may be able to help us, please call me at 622-7019, or call Leo at the fire station at 626-9017.

Secondly, we are about ready to finish the installation of the waterline to the Finnon property. This will involve crossing Rock Creek Road at one point, which requires a lot of additional engineering, permits, etc. Now that we have tentatively found a contractor who is both willing and qualified to do the work, we may need volunteers to help with the job. We could use people with skills ranging from directing traffic to hoisting a shovel. If you may be able to spare a day or even a few hours to help with this, please call Debbie Minor at 621-3533.

Lastly, the dam repair plans are also progressing. We have commitments from an organization which will do the work, but we need to have the plans finalized and approved, and then find the money! We're sorry to say that the lake will not be filled up again this summer, but if we can start the work fairly soon, maybe we can salvage part of next summer.

This is quicker to fix than it looks and is well worth your time.

Garlic Broccoli

1 bunch broccoli (about 1½ lbs.)

6 cloves garlic

1 cup chicken broth (homemade or canned)

1/4 t salt (or to taste)

¼ t pepper

Cut florets from broccoli, about 6 cups. Peel stalks and slice thinly lengthwise.

Crush garlic with knife blade, or mince. Put garlic into a large deep skillet with chicken broth, salt and pepper. Bring to a boil. Reduce heat, add broccoli. Cover and simmer 5 to 7 minutes or until broccoli is crisp-tender.

IT RAINED AGAIN!

Some locales, if one doesn't like the current weather or climate, the natives will tell you to wait five minutes, it'll change. Of course, feast or famine California, the change may take 30 days or so. And location, location, location. That applies to climate as well as real estate: latitude, elevation and distance inland.

The thirty day rainless period ended on April 12. The 24 hour total measured at 8:00 AM PDT: (y'all did spring forward and didn't bite on April first?) was 0.76". Morning of the 14th, 0.72", skipped a day, then 0.11" and 0.56" on the 16th and 17th. The morning of the 18th had 0.75" and the 19th only 0.04". That brings the total to 2.94". And the season total now stands at 44.35". Adding ten percent to the Placerville season average through April (37.39"), the result is 41.13"; we're still about 3" above normal.

The balmy spring....almost summer-like....days chilled out as cool air began filtering over northern California. High temperatures that pushed into the upper seventies (even briefly peaked in the low eighties) cooled to the low seventies. Upper atmosphere high pressure nudged north toward the Gulf of Alaska. Tapping the cold Arctic air, the wind flow along the high eastern flank drove the out of season cold air south. While the Jet Stream remained well north, the abandoned cold air pool lingered off the coast. Far enough south, the southern end picked up moisture provided April's couple of inches of wet stuff. The extremely cold air aloft (minus 22°F) prompted winter storm watches and warnings for the High Sierra.

But southern California was not bypassed. Showers and thunderstorms peppered the LA area. Early Tuesday morning (the 18th) the cold air and a 103 mph southwest wind at 35 thousand feet produced the strong turbulence attested by Long Beach reporting cumulonimbus clouds; Santa Ana observing moderately developed cumulus clouds. Palm Springs reported light rain. And Arizona's Grand Canyon reported light snow at 4:00 PM Tuesday afternoon, April 18th. At that states southern end, Douglas had blowing dust from a gusty 30 mph wind. That upper

level jet over the LA basin and Arizona is one of the factors that three USAF meteorologists in 1951 showed to be responsible for producing severe thunderstorms.

It was a bit scary as a wildfire blazed near Placerville, close to Mosquito Road. The light fuels dry quickly. The recent rain may produces some fresh grasses in late summer or early autumn. Rain in May would be a factor for the production of additional amounts of light fuel. The National Weather Service furnishes daily forecasts to the El Dorado and Tahoe National Forests and to the Nevada, Placer, Yuba, Amador and El Dorado CDF units. There is an extended outlook which brings the forecast out five days.

So what does the end of April harbor weatherwise? Easter Sunday is the problem. Rain is indicated for the northern end of the state...how far south you ask? Let's go out on a limb and suggest Butte and Plumas counties briefly Saturday evening before Easter. Then the end of the month should have those pesky, gusty north winds...one-day or three day? With systems hinting at an accelerated pattern movement, one-day is a reasonable choice,

Oh come summertime! When the "living is easy." The biggest headache is how deep, how strong, how cool the marine air intrusion from the upwelling coastal California Current will be.
