#### BE PREPARED

First of all, I hope everyone had a good Christmas. It is just hard to believe how quickly the year has passed. It just seems that we were recently trying to figure out how we were all going to survive the great 2000 millennium problem. Well we did survive despite all the doomsday hype that went along with it.

As we look back over the past year there is a great deal we do have to be thankfull for. The winter was a great one as it was rather warm with just enough rain to get us through, compared to some winters where there has been either too much rain or not enough, or way too much snow with all the problems that brings. The summer was a terrific one. It started out somewhat hot with all kinds of predictions of California burning up. Ended up being a little below normal temperature wise and a little above normal humidity wise. As far as the fire season went it was very guite not only for our District but for the State in general. Compared to the rest of the country, California was very fortunate as it turned out to be one of the slowest fire seasons in many years. From a medical standpoint the District had fewer than normal responses and the majority of the ones we did have were not as tragic as we have seen them in the past. We did have several members of our community pass away and they are missed. We also had a few born and they are truly welcomed.

All in all the past year even though it was supposed to start out with all kinds of new problems turned out to be nothing more than an average one and for that we should all be grateful.

Now, when looking at next year we are once again getting dire predictions of bad things happening. The main terrible forecast being the one of electrical rolling blackouts and the shortages of fuels such as propane.

If these events come true then we have no choice but to roll with the punches and do our best to get through it. A rolling electrical blackout should be handled the same way as a winter storm. Losing power up here is not as common as it used to be but still does happen and we should be prepared for it. Extra flashlights, candles, lanterns should be available and in working condition. If you haven't tested your lanterns lately now is a good time. Also, check the amount of fuel you have available. If your heating system requires electricity to work try to obtain a backup-heating source. A wood stove is the most common up here. Before you use it though it should be checked for safety reasons and the chimney cleaned. As far as propane, I don't think it will be as scarce as it will be expensive. Over the past several years there has been a move in our community to go from wood and electric heating sources to propane. Now, I believe that about 80% of the homes in our community use propane as the main heating source. Beside paying the price the only other recourse is to use an alternative heating supply and again up here that is probably a wood stove. Maybe one good thing will come out of this energy manipulation and shortages scenario we are being forced to deal with and that will be the development and utilization of other energy alternatives.

If anyone is dependent on an oxygen generator to support they're breathing or requires electricity for health needs please let us at the fire department know. We have a portable emergency generator for that specific reason and we are willing to bring it to your house to run your oxygen or other medical equipment. We also have extra oxygen tanks at the fire station as a back up. So please let us know, we can help. This generator is only for emergency use, it will only be available for emergency reasons.

The Sheriff's Office has told us that rolling black outs may be a reality for the next several months. They have also assured us that Marshall Hospital, certain critical County buildings, and the phone system will not be impacted. So if you do have an emergency and need help please call 911. We will then be dispatched and on our way.



In the meantime lets take life one day at a time, be safe in the process of doing that, hope for the best, and plan for the worse. Be careful and have a good New Year.

## is it winter yet?

Christmas should be over (except for the bill-paying) and the midnight bash known as New Year's Eve is just a few days away when this edition of weather news arrives.

The last six months of 2000 were relatively quiet. We did have those snow sprinkles around Veteran's Day, but 'twas more of a tease than anything else. Even the raindrops were somewhat scarce... no deluges ("frog stranglers"..."gully washers"). The sixmonth total is close to normal.

The average six-month total for this portion of the Sierra Nevada foothills is about 12 to 18 inches ranging from 11.50 in Auburn, 11.75 at Sonora to near 13.66 at Placerville. To the north, Nevada City and Grass Valley are the "damp" ones. At 3150 feet elevation, Nevada City's average half-year total is nearly 20 inches (19.86) and Grass Valley's is 17.90. My current year total through December 19th is 12.36 inches. Compare that with the six-month normal of 13.03. One minor rarity did show up: in the records the first six months of 1995 had rain only in November and December. The National Weather Service's winter period out-look for November through January is near normal precipitation, so we will have to see what the rest of December and all of January bring.

The chill (cold?) hangs on. Low temperatures around Thanksgiving were in the middle 30's. There was a brief warm-up around December 7<sup>th</sup> but then the temperature went down to the lower 30's. The coldest temperature was on the morning of the 18<sup>th</sup> at 31°. And, would you believe that the highest temperatures were on the 20<sup>th</sup> of November, 71° and just one degree off on December 3<sup>rd</sup> at 70°. For the month of November I averaged a high of 59° and a low of 34°. That rounds out to a monthly average of 47°.

Much, much warmer were parts of southern California on December 18<sup>th</sup>. Check some of these 8:00 AM temperatures: along the coast from Long Beach to Oxnard and inland to Camarillo, readings in the lower 60s. And, Camarillo had that northeasterly Santa Ana wind gusting to near 40 miles per hour. But wait, there is more! Let's go to the northern plains and Rapid City where a northwesterly wind gusting to nearly 50 miles per hour brought a bone-chilling, frigid 18° temperature. The wind-chill: minus 35°. Brrrr!

Not much wind in California's Central Valley. No wind and a cold morning equals fog. Bakersfield with mist, became fog as 34° was both the temperature and the dew point. Fresno had a grey blanket as did Merced and Modesto, with temperatures in the mid 30s. Farther north in "Foggy Bottom" or "Foggy Hollow" was SMF...Sacramento International Airport. The 8:00 AM observation had the visibility down Runway 16 at only 1800 feet. And that, lads and lassies is one of the reasons why so many of us live in this part of California!

In addition to the Happy New Year, welcome the increase in the length of daylight!

## WINTER RECIPE

This recipe may have been in our *Byte* about two years ago. I'm not sure when, but it is so very good – and easy – that I thought it is worth reprinting for this winter season.

#### **SWEET POTATO PUFF**

3 cups cold mashed sweet potatoes (nothing added) ½ cup granulated sugar

½ cup butter or margarine, melted. Do not use low fat spread.

2 eggs, well beaten

1/3 cup milk

1 tsp. vanilla extract

½ cup coconut - flaked or shredded

**Topping** 

1/2 cup brown sugar, packed

½ cup chopped pecans

2 tbs. butter or margarine, melted

1/4 cup all purpose flour

In mixing bowl, beat potatoes, sugar, butter, eggs, milk and vanilla until fluffy. Stir in coconut. Spoon into a greased 2 ½ quart baking dish. Combine topping ingredients in small bowl until well blended. Sprinkle over sweet potatoes. Bake, uncovered at 350° for 35-40 minutes.

## MOSQUITO ROAD ASSOCIATION MEETING

During the past years Mosquito Road has become increasingly more damaged due in part to the increase in traffic and in part to the lack of maintenance. This problem with Mosquito Road has prompted a desire to pressure the Department of Transportation into performing some very needed repairs and changes. As with everything there is strength in numbers. So it seemed appropriate to form an association to present to DOT a list of changes and repairs that our community felt was necessary to provide as safe a road as possible into our Mosquito community. Our first meeting was on Wednesday the 29th November at 7:30 at the Fire Station. There was a great turn out, 38 residents present. Here is a sincere Thank You to all who attended. We had a fairly positive and orderly meeting, with an abundant flow of great ideas. I was so pleased to see such a diverse group of our community join together to tackle the task of prioritizing needed repairs and changes to our road. Of the more then a dozen items listed as major issues. to my amazement road signs topped the list! I didn't expect road signs to have such importance, but after hearing the discussion it seemed appropriate for signage to take first seat. Please keep in mind this group had early on decided that our best approach would be to address those issues that had the greatest chance of being accomplished. We also felt that if we started with items that DOT could accomplish we could express our appreciation and hopefully increase cooperation between DOT and our community.

The type of signs which appeared to be of importance included those to redirect large vehicles to our alternate route (Rock Creek) to Placerville, a sign to remind motorist to yield to uphill traffic. Others were a yield sign at Rock Creek and Mosquito Road intersection, Icy road sign north and south of the area between Mosquito Creek and the Goat Doctors. Also it was determined that a sign advising pedestrians that foot traffic on Mosquito Bridge was not advised. There were others discussed, including a sign at 193 and Rock Creek showing that our community really is at the end of the never ending road.

The next item was the narrow stretch of road just above the Cement Bridge (waterfall) on the Placerville side of the American River. There were a few people in attendance who had blown a tire while dodging an on-coming motorist. The group felt that if the ditch was cleared and the pavement extended to the hill, there would be approximately two feet more roadway.

Our third issue was the edges of the road and our turnouts. As we all know, we must drive on the edge of the road. But with the increase of damage to these edges more and more people are driving in the middle of the road. This practice is making travel on Mosquito

Road increasingly dangerous. With the edges repaired we could drive in an area that would provide a safe distance between motorists. The turnouts are also of great importance. I have been proud of how our community, over any other I've seen, uses turnouts. This practice is very considerate to other drivers, and shows the thoughtfulness of the members of our community. With the degradation of the roadway it has become increasingly difficult to use our turnouts.

Our next issue was the repair of dangerous corners. There are many corners, which are blind and/or have rock out-croppings on the inside area. These include the turn prior to the switchbacks where the guardrail is, and also the turn where Mosquito Cut-off Road intersects Mosquito Road. Our group felt that repairing these turns would increase the safety factor on our road greatly. Other turns include the one at Mosquito and La Paz and the switchback prior to the bridge.

Our last issue was the chip seal of the entire stretch of Mosquito Road from Union Ridge to the end of the pavement. The resurfacing would help with the lcy areas as well as provide a seal to prevent water from undermining what road we have left. There were other issues that need to be addressed, but it seemed advantageous to start with the issues presented so as not to totally overwhelm DOT. As further information is gathered and as the list is addressed by DOT, I will present the information via the *Mosquito Byte*.

The next meeting of the Mosquito Road Association will be held on January 17<sup>th</sup> at 7:30 at the Mosquito Fire Station. Thanks to all who gave up their evening to address this needed road problem. For more information or comments you may call me (Ron Stone) at 622-1585


