SNOW again AND again !

It has sure been an interesting month. Seems the biggest change has been in the weather. We have had about four snowstorms so far, at least that is how many times we have put the chains on all the equipment. We leave them on for a while and when we take the things off the weather changes and we end up putting them back on. One problem we have in our District is the elevation changes very quickly. The west end of the District is only about 1,500 feet high while the east end is around 3,000 feet. The fire station is at 2,500 feet and it usually works out that if we have six inches of snow at the station there is none at the west end and about 12 to 18 inches at the east end. So, we end up putting on chains when there is 6 inches of snow at the station. We leave them on for quite awhile even after the roads have cleared. The main reason is that even though the roads are passable many driveways are either still covered with snow or so muddy that entry with a 32,000-pound fire engine can be very difficult without chains. With the water tenders weighing around 48,000 pounds it can be almost impossible. In most cases if we are responding to a house fire

we stop the engines at the driveway entrance dropping off the supply line and then drive the engines down the driveway even it means getting them stuck. Attack lines are then taken from the engine to the house. Water tenders remain on the road pumping water into the supply line hooked to the engine.

With the past snow storms we have received many phone calls at the fire station from people asking when we will snow plow the roads. Some people get downright angry when we tell them we don't plow roads we do medical calls, fight fires and get cats out of trees. Then when they see the County plow Mosquito Road and Rock Creek Road they really get mad because the roads in Swansboro don't get plowed. They have a hard time believing the County only does County roads and not private roads. The next response we get is what are you going to do if my house catches on fire. We tell them we will respond no matter how bad the roads are, that is one reason why we put chains on everything. The Fire Department has a policy and the Fire Fighters understand that they are to respond the equipment needed for the emergency and do their best to get to the incident even if it means getting everything stuck. In the past we have gotten some of it stuck but fortunately we have managed to always get at least one piece of equipment to an incident.

The biggest problem we have is the same one that everyone seems to have when there is a lot of snow on the roads. The Fire Fighters are responding from their homes and simply cannot get to the station because they end up getting stuck. There have been times in the past when we have had a great deal of snow that some of the fire fighters have managed to make it to the station and just spent the night upstairs.

Most people are usually concerned about a fire in their house and the fire department not being able to get there. What they really need to realize is that the majority of incidents we go to are medical in nature. With one of the last snowfalls we had a little girl injured in a sledding accident and the



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ambulance responding out here was not able to make it out here because of all the car wrecks on Mosquito Road around Union Ridge. Fortunately, her injuries were not that serious and it was possible for her to be transported to the hospital by taking Rock Creek Road. Every ambulance in El Dorado County is four wheel drive but the problem again is not always the snow on the roads but the idiots driving on the roads that end up sideways, inside out and upside down on Mosquito Road. If an ambulance from Placerville cannot make it out here on Mosquito Road I ask for an ambulance out of Diamond Springs to respond by way of Rock Creek Road. The response time is longer but at least it can make it out here. Our primary first response equipment for medical calls is an all wheel drive 1 1/2 ton Rescue/Squad and with chains on all the wheels it is a hard unit to stop. The command unit I drive is an all wheel drive and is complete with medical supply equipment and when I put chains on all four wheels it goes just about anywhere. Be assured that we will respond, if weather conditions are real severe it may take us awhile but we will get there. In the past we have had to push stuck cars out of the road, cut fallen trees off the road, go cross country and even walk if necessary.

The best thing to do when the weather gets real bad is to simply do as little as possible, and be wise doing it. Staying inside the house and enjoying the snow outside is a very good thing to do, it sure cuts the odds on anything bad happening. What really surprises me is how when it starts to snow how badly some people want to go to town. They call the station wanting to know how bad the roads are and if they can make it to town. I always tell them the truth and then advise them to simple stay home unless it is an absolute necessity involving life or death. They always tell me they are an excellent driver and they will have no problem, and I tell them that no matter how good they are there are a lot of idiots out there using the same road and have no idea on how to drive on snowy roads. Then they ask me if they should take Mosquito Road or Rock Creek Road, I advise them to take Rock Creek Road and then they tell me they think they will take Mosquito anyway. Oh well.

Winter is still around. If it is really snowing outside and things are just really bad be careful.

NATURE'S WEATHER LORE

The Pennsylvania groundhog emerged from his burrow, and so did the Georgia groundhog. The northern one, so we are told saw a shadow, then prophesied six more weeks of winter. The southern variety, shadowless, proclaimed spring.

Could both be right? Our local weather might suit each prediction. How about those first few days in February, just after Groundhog Day? I had high temperatures just a few degrees above seventy; that's Spring-like. Then it was the turn of the northern, more famous one. And, Mother Nature (a capricious lady) only one week later, turned weather topsy-turvy. Spring became Winter, again. The spring-like mornings, for a few days, went back to the low thirties and upper twenties of late January.

Checking the wind pattern and temperatures around 18,000 feet, one can really appreciate Nature's scope. The very strong upper-level high pressure began well north of the Arctic Circle. The north wind plunged south over the Yukon, thence over the Alberta and British Columbia provinces. After grazing the Pacific Northwest it settled into a small low pressure area aloft. The tight, curving wind flow generated enough lift and turbulence to wring out the moisture in that air of 20 degrees below zero.

With the cold came snow... a whole bunch of White Wonderland. I had 8.5 inches of that travel impedence... others I'm sure had more, while others had less. More at one time at our place the past several years. Pretty to look at...for a while.

So. How much water in all that snow and the rain? The last seven days of January had about 3.33 inches of rain and water equivalent (snow-melt) to bring January's total to 5.59 inches. Nearly all the precipitation in February was snow, only a few tenths rain. The mornings of February 10th and 11th had the most; 0.74 and 0.96 inches respectively. And, that's when I had a snow fall of 2.5 inches on the 10th and 3.0 inches on the 11th.

Through the 19th of February the month has 2.81 inches of precipitation. The seasonal accumulation is 21.07 inches. Through the end of February, the seasonal total should be around 29 to 30 inches. However, weather systems lined up over the Pacific Ocean, could boost our February precipitation total considerably. Early Monday morning (February 19th) showed one frontal system north-south oriented along the California north coast. About 1800 miles farther west, near 150 West Longitude is another. And the third system is on the other side of the date-line about 170 East Longitude. They should keep us cloudy and wet most of the week. And, the upper level analysis hints at milder temperatures as the wind flow aloft is essentially from west to east; cold Arctic air flowing over southern Canada and the northeastern United States would have the low temperatures averaging in the low forties rather than near freezing as the past thirty days. And, the high temperatures would be in the upper- fifties instead of the middle forties (occasionally in the thirties?) not too long ago.

The Northeast (University of Massachusetts) is working with Mexico to establish a 50 meter telescope. It is to be put atop a 15,000 foot mountain about half-way between Mexico City and Veracruz (sometimes Vera Cruz). There is a strong push for better and more detailed astronomical research: remember the note about the Atacama site in Chile a couple of months ago?

ORTEGA CHILE FIESTA BAKE

A nice, quick to make, one dish meal. Add a salad and you have dinner. Yum!

- 1 lb ground beef
- 1 c. (1 small) chopped onion
- ¾ c. Ortega Thick and Chunky Salsa (or brand of your choice)
- 1 pkg. (1.25 oz.) Taco seasoning mix
- ¼ c. water
- 1 c. (or 1 can) whole kernel corn
- ½ c. (2 ¼ oz. can) sliced ripe olives, drained
- 1 pkg. (8½ oz.) Jiffy corn bread mix
- 1 c. (4 oz.) shredded cheddar cheese
- ½ c. (4 oz. can) Ortega diced green chilies.

Cook beef and onion until brown. Drain. Stir in salsa, seasoning mix and water. Cook over low heat for 5 - 6 minutes or until mixture thickens. Stir in corn and olives. Spoon into 8 inch square baking dish.

Prepare batter for muffin mix according to package directions. Stir in cheese and chilies. Spread over meat mixture.

Bake in preheated 350° for 30 -35 minutes.

DIARY OF A CALIFORNIA COUPLE WHO MOVES EAST TO GET AWAY FROM EARTHQUAKES"

Jan 24 5:00 p.m. It's starting to snow. The first of the season, and the first snow we've seen in years. The wife and I took our hot buttered rums and sat by the window watching the snowflakes drift down; clinging to the trees and covering the ground. It was beautiful.

Jan 25 We woke to a lovely blanket of crystal white snow covering the landscape. What a fantastic sight! Every tree and shrub was covered with a beautiful white mantle. I shoveled snow for the first time in years and loved it. I did both our driveway and our sidewalk. Later, the city snowplow came along and accidentally covered up our driveway with compacted snow from the street, but the driver smiled and waved, and I waved back and shoveled it again.

Jan 26 It snowed an additional five inches last night and the temperature has dropped to around 11 degrees. Several limbs on the trees and shrubs snapped due to the weight of the snow. I shoveled our driveway again. Shortly afterwards, the snowplow came by and did his trick again. Much of the snow is now brownishgrey.

Jan 27 Warmed up enough during the day to create some slush, which soon became ice when the temperature dropped again. Bought snow tires for both cars. Fell on my ass in the driveway. \$145 for chiropractor, but nothing broken. More snow and ice expected.

Jan 28 Still cold. Sold wife's car and bought a 4x4 in order to get her to work. Slid into the guardrail and did considerable amount of damage to the right rear quarter panel. Had another 8 inches of the white crap last night. Both vehicles covered with salt and crud. More shoveling in store

for me today. That damn snowplow came by twice today.

Jan 29 8 degrees outside. More freakin' snow. Not a tree or shrub on our property that hasn't been damaged. Power was off most of the night. Tried to keep from freezing to death with candles and a kerosene heater, which tipped over and nearly burned the house down. I managed to put the flames out, but suffered second degree burns on my hands and lost all my eyebrows and eyelashes. Car slid on the ice on the way to the emergency room and was totaled.

Jan 30 @%^&@# white crap keeps coming down! Have to put on all the clothes we own just to get to the freakin' mailbox. If I ever catch the sonofa--- that drives that freakin' snowplow, I'll chew open his chest and rip out his heart. I think he hides around the corner and waits for me to finish shoveling, then comes down the street about 100 mph and buries our driveway again! Power still off. Toilet froze and part of the roof has started to cave in.

Jan 31 Six more freakin' inches of freakin' snow and freakin ice and God knows what other kind of white freakin' crap fell last night. I wounded the freakin' snowplow jackass with an ice ax, but he got away. The wife left me, the car won't start, and I think I'm going snow-blind. I can't move my toes, haven't seen the sun in weeks, and there's more snow predicted. Wind chill: 22 freakin' degrees below zero. I'm moving back to California.
