A CHALLENGING INCIDENT

At 6:15 in the morning on April the 11th a young woman had a vehicle accident on Mosquito Road in the area where the road starts to narrow and drop off into the canyon. Her vehicle struck the bank on the east side of the road and then swerved off the right side going over the edge. The vehicle rolled over several times but ended up on its wheels about 40 feet over the edge.

She was fortunate that morning as there were many volunteer fire fighters who had not gone to work and were able to respond. An accident such as this kind can be very difficult to work and requires many volunteers to carry out all the tasks properly. In this case I was the first to arrive. I did not see the vehicle from the road but I did notice the bank had been hit and glass and other parts were on the side of the road. When I went down to the vehicle I found two people, one male with no apparent injuries and a young female still in the vehicle unable to move and complaining of severe pain in her neck. Being by myself I asked the man to hold her neck and keep it stable while I went back up to the radio to make a report to dispatch.

Within a few minutes our Squad arrived with two volunteers. We then took medical equipment down to the woman to evaluate her and stabilize her as

much as possible. Fortunately, the vehicle had stopped on its wheels and was fairly stable. It could have gone all the way down to Mosquito Creek. The roof damage was extensive due to the roll over along with front-end damage. We were able to open the driver door and push it all the way back so that we could get her out of the vehicle. Before we could do that she had to be placed on oxygen, completely assessed, and then stabilization devices were put on her neck and back so we could get her out.

Engine 275 then arrived with 5 volunteers in it. They then started setting up the stokes with backboards and all the ropes we would need to pull her and the fire fighters up the edge. This was all done in a timely manner and even then it took us about 40 minutes to get her out of the vehicle, up to the road and into an ambulance. Again, she was fortunate the volunteers were able to respond. Many of them were late for work and had to explain why.

We do not get up at 6:00 in the morning and run down to Mosquito Road and close it down just for fun or practice.

At the beginning of this incident one of the first things asked for was the blocking of Mosquito Road at Mosquito Cut-off Road. This was done by some of the Support Group members. The fire fighters could not do it as they were all busy helping the patient. Because of the time in the morning many people were on their way to town. Basically it is the equivalent of the Mosquito Road rush hour. After the incident was over some of those on the Support Group who blocked Mosquito Road told me of all the complaints they received from people who had to take Rock Creek Road.

One of the problems we have as fire fighters whenever we are working an incident on Mosquito Road between the Cut-off and the river is the



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narrowness of the road. In most cases because of the width of the road, the size of the fire equipment, the traffic and the way people drive I will order the closing of the road to keep all fire fighters and other citizens from getting hurt. In talking to those who blocked the road I was told of one lady who screamed at them and used four letter words, others who stated we were idiots for closing the road, and some who complained how inconvenient we were making their lives. We do not get up at 6:00 in the morning and run down to Mosquito Road and close it down just for fun or practice. It is only done when something is wrong, whether it is a fire, an accident or someone needing help of some kind. It is always done when the safety of a volunteer fire fighter is being jeopardized.

To those of you who were screaming and yelling at the Support Group people who diverted traffic to Rock Creek Road I can only ask that you realize that things happen and sometimes when they do you will be inconvenienced. My advice is deal with it. To those of you who offered smiles and encouragement to the fire fighters and support group, I and all of us with the fire department, thank you. A smile in a situation where bad things are happening can only make all of us feel better.

Sierra Accelerated School is accepting Registration for Kindergarten 2001-2002

Sierra Accelerated School in Placerville Union School District is accepting Kindergarten Registration for next year. Please call 622-0814 for specific instructions on how to register a child. In order to register for Kindergarten, a student must be 5 years old by December 1. Each new student must provide proof of immunization and a physical exam by the beginning of first grade.

What is an accelerated school? Sierra Accelerated School is not a school for only the gifted or advanced. The school is for all students regardless of ability or interest.

The Accelerated School Concept is a philosophy that focuses on three main points: 1) We have one common purpose (To educate all children regardless of ability, 2) Build on Strengths: We take students from where they are and move toward state standards. 3) Governance coupled with responsibility (This means parents are involved in decision making along with the staff and principal.

The Accelerated Schools Project was formulated through research from Stanford University. If you know of anyone who has a Kindergarten student, please let them know about our registration. We encourage all Kindergarten students to be pre-registered so students can participate in the "Summer Readiness Activities" we have planned. A RECIPE TO HAVE ON HAND

Want hot muffins for breakfast? This is a recipe that makes a lot of batter – but the neat thing is it can be kept in the refrigerator for up to six weeks and you can bake a few at a time. You can pop some batter into some muffin tins and bake it while you're in the shower – or put a pan full in the oven the night before and set the timer.

Bran Muffins

1 c boiling water
 1 c Kellogg's Bran Buds
 ½ c margarine or butter
 2 eggs beaten
 2 c buttermilk (see note)
 1 ½ c sugar
 2 ½ c flour
 2 ½ tsp baking soda
 ½ tsp salt
 2 c Kellogg's All Bran (original)
 grated rind of one orange

Put Bran Buds and cut up margarine in large

bowl. Pour boiling water over and cover with plastic. Let steam for 20 minutes. Add eggs, buttermilk and All Bran. Mix flour, sugar, soda and salt and add to the above. Add orange rind. Store covered in glass container in the refrigerator. Bake in muffin tins ¾ full 20 minutes at 400°

Note: Dried buttermilk works fine. Either add 8 tablespoons to the dry ingredients and add 2 cups water to the batter with the eggs, or pre mix the dried buttermilk with the water. Both ways work..

SPRING FROSTS AND SNOW

Did you notice, see, catch the boo-boo in last month's weather-whimsy. Somehow a "1" disappeared from the time it left Editor Lela's purview and the final printing. If I had left out comments about Olympic skating performance averaging there would have been no boo-boo. In the next-to-last paragraph, page 2, first column the "average of 0.77" should be 10.77 inches.

So, on whom should we place the blame'? In weather lore, there is a dastardly duo ready to be called culprits. They are none other than... Onshore Fla and Delta Eddy. These miscreants have been held accountable for a multitude of meteorological misdeeds... especially busted forecasts. But, more about them at some other time.

The snow on Palm Sunday made a lovely picture as it draped in festooning garlands over trees and fences. There was some rain, also, in my gage. Through the 18th, April measured only 2.96 inches. The last couple of weeks in March caught 0.90 inch. The past thirty days would total 3.86 inches. Don't sell April short of a normal 4.06 inches; more is in the offing. That infamous idol of TV weather, "Chet" Stream is steering cold, Gulf of Alaska storms our way. With so many frosty mornings lately, a little snow might fit right in, along with the rain. And, our season amount, through the 18th is 31.39 inches.

You've noticed the way temperatures have bounced around. The past thirty days went from warm, spring-like temperatures to that cold, wintery kind. Highs in the last dozen days of March were in the low 70's. April's highs averaged near 60 degrees. There were a few days that peaked just over 70 but Palm Sunday was no warmer than 40 degrees. With May nearly here, the average high from Grass Valley to Placerville to Sonora for that month runs about 75 degrees. But, lowest temperatures at March's end were in the mild mid-40's; through the first 19 days of April the average low was 34 degrees; and they ranged from 47 on the first to 29 on the ninth at our place At this

foothill elevation, Grass Valley, Placerville and Sonora all have managed to peak around 100 degrees, for all-time highs. At the other end, they've all managed to get down to the freezing mark. The wet Season winds down from two and a quarter inches at Grass Valley to nearly an inch and half at Sonora. And, our area fits right in. Lows have dropped down to freezing and highs have peaked in the upper 90's. We do bulge a bit in the rainfall statistics; we're about double that of Grass Valley to Sonora. The increase of about 500 to 800 feet in elevation would explain some of the difference.

As this squib is ended, a quick peek at the temperatures around 18,000 feet at 5:00 am on the 19th brings a chilly foreboding. About 500-600 miles off the Santa Barbara coast is a chunk of air at minus 13 Fahrenheit. That chunk reaches along the coast to British Columbia where it gets colder. We'll have the thunderstorms, some hail possible, those white flakes?? too. And, some of those white flakes????

Yes, we do have bears in Mosquito. One was trapped and killed last year.

Remember a fed bear is a dead bear - never feed bears.

Become Bear Aware

▶ Bears are attracted by: garbage, sweet smells, pet food, baby diapers, bird feeders, food odors, lotions, toothpaste and garden compost. Inspect your property and remove anything that might attract bears.

▶ Do not feed pets outside. Keep pet food in airtight containers, in a room closed to the outdoors.

▶ Do not leave food and baked goods sitting out near open windows and doors, or visible through closed windows.

▶ Pour Pine Sol or ammonia into every garbage

bag and rinse out all garbage containers.

▶ Use your garbage disposal.

▶ Put your garbage out ONLY on collection day.

▶ Encourage your neighbors to be bear aware.

Bear Encounters

▶ Always give bears time and space to avoid you.

▶ Never run away from a bear as this may trigger an instinct to chase

▶ Stand tall and slowly back away.

▶ Bears will sometimes "bluff charge" or "huff & blow" in an attempt to drive you away.

▶ Bears climb trees when frightened, and will not climb down if humans or dogs are present.

▶ Loud noises made by radios, whistles, or pots and pans banged together can scare away bears.

▶ Although it is very rare, if attacked by a bear, fight back!

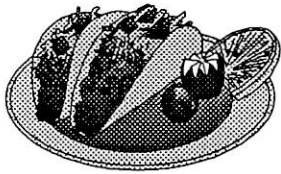
Sometimes it DOES take a Rocket Scientist (true story)

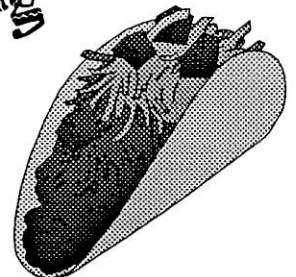
