With the start of the New Year there is the closing out of the old year. In looking back over the last year, the one with the Y2K end of the world computer problems, the predicted worst fire season ever and so on went all the predictions. In reality it was a very slow year as far as the fire department was concerned. Not only was our District running fewer incidents but also so were the County and even the state. While the rest of the west was burning up California was very fortunate and had an abnormally slow fire season.

Last year the fire department responded to 99 incidents. Rather slow considering we normally average around 150 incidents. What I don't understand is we responded to more requests for service 10 years ago then we are now. Yet, the population has more than doubled as well as the number of homes and the amount of traffic. This business has a tendency to run in cycles, and I guess this past year has been part of that down cycle. I'm not looking forward to when things get back to normal and we start responding more.

Last year we responded to 38 medical calls, the most common call we do now. These are calls that result in a patient being transported to a hospital to receive more advanced care. Fortunately the majority of these calls have positive results with people coming back home. However, last year we did unfortunately have several people pass away. The volunteers and I

know the majority of people on this hill and whenever anyone does pass away it does have more of an affect on us.

Another thing we do is put in the category of public assist. These are the types of calls that can be fun. amusing, and sometimes complex. These are the ones I like to do the most for it gives us an opportunity to help someone who is not really having a serious emergency but simply needs a hand, a little direction or just some support. Last year we responded to 30 public assist calls, ranging from getting a cat out of the tree to helping someone start their car. Yeah, we are still one of the few fire departments that will give you a hand getting your cat out of a tree. That type of a call is a real tough one sometimes as cats are very independent but weird animals. Most of the time when they are in a tree and you go up to get them they kind of go higher. Last year Stu Frazier had one where he went up to the cat and it climbed down and got in his arms. I still tell people I have never seen a cat skeleton in a tree but they are sure theirs will be the first so we will come up and try to get the beastie down. Another assist call was when a girl got trapped in her bathroom when the door lock broke. That was an easy one as we good at tearing doors down. Another area of public assist calls are those we call welfare checks. Often, we will receive a phone call from someone outside of the area who had not heard from a relative for some time. We will go up and check them out and make sure everything is all right.

With good ole Mosquito Road being what it is and the way people drive it we had 11 dispatched vehicle accidents last year. Now these are the ones we are dispatched to and I do know there are many more we do not even know about. That is evident when driving into town I notice new skid marks, or bark taken off a tree and dirt removed from the shoulder of the road. Many accidents take place and people do not want the CHP or an insurance company to know about it so they haul out as fast as possible. Considering the way things are with the road and the many people driving it I am surprised we are not dispatched to more

accidents.



As with most fire departments now days responding to actual fires is one of the least things you do. In fact medical aids make up about 80% of what the average fire department does on a nation wide basis. Last year we responded to 2 vehicle fires, 2 structure fires, 6 wild land fires and 4 mutual aid assignments for wild land fires in other districts. One of the vehicle fires resulted in the complete lost of the truck while the other no big deal. One of the structure fires was a chimney fire that extended into the roof burning off about 10% of the roof. The Volunteers did a terrific job in saving that house as it had a great potential of a total loss of the structure. Of the wild land fires 2 were not much more than little roadside spot fires. One turned out to be a dispatch at around midnight for a wild land fire out on Mosquito Road in the National Forest. On that one we did not find a fire but I believe who ever turned it in was seeing the lights at the Sierra Pacific Lumber Mill in Camino. Of the other 3 wild land fires one was for a fire on Mosquito Road in the Placerville area and the other 2 were fires on Rock Creek Road in Garden Valley's District. One of those was on a real windy day when a control burn on Rock Creek Road almost to Highway 193 got out of control. Garden Valley was too busy to go to it so we were dispatched and managed to get there just as the fire was at the back deck of the house. We were busy there for a few minutes but did manage to save the house.

All in all the year 2000 despite all its dire predictions was a rather slow one. Let's hope that this new year is just as slow or even better a little slower. However, if you do need us do not hesitate to call 911, we will be on our way.

Winter from a weather standpoint has not really gotten here yet so please be careful out there on the roads.

## Anamam a manam a

I'm sure you've all noticed how often the heater turns on, or how quickly the stove wood burns away. Then there's that white stuff (frost) on rooftops, decks, grass, and the one way bridge.

The tail-end of December was somewhat mild; the high temperatures averaged in the low sixties (63.1) the last dozen days. And, the low temperatures averaged in the mid-sixties (66.3) for the same period.

The new year ushered in a quintet of days that clustered around seventy degrees for high readings. But, after that it was all down hill. Cold, polar air kept the average high temperature for the next twenty days about a dozen degrees colder at 50.5. All the while, morning low temperatures skidded colder. The last days of December averaged 36 degrees and the first 20 days of January averaged 33.

Several days, just before deadline, the low

temperatures dropped to the low and mid-twenties. On the 17<sup>th</sup> of January, with a 22 on my minimum thermometer, I checked temperatures at ten in the morning over western Canada. Dawson, in the Yukon, reported a minus 6 degrees, calm wind, and a partly sunny sky. And, Old Crow, 75 miles north of the Arctic Circle, reported nine degrees below zero. While the weather was generally fair over the Yukon, barometric pressure was relatively low.

Mostly high pressure over northern California led to fog in the Sacramento Valley, but mostly sunny skies here. A few days before Christmas a weak system dropped nearly a third of an inch of rain in my gauge. That brought the first half of the 2000-2001 rainy season total to 12.67 inches. Contrast that total with the January 2000 total of 14.04 inches (it rained 12 days in a row!). But, the weather was relatively benign until the start of the second week of January.

Polar air plunged rapidly south with minor ripples in the wind flow dropping scant moisture as they moved inland over northern California. One developed into a strong low pressure area along the central California coast, then charged inland over southern California, nearly swamping the south state. Pictures of the satellite and radar visuals were impressive; especially when presented on one page (similar to having a second screen on a home computer). The extremely white cloud cover of the satellite picture, plus the radar display below it on the same fax page provided a vivid and expressive view of the weather system.

The radar view had cloud tops to 23 thousand feet (high for winter thunderstorms) merging with the very bright white cloud display on the satellite picture. As the system moved over the L.A. area, Avalon on Catalina Island, had its automatic weather station reporting heavy rain, very poor visibility, and a cool 46 degrees at four in the afternoon on Saturday the 13<sup>th</sup> of January. Earlier in that week, Beaumont reported a mixture of rain and snow with a visibility of just one mile and an out-of-character temperature of 34 degrees at 8:00 a.m. January 11<sup>th</sup>.

That very cold air had been sitting over much of California thereafter. Around here, morning low temperatures had varied throughout the twenties until the morning of the 19<sup>th</sup> when a relatively warm 37 degrees was measured. For those with freeze sensitive items out-of-doors, the warmth must have been most welcome. A cloud blanket overhead is great.

With the cloudiness comes the promise of rain. Clouds, while necessary, may not be sufficient to produce rainfall. We'll see what the Inauguration Weekend brings to our area: a mixture of rain, sleet, snow was indicated for the Washington, D. C. area.

Remember, in just a few days it will be

Groundhog Day with the annual glimpse into nature's choice of future weather, Spring, or more Winter.
