**THANKS TO ALL WHO VOTED YES ON
MEASURE F !!!**

There were 607 ballots mailed out and 315 of the Mosquito voters voted and mailed their ballots in. Of those, 257 voted yes and 58 voted no. There are 944 parcels in the Mosquito District. At \$96 per parcel, the annual amount the Mosquito Fire Protection District received was \$90,624. At \$144 per parcel, it will be \$135,936, an increase of \$45,312. That is hardly enough to buy a new fire engine – but it will keep the District in the black and allow the District to start saving for new equipment and keep the old stuff going! The following letter from Chief Leo Chaloux says it all.

To the editors:

I want to thank all of those who voted yes for Measure F, thus providing additional funding for the fire district. This Measure has been the only measure for a fire district in the County to pass in over five years. To pass with a majority of 81% in favor of, is almost unheard of.

Without the passage of Measure F the fire district was facing a tough financial future that would have required some very difficult decisions to be made. Now with this additional funding, annual operations of the district are more secure and there will be the ability to purchase much needed equipment.

Personally for me the support of this measure means a great deal. It means the fire department, the Volunteers, the Support Group, Devery and I are doing a good job and your vote reinforces that. I want to thank you for that. We often do not get thanked for what we do and this to me is not only a thank you from the community but a vote of confidence.

**DO YOU HAVE A PLAN IN CASE OF A MAJOR
FIRE?**

As everyone probably knows the fire season has really become very active. There have been several major fires to the north and south of us but fortunately none in El Dorado County. There have been several on the west end of the county because there is a firebug working the area. The big concern there is he will pick the right day and light one off and the winds will drive it into heavily populated areas.

So far this summer we have had one engine that went to the State of Nevada on an Office of Emergency Services request. Devery Minor, George Kellison and Ken Joseph ended up fighting fire out in the middle of the desert 30 miles north of Reno. They did come back with the realization that fighting a fire in Nevada really does suck.

We were also over on the Mount Murphy fire when it took off the other day. The request then was for a water tender so I went over with Pat Keene. Good ole Mount Murphy burns about every 5 to 8 years and always starts at the bottom down by the river and goes all the way to the top. In fact I was over there about 8 years ago with the water tender and this time I was sent to the exact same place as then.

So far in our own district we have had four fires this summer. We have been very fortunate as we were able to get onto them very quickly. My only concern is that we will get one that will have a good wind on it and no matter how fast we go it will run ahead of us. There are still about 6 to 8 weeks of fire season left with the worse coming in September. With the coming of fall the change in seasons usually brings erratic weather with more winds and drier humidity than we need.

The vegetation right now is the driest I have seen in many years. This time of the year and living in this part of California should make you and your family sit down and plan for the possibility of a large fire. In doing this the following tips are provided by the El Dorado County Sheriffs Office.

Your Individual or Family Plan

The most important component of family readiness in responding to emergencies and disasters is a family plan. Your family plan does not need to be a long document. In fact, the best plans contain ten or fewer steps that family members should take during and after a disaster. A long complicated plan will be too difficult to use in a crisis. Things to think about when creating your plan include:

Make sure that all family members participate in creating the plan. This insures that everyone understands it.

Make sure that your plan includes steps for children, seniors, disabled persons, and pets.

Make sure your plan includes two meeting places: the first one near your home, and one farther away. Reuniting the family after the disaster should be a high priority.

Make sure your plan contains an "out of area" contact where family members can check in after a disaster. Pick a person who won't be affected by the same disaster you are.

Make sure your plan includes important telephone numbers such as home, office, school, pagers, cellular telephones, etc.

Make sure your plan contains the five to ten most important steps for each family member to do after a disaster. This should include what to grab, securing the house, what to do with the utilities, and who is responsible for what.

Remember, keep it short and simple. There won't be time to read complex instructions after the disaster strikes. Please, make a plan. As often stated in the military, plan for the worse and hope for the best. Take care out there and be careful.

TWO WARNINGS

TO THE DRIVERS OF MOTOCROSS/DIRT BIKES AND ATVS:

Please do not ride any off-road vehicles on the Swansboro Airport. This is a critical safety issue. The loud noise made by the vehicles makes it difficult for the riders to hear an airplane in the approach pattern for landing.

Many of us have spoken to the young riders, and most have been very responsive when the safety issue was explained. We appreciated their acknowledgment and the fact that they have stopped riding on the runway. There is still a problem with a few of the riders who have even returned pulling a boy on a skateboard. A letter will be sent to this family to make them aware of this ongoing problem. If the problem continues, the sheriff will be notified. Any damage to the runway or aircraft can be a federal offense. We hope that all off-road vehicles will remain off the runway for the safety of all concerned.

Zucchini Casserole

1 med. onion, chopped

1½ lbs zucchini (about 3 or 4 med.) shredded

4 oz. can diced chilies (Ortega)

3 T flour

1 to 1½ cups grated Monterey Jack cheese

1 cup cottage cheese (can substitute ½ - ⅔ cup milk)

2 T parsley (optional)

grated Parmesan cheese

Saute onions and zucchini in 2 T butter until crispy tender. Add chilies, flour, salt and pepper to taste. Mix well. Put in a 9 x 13 glass pan that has been greased or sprayed with Pam. Top with cottage cheese (or add milk if using) Add Jack cheese to top. Sprinkle with Parmesan. Bake at 350° for 20 - 30 minutes.

STILL HOT AND DRY

There were a couple of days at the end of July with high temperatures below 90°... and even one so far in August... Saturday the fourth. With the dry air, overnight minimums have been clustered near the sixty degree mark with an occasional dip into the upper fifties. But, Wednesday the 8th didn't go below 70°. Remember it feeling a tad sticky or muggy that morning? Notice a cloud or two (perhaps more) as sub-tropical air drifted north around sunrise? Over California, weather observers at Oakland, Ontario, Redding, El Cajon (Gillespie field), San Jose, San Francisco reported clouds around 14 to 18 thousand feet plus cirrus clouds at 20 thousand feet. Not to be outdone, Nevada added Las Vegas and Reno to the list: Vegas with towering cumuli at an eight a.m. observation. And, our San Francisco spotted some low stratus at 300 feet above ground.

That bit of low level cloudiness was not restricted to the Bay Area. Coastal locations from Crescent City in the north to San Diego in the south reported the low clouds, affirming that the marine layer is alive and well, as usual, from about April through early September. The cooling effect is noticed most markedly on the Farallones, three islands about 27 miles west of the San Francisco Peninsula. During an eleven year observation period, Southeast Farallon reported highest temperature for May, June, July, and August as 64°, 66°, 67°, and 64° respectively. And, that is why Mark Twain was reported to have complained that his coldest winter was the summer he spent in San Francisco.

During WWII, the current Lawrence Livermore Lab was a Navy primary flight training school (NAS Livermore). The weather station was on the third floor of the Administration Building with weather instruments on the roof directly above. From that rooftop vantage one could see the Coast Range and the summer evening wind pushing low clouds over hill tops, across the East Bay and into the Livermore Valley. Fog and cloud are summer night--time problem for local flying, and fog and low clouds a winter problem for student pilots on cross-country training into the San Joaquin Valley to the Crows Landing airfield.

All the numbers for July have been added and divided. The July average temperature: 76.2°, the average high was 91.9° and the average low 60.5°. There was no rain in July. Since the 27th of June through 19th of August ... 82 days without rain. If I'm

off somehow, let me know. I'll bet that Leo has been counting these rain-free days. The press has kept us aware and abreast of wildfires. Remember to keep Leo smiling. Be very careful!

So far no rain, as mentioned above. The August temperatures have been warm. Through the 19th, highs have averaged 97.3°, lows 62.2°, and the tentative monthly average 79.8. And that average is right up there with the 80° in 1994. So far, 18 days 90° or warmer; 13 days 95° or warmer; and 6 days 100° or hotter.

Will September be cooler? Local and other foothill areas indicate a lessening of the warm days, those with 100° or higher maxima. September nights usually cool into the middle 50's, while daytime highs are bunched into the lower 80's. Will it rain? Usually about a half of an inch or less mostly around the middle or latter half of the month about 60 percent of the time. If moisture is desired, rain dances are suggested.

Stargazing: The current issue of *Astronomy* features the observatory on Mount Palomar with its 200 inch telescope. At 5600' elevation, the September average high temperature is a mild 80° and the average low is around 58°. Some rain during the month, but only a third of an inch. Familiar data? Will Chantal strengthen into a fearsome, deadly hurricane? Late this Sunday afternoon, August 19th, the up-to-date release from the Miami hurricane center indicates that it will cross the relatively low-lying Yucatan Peninsula, and the Bay of Campeche. Apparently an Aerosonde was launched Friday, August 17th for low-level weather data while an Air Force jet flew a very high altitude sortie. I assume the device was an Aerosonde, a television reporter called it a robotic plane.

Remember: The real fall rains won't begin until later in October and November. Don't put too much faith into the local chant of "Fall rains begin about State Fair time", because the fair begins about a week to ten days earlier than when the chant began several decades ago. Y'all keep Leo out-of-work
