BE PREPARED FOR WINTER

With fall here and the coming of winter it is time to be a little more prepared for the cold, rain and possibly some snow that will soon be here. Being prepared means doing a little planning and a lot of prevention. With the possibility of there being snow there could be some power outages. In that case you should have a small supply of food and water to get you through a couple of days. Do not forget to have extra medications available in case it is difficult to get to a pharmacy for a period of time. Also, those in the house that have special needs such as seniors, small children and infants should have additional supplies available. Battery flashlights and white gas lanterns are also handy to have around. If your house has a heating system that requires electricity in order to operate, then an alternative heating source such as a wood stove or a pilot light driven propane furnace should be considered. Good all season or snow tires along with chains and extra gasoline should also be planned for and available before serious winter conditions set in.

The best way to keep from having a serious problem develop is to do as much as possible to prevent it. If you have a wood stove then it is critical that before it gets any use it be properly inspected and cleaned. This should be done by a professional chimney sweep who will start at the top of the chimney and inspect and clean all the way to the bottom of the stove. The cost of an inspection is a great deal less than the damages caused to a flue or the possible loss of the house due to a chimney fire. Propane furnaces and central heating systems also require periodic inspections and preventative maintenance procedures.

Not only is this a safe thing to do but with the cost of propane being what it is, and the cost is expected to increase, the more efficient a heating unit is the more money saved. Now is the time to have propane delivered so there is not the possibility of running out on a cold day. It is also cheaper now than it will be in January or February.

One other area that needs to be looked at as a preventative measure is the way we drive. Driving a vehicle on Mosquito Road in the middle of winter should be done differently than in August. There is always the possibility of slippery roads, black ice, and just bad conditions to deal with in winter and that should require each of us to slow down a little and be a great deal more cautious. Every winter we respond to vehicle accidents, usually on Mosquito Road, where someone rams their shiny new SUV into a tree and the first thing they tell me when I arrive is, "I don't understand, it is 4 wheel drive." Yeah, 4 wheel drive does provide you with a little more traction but it is not an excuse to drive fast when road conditions are bad. Commercials on TV showing drivers running their 4 wheel drives on all kinds of nasty roads always have on the bottom of them the statement, "professional driver on a closed course." Never will you see a commercial showing how, if you drive your vehicle like an idiot on Mosquito Road, you will survive just because it has 4 wheel drive. The best asset we can have to driving in the winter is called common sense.

Also, remember that with winter there are such activities as skiing and snowboarding. Be careful and enjoy the next few months.

On September 22nd these groups came to the aid of the Mosquito Fire Department by volunteering to lay a water line across the road. Without their donations the fire department would have had to spend \$7,000 to 10,000 for the waterline. The line is necessary for remodeling the restaurant at Finnon Lake.

This work project is part of the ongoing effort by the Mosquito Fire Department and community members to rebuild the dam, restore the lake, and reestablish the restaurant at Finnon Lake. The Lake is an essential asset to fire fighting in the area as well as an economic benefit and source of recreation for the community. The lake level was lowered when the dam failed to meet earthquake safety standards.

THE FREMONT TREE

(reprinted, with permission from the editor Earl Perry, from the September 2000 Tailings, newsletter of the El Dorado County Historical Society. It is known locally as "the gnarled oak".)

A slab of what has become known as the Fremont Tree, a 400-500 year old blue oak, is currently sitting in the lobby of County Building "C", 2850 Fairlane Court, Placerville.

El Dorado Supervisor Ray Nutting has requested the help of the Society in developing a display suitable to the tree and the county's history.

The once large tree derives its name from mention as a natural landmark in the journals of John Fremont and Kit Carson, who were among the first explorers in our region.

The tree that once sat on Buckboard Road in Mosquito fell during a heavy rainfall in 1994. In 1995 Nutting and Gordon Vicini, with permission of the land owners, retrieved a large (approximately 6 feet in diameter) section. Considerable work has been done by Nutting to preserve the tree slice, and with help from the Society, a time line in relation to the tree's age rings will trace significant national and local historical events.

When the project is completed the Historical Society will be credited with its vital role in preserving this natural artifact!

RUM CAKE

1 pkg. Duncan Hines yellow cake mix
1 pkg. vanilla instant pudding mix

AUTUMNAL VARIETIES

Variety spiced the introduction of one of the prettier times of a year. Precipitation and temperatures went on wild swings. There were two days with rain in that next-to-last week of September: but just under a quarter of an inch here. Then pleasant days and nights until a winter-like storm system plunged south. The first day, October 9th, produced 2.25 inches of rain at our place. The second day deposited .09 of an inch and, the third day checked in with a bit over .5 inch. An upper level low off the East Coast and an upper level high over the Midwest in a classic meteorological "Omega Block" slowed the West Coast low's movement markedly. The 3.09 inches of the past two rain events, added to the 1.76 inches the first days of September to produce a season total of 4.05 inches. The 3.09 so far for October is the most I've recorded since 1993.

While the bulk of the season's rain came close to a major rain event in California's weather history, the deluge from a decaying Pacific Ocean typhoon on Columbus Day, 1962 dwarfed the current total. The Feather River Basin received over two feet of rain in the three day period October 11-13. In the Sacramento Valley, Marysville got over nine inches.

Since the big rain earlier in October it has been mainly a "Severe Clear" spell, although temperatures have bounced around quite a bit. Underscoring the nearly three inches of rain from an Arctic source the early morning temperature plunged to 36° on October 12th. In the October period 10-16 the early morning lows went below 50°. And, the three day period October 10-17 highest temperatures only reached the fifties. The wood fire in the Buck Stove felt good! It wasn't too many days earlier, October 1st, that the maximum temperature was in the low nineties. In less than a fortnight, temperatures skidded from the low 90's to the mid 30's. The past five years, the October average low is 49° and the average high is 79°. October of 1995 was warm with an average high of 85° and 90° highs on the 2nd and 14th. This October, so far, is tallying an average high of 79° and an average low of 49°. Temperatures were on Jim Hind's mind several days ago when he called with a most gracious offer to share his extensive data. The conversation touched on astronomical items, especially their role in weather events.

Many years ago, Lewis Fry Richardson in *WEATHER PREDICTION* by *NUMERICAL PROCESS* wrote equations for heating and cooling due to solar and terrestrial radiation. Also, he proposed a series of equations that led to what is now termed "Numerical Weather Prediction." Some have claimed that Richardson used mathematical tools that astronomers use in charting the movement of celestial objects. Perhaps so; certainly the equations of motion will apply universally and they did in Richardson's work.

The initial work by Richardson was refined to just the physics and mathematics aspects by Philip Thompson in *NUMERICAL WEATHER ANALYSIS AND PREDICTION*. Richardson's work was published in 1922, Thompson's in 1961. From the simple six equation, six atmosphere layer model, the method now uses at least a couple dozen layers in the atmosphere and equations to filter out some inherent mathematical problems, while others enhanced and refined the meteorological physics. All the theoretical physics and high-powered math would have been for nought, except for the work of Bureau of Standards engineers, who developed radiosonde ... press calls it "weather balloon," that has been used in the United States since the late 1930's. It is a remote weather measuring device, broadcasting data when carried aloft by a balloon. A small, experimental network carried the radiosonde aloft via rocketry over a North American network in the middle 1950's. And, as technology became less expensive, simple, ground-based weather stations, similar to the kind recently installed by local television stations, to relay data by telephone line or radio signal were developed.

Now that the end of October is near, we should take a little pat on the back for seeing that Leo and crew were kept idle. Do remember that Halloween is due. Be careful where lighted candles and other flammable objects are used or placed. "Trick or Treat" should be just for some sweets or other goodies for the "Wee Ones" that come calling. And a Happy All Hallows Day to everyone!

Disaster Preparedness for Dog & Cat Owners

(This article is based on a pamphlet from the California Dept. of Food & Agriculture, Animal Health & Food Safety Services)

BEFORE

- ✧ As pets may not be allowed inside emergency shelters, determine the best place to leave your pet.
- ✧ Dogs and cats should have properly fitting collars, personal identification, rabies and license tags. Keep a photo of each pet.
- ✧ Maintain a disaster preparedness supply kit.
- ✧ Store important animal documents in a zip-lock bag - include vaccination and medical records.
- ✧ Have vaccinations current.
- ✧ Have a pet carrier and leash for each pet.
- ✧ Ask a trusted neighbor to check on your animals in case you are not home.

DURING

- If you take your pet:
 - ✧ Evacuate your pet early, if possible.
 - ✧ Take your disaster preparedness kit with your pet.
- If you can't take your pet with you:
 - ✧ Bring pet indoors. Use a room with no windows but adequate ventilation such as a bathroom.

- ✪ Do not leave pets chained outdoors.
- ✪ Leave only dry foods and fresh water in non-spill containers.
- ✪ House cats and dogs separately.

AFTER

- ✪ Pet behavior may change after an emergency. Monitor your pets closely and keep them leashed.

☛ The top ten causes of fire, ranked in order: smoking, electrical wiring, cooking and heating equipment, kids playing with matches, sparks and open flames, flammable liquids, arson, chimney and flues, lightning, spontaneous ignition. 13% of residential fires and almost 33% of deaths by fire are caused by cigarettes. 61% of accidental deaths in the home are attributable to falls. Burns account for 13% of the deaths; suffocation and choking for 8% and poisoning for 11%.

☛ The address where Mrs. O'Leary's cow presumably kicked over a lantern, starting the Chicago fire in 1871, is now the address of the Chicago Fire Academy.

☛ Three firefighters were responding to a report of a fire in East Windsor, New Jersey when a fire broke out on their fire truck, igniting their hoses. They had to be treated for inhaling toxic fumes.

☛ The firehouse in Thurston County, Washington, caught on fire and was burning away while the firefighters slept inside it. A passing police officer turned in the alarm.


☛ When the state fire marshal sent an investigator to seven fire stations in Manchester, New Hampshire, 256 fire safety problems were found. The previous year one of the city's oldest stations burned down while the crew was out on a call.

The mood of the day was somewhat diminished when building inspectors came to give it the once-over and immediately ordered that a fire escape be installed.


