2001 IN REVIEW

By the time you get this issue of the *Byte* the New Year will be here. Hard to believe this past year has gone by so quickly. Comes back to what you always hear when you are a kid but never believe," time goes by faster as you get older." And then there is also the common thing to say, "where did the time go?" No answer to that except it did it -- one day at a time.

The past year has been somewhat of a busy one, but not as busy as some we have had. Again this past summer had the potential of being a very busy and devastating one for not only our community but for all of El Dorado County. And again we were fortunate, there were no large wild land fires and what few we did have we were able to get onto real quick and get out before they had an opportunity to take off. We did have one engine and three fire fighters out fighting fire on mutual aid requests to Nevada, Calaveras County, Placer County and Butte County. Each year we seem to be called out more and more and seem to be going further and further. The State is utilizing mutual aid for strike team assignments more now then in the past and I am sure they will use it more in the future. The good things that come out of going on these strike teams is the fire fighters get some terrific experience and the fire department even gets paid for it.

Last year also proved that the majority of what we do is respond to request for medical help. Seems that now as with the majority of fire departments in the country we go to medical calls, in fact about 70% of what we do is medical. Last year we were dispatched to 44 medical calls. The majority of those came out good, with people coming home and returning to what is normal. However, last year also saw some who did not come home and they shall be missed.

As usual we had several vehicle accidents. Almost all are on bad weather days, with people going way to fast for the conditions and the result being someone getting hurt. Fortunately, and I do not really understand why no one was killed in a vehicle accident. With the way people are driving on Mosquito Road we should be going out more often and having more deadly results. Guess as a community we have been lucky. Last year the department responded to 16 vehicle accidents. Now, these are only the ones we were dispatched to as I know there were many more we were not called out on. That is evident when you drive to town and see all the new scars put into the road bank and into trees.

Another thing we do is in the category of Public Assist. These are calls for help that do not go through the 911 system. These calls can be anything from the old cat up in a tree to someone locked in a bathroom. We even had one where there was a dead skunk under the house, and another one was a hunter who forgot where he parked his car out in the forest – we did find it. Most are quite fun and are a treat as it gives us an opportunity to help someone out who is really not in serious trouble. We really get a lot of these types of calls when there is a good snowstorm. Any amount of snow seems to make people do weird things. First off they just have to go to town. Most of the time it is for no reason but they feel they have to go and when they do that is when things get interesting. Last year we did 32 public assist calls. That is really not as many as usual, but then we did not have a significantly bad winter.

We did respond to three structure fires last year with one of them resulting in about

a 40% loss of the house. Gratefully no one was injured and at the time of the year it occurred there was no serious threat to the wildland. The others we were able to jump on real quick and get them out before they did anything serious.

One series of incidents we had last year was an unusual number of search and rescues. These are the jurisdiction of the Sheriff's Office but they always use the fire station as a command post and use our people, especially the Support Group, to assist in the search. Last year we did four search and rescues. One lasted one day, a couple lasted several days and one lasted a whole week. Unfortunately, on that one the person was never found.

From a wildland fire standpoint we lucked out. In a normal summer we will average about ten wildland fires. Last summer we only had to respond to two within our own district and one in the National Forest. With a quick response and the volunteers' skill they were put out before they did very much. However, all three had great potential and we were fortunate to have the volunteers available at the times they occurred to put them out.

On the very first day of last year we responded to a helicopter crash. Again, no one was hurt but the result was the helicopter was completely destroyed after it caught fire. Fortunately, it crashed near a house and not into it. We were also dispatched to an aircraft down in the National Forest around Slab Creek. Again, the pilot and passenger were able to walk away from the crash and were picked up by U.S. Forest Service people.

Some of the other things we did last year was one control burn that got out of control, five illegal campfires at Rock Creek, one power lines down with a fire, one welfare check (checking someone at home from a request from a far away family member) and then there were several times we just checked on people because we thought it was a good thing to do.

All in all last year was a good one. Hopefully this year will have us responding to fewer calls, as each time our pagers go off and we pull out the doors it is usually to solve a problem where someone is either hurt or about to become that way.

So for 2002, be careful, help your neighbor and above all take care of yourself.

EARLY WHITE CHRISTMAS

On the mornings of the 20th and 21st of December a half inch of snow produced a white snowscape around our house, and just a bit lower toward Dyer Lake. Vehicles passing by showed a good bit more, undoubtedly from elevations higher than my approximately 2700 feet. Earlier in the month, there was three-quarters of an inch on the 3rd. There's more: snow grains were observed on the 10th. Snow grains appear much the same as puffed rice, considerably harder though from the quite cold air.

But, how cold was it in November, now that all the numbers are available? The average low for all thirty days...38.3° and the average high...53.4°. The high temperatures averaged about 3.5° but the lows averaged about one degree warmer. Rainfall for the month, at 6.75" averaged about an inch and a half more over a short-term, nine year normal of 5.17".

So far, December is attempting a fill-up of reservoirs and augmenting an early seaaon impressive snow-pack. Through the one and only Christmas Eve, my rainfall catch was almost ten inches. Decembers (all 31 days) have been as high as 20.31".and as low as 1.59" .In the temperature readings over about the past decade, lows have averaged 34.2° and highs were only 52.9°. Rainfall averaged only 6.63". Yes, we are above the short-term normal.

What did Santa have in his pack for us? Nearly a decade of Januarys show an average high of 53.1°. Lows average out to 34.7° and rainfall is nearly 12". About the only recent "dry" January was 1993 with 3.70".

This is certainly the season to believe; especially in the goodness, care and concern that we share with and for all. Past issues of the Byte have promoted community for us "on-the-hill" — all of us. The past few weeks have underscored the care and concern that exists in this community. Those of you who have helped, in whatever fashion, cannot be thanked sufficiently. Names of those who have aided me are not needed: You were there to help, and that you did.

I'm sure us all revered this Christmas by giving those we cherish the best and warmest affection. To all, God Bless and Happy New Year.
