Last weekend I attended a class in Angels Camp that was entitled, "The Administration and Management of a Volunteer/Combined Department." Pretty impressive title at the very least. Two instructors from the National Fire Academy put it on so it was a pretty big deal as far as the instructors were concerned. It's intent was to give chiefs some ideas, concepts and tools on how to manage an all volunteer fire department or one that had volunteers and a few paid people. What I did get out of the class was I cannot really feel that sorry for myself because I am not the only fire chief in the world with problems. Seems that those of us who do manage volunteer fire departments have the same problems and concerns. Those being the lack of money, trying to keep up with state and federal mandates, insurance companies and lawyers running the country, and the recruitment and retention of volunteers.

Some good ideas did come out of the class along with some information that pointed out the importance of volunteer fire departments to the citizens in this country. In the United sates there are approximately 32,000 fire departments and of those 80% are volunteer organizations. Yet, you only hear of the big guys, the New York Cities, the LA's, the Phoenix types and what their problems are. Yet without volunteer fire departments through out the country there would be no fire service and a lot of things would simply burn up or those medical aids would not have first responders coming to them.

City and Counties Magazine estimates that a volunteer fire fighter is worth on a nation wide basis \$13.89 and hour. In our district alone the combined total hours the volunteers train and respond to are in excess of 2750 hours a year. That alone is worth about \$38,200 a year in value to this community. That figure also does not take into account the value of property saved and the lives saved or changed by what volunteers do. In our District, as in the majority of communities in this country, there is no other option available except to have volunteers. We are extremely fortunate to have these individuals who serve their community by being volunteer fire fighters, emergency medical technicians, and support group personnel.

There also appears to be a big difference in how volunteer fire departments function on the east coast

as compared to the west coast. One thing they do back there is that often the Chief is elected. Glad they do not do that out here. I would have been gone along time ago. Anyway, chiefs are elected and serve for a period of time, normally about 4 years. On the west coast most chiefs are paid and serve at the pleasure of a board of directors. Also, a practice that is prevalent back east, is before anyone can become a volunteer they have to be nominated and then elected by the volunteers who serve. So it becomes a popularity contest or one where family members are expected to be volunteers. Out here volunteers are recruited and are given the rights entitled to any employee. I prefer that because I do not want to run an organization where each member is in a popularity contest. East coast organizations have a tendency to specialize what their members do. Some members are fire fighters only, others are EMTs, some drive fire engines and others never can. Out here you are expected to do it all, after you go through a training program that makes it possible to do it all. Any way in my opinion we do it much better out here than they do back there.

Now is the time to have chimneys checked and cleaned, furnaces need to have their scheduled preventative maintenance done, and smoke detectors have new batteries installed. Also, winter is coming so start planning for it. In the meantime, be careful.

Thanksgiving is upon us. I like to try different sweet potato recipes and we like this one.

Spicy Sweet Potatoes

3 large sweet potatoes, peeled and cut into 1 inch cubes (about 6 cups)

2 T olive or canola oil

2 T brown sugar

1 t chili powder

½ t salt or to taste

1/4 t cayenne pepper

In a large resealable plastic bag, toss sweet potatoes and oil. Add remaining ingredients, toss to coat. Transfer potatoes to a greased 11"x7"x2" baking dish. Bake uncovered at 400° for 40-45 minutes or until potatoes are tender, stirring every 15 minutes. Serves 8.

The mostly rain-free summer was drier than normal. The warmest months, June through September managed only an even inch of rain, 0.21" late in June and 0.79" late in September. The last several years I've averaged about 1.38". A wet June in 1994 (3.05 inches) was the bumping factor that pushed this foothill area up from a long-term, seasonal dry of one inch. And, so far we've only had sprinkles early in October. Rain dances, incantations, other supplications might be in order.

How did September add up? The thirty-day average high temperature came to 90.4°: the thirty day average low temperature was 57.8°. The average temperature for September comes to 74.1°. Only one day with rain ... 0.79" on the 24th. Most notable was the major smoky period from the 6th through the 13th. Much of the visible smoke was aloft, but did collect in the canyons. After the smoke and the clouds departed around the beginning of autumn, the one and only "triple-digit" day came at the very last day of the month with a 101° high.

Our military effort, half-way around the world, also has dry weather with quite cold overnight temperatures. Random House through Times Books published a *World Weather Guide* in 1984. For Afghanistan, only Kabul and Kandahar have some weather data given. Kabul has an average high of 62° and an average low of 33° and a lowest of five

above zero Fahrenheit in November. Also, Kabul's elevation of nearly 6000' is listed. In what might be termed southern plains, Kandahar's weather data are given: average high in November 73°, the average low 36° and lowest 16°. Again, temperatures are on the Fahrenheit scale. Kandahar is riot really lowland as the elevation is about 3500'. Precipitation is greatest in the late winter and early spring in Kabul: nearly eight inches in March and April. Greatest precipitation is a bit earlier in Kandahar, January, February and March totaling nearly six inches. With the relatively high elevations and quite cold temperatures, much of the precipitation must be in the form of snow.

And, our late evening news shows had Sierra ski resorts making artificial snow around the 12th and 13th when their temperatures dropped below freezing and ours dipped below 50°. So far the average high for October has been around 88°, and the average low about 54°. As mentioned earlier, rain has been a no-show. Is there hope that November will cloud-up and rain?

Some fall color is beginning to show on the trees. Could that be a harbinger of wetter days? On the average, the answer to that query is: Yes. One cautionary note, however. The recent years, 1995, for example, disclose a November rainfall total only 0.85". The recent years average is nearly five inches. A long-term average for this foothill area is about 4½". At my place, corner of Mosquito and Holiday, that desert-like 0.85" of 1995 was sandwiched between a 9.12" in 1994 and a 7.90" in that turkey-day month of November 1996.

Keeping in step with the holidays too soon forthcoming; hope y'all went to the BOO festival and celebrated Halloween at our Fire Station. The temperatures do dip in November. The last several years highs have averaged just under 60° and lows slid under 40°. Again, these shorter-term averages are near longer period averages for this foothill area: Highs around 62° and lows about 38°. The warmer outer wear should be taken out of mothballs, hibernation or wherever and checked for wearability and Thanksgiving Day finery. Do enjoy!

It will be cooler and fires will find it harder to start and difficult to continue. The threat exists until that two or three day heavy, wetting rain arrives. We've done good! Don't let down! Do remember that Leo and his crew do more than stomp out fires: they respond, very quickly and very expertly to emergencies when called on at any time, day or night, even on repeat calls. When you see them, give them a "Well Done" or a hearty thank you, just in case one of you may need their help in the future. God Bless.

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Several of us have already met with the representative of El Dorado County Agricultural Department to advise us on the control of Yellow Starthistle.

For us the answer appears to be the use of Transline (Clopyralid), as directed by the Ag. Dept. representative, to be applied in April - May. Transline is very effective, both postemergence and preemergence, and is safe around animal feed. The only other plant, in the area it attacks is red clover. He indicated that the concentration be at least 5oz. /35 gallons of water per acre with .25% surfactant. The representative said that after the first spray we should be able to control the few new plants that come up next year with hand pulling or using The representative provided an Roundup. information sheet on Yellow Starthistle. A limited number of copies have been made and are at the Mosquito Fire Station if you want a copy.

The Ag. Dept. representative recommended two companies that professionally spray the Transline. The companies contacted varied from \$150 to \$135 per acre with a minimum of a total of 5 acres combined in the area. As the number of acres increase their cost per acre decreases down to about \$100, or less, per acre. Our thought is to see how many others in Mosquito/Swansboro would be interested in having their Starthistle sprayed. The two companies exceeded the Ag. Dept. recommended concentration by using 8oz./acre, the manufacturer's recommendation, to insure preemergence control.

If you want the El Dorado County Agricultural Department to send the representative to come to your property to do a Yellow Starthistle control evaluation, call 621-5520.
