It sure has been cold for the last couple of weeks. You know I would rather have rain instead of the cold. With the rain you only get wet on the outside, usually just skin deep. However, when you are cold it is all the way through you, down deep into the bones. I really shouldn't be crying so much; compared to some parts of the world we really do not get cold weather at all. I remember some winters when I was a kid in New Hampshire it would get down to around 30 below zero and every once in a while it would warm up to about 25 below. One thing I learned about that part of the country is there are about nine months of really great skiing and another three months of poor skiing.

One big difference between here and back east when it is winter is the way people drive. Back there if you put on chains they laugh at you. Out here they make people put on chains in an attempt to slow them down. Yet with chains and four wheel drive and all the precautions in the world people still seem to ignore the fact that when the roads are covered with snow or ice traction just goes away. Over the past two weeks there have been several cars that apparently ignored the fact that ice on a road is not a good thing and ended up hitting the bank. That part of Mosquito Road just south of La Paz Road has been real bad lately and has gotten some cars who found out the only way they could stop was by hitting the bank. Fortunately, no one has been hurt.

Another thing I have learned about living a winter in New Hampshire and one here in Mosquito is I really do like it out here much better. Here the winters are survivable and do not hurt so much while back there if you have any kind of a nervous system it just plain causes a great deal of pain. I am not a big fan of snow up to my butt for six months out of the year mixed with cold so intense it wakes up a hibernating bear. My wife who was born and raised in Vermont is always telling me the winters back there make those people "hardy." I tell her the winters make them hardy people. One thing I have learned about Vermonters is those cold winters have made their blood thick and their minds slow. I am grateful for the fact Vermonters really want to live back there, keeps them from living out here.

Yeah we are fortunate; we have just enough of a winter to make us appreciate the great summers we have. From a weather standpoint this is a hard place to beat since we do have four seasons and not one of them is severe enough to make us numb. However, as with most humans I am never happy with the weather. Around March I start longing for the summer heat and around August I really look forward to some rain and a change to colder temperatures. I guess being happy with what is around us is something we just can't seem to handle.

So far this winter we have not had any serious problems, any major vehicle accidents, chimney fires or house fires. I hope that trend keeps up, but as with all

things the guarantee is there will be a change. I just hope that when the change does come no one gets hurt. Things like damaged cars and burned houses can be replaced, but people can't. Now we are half way through the winter and those of us who have been using wood stoves to heat our houses need to clean the chimneys to avoid having a chimney fire. If you do have a chimney fire please do not hesitate to call 911, we will then be dispatched and be on our way. I have had several people ask me how do they know if they are having a chimney fire. Sometimes you may not know, often they are minor and the chimney can handle such a fire. However, if your chimney has not been cleaned in some time or you have been burning your stove with a partially closed damper there may be enough of a creosote build up on the chimney interior that does start to burn. If there is a great deal of creosote the fire will probably be very intense, there will be a great deal of noise coming from the chimney flue, there will be the smell similar to that of burning paint, there could be some vibrations coming from the stove doors or dampers. Outside there may be a great deal of flame coming from the chimney cap possibly extending several feet above and it is also possible for creosote to be pushed out of the chimney onto the roof. If the chimney was installed correctly and has not suffered damage from previous chimney fires than all things should be all right. However, if the fire is intense enough and the chimney fails then there will be fire extending into the attic or onto the roof. This is a bad thing that could result in extensive damage, or God forbid, someone getting seriously hurt. Again, if you suspect there is a fire in your chimney call 911. We will arrive, check for any fire extension and if there is any fire do everything possible to put it out. Do not hesitate to give a call.

Winter is not over; there is still plenty of time for snow, ice and cold. So be careful.

GREAT SOUP

I first had this great soup at Stuart Anderson's Black Angus restaurant. It looks long and involved, but it is so great.

Baked Potato Soup

4 large baking potatoes (about 2 3/4 pounds)

2/3 cup butter or margarine

2/3 cup all-purpose flour

3/4 t salt

1/4 t white pepper

6 cups milk

1 cup (8 ounces) sour cream

1/4 cup thinly sliced green onions

10 bacon strips, cooked crisp and crumbled

1/4 cup (4 ounces) shredded cheddar cheese

Bake potatoes at 350° for 65-75 minutes or until tender. Cool completely. Peel and cube potatoes. In a large saucepan, melt butter; stir in flour, salt and pepper until smooth. Gradually add milk. Bring to a boil. Cook and stir for 2 minutes or until thickened. Remove from heat; whisk in sour cream. Add potatoes and green onions. Garnish with bacon and cheese.

This short article is to update our community on the progress to find a suitable location for our proposed elementary school.

The criteria has been difficult to accommodate due to many factors. First, our airport poses a problem as a school may not be built within a 1/4 mile radius of the flight path. This FAA rule eliminated the use of any portion of the Finnon property. Also, the property needed to have access to EID water yet due to the Swansboro DC&Rs it could not be within the subdivision boundaries. The topographical terrain must also lend itself to playgrounds and accessibility.

There have been several sites looked at and one seems to fit the criteria. The property owners have been approached and are agreeable as long as terms can be reached. The committee still has to meet with the land owner to work out the details. The county must also approve the split of the land from a larger piece. Hopefully all of the challenges can be worked out and our school plans can move forward. As more information becomes available I will let the community know.

As slow as it seems, progress is being made on the Finnon Project. The E.I.D. water line to the restaurant is almost finished. The gutted restaurant has been repaired with two new glue lams in the ceiling and new 2' x 4's and 2' x 6's. We've created a new cooking area, storage and bathrooms. So far, January is dry but cold. December with nearly a dozen inches, spread over 17 days, was wet and wetter. Over much of the past decade, December rain totals average around six and three quarter inches: December of 1996 had a whopping 20 inch rainfall total, the most in the last several years.

This December's average high temperature 48.8° and an average low temperature 35. 5°. My records show, over the last several years, an average high for December 53.4° and an average low of 33.9°. A bit colder than normal does seem appropriate. And the three days with measurable snowfall, 3rd, 20th and 21st must be chronicled, although each had less than an inch at my place

The rains continued into the first week of the New Year, but the total is a paltry 1.75". An average January should come up with a foot of rain. Rain may materialize late on the 21st this month but it may take several robust storm systems to produce the needed ten inches to ensure a monthly January normal. The Sierra snow-pack is good; excessive rain into it from semi-tropical areas would make for many problems.

When precipitation amounts are small, it is usually cold air as the scape-goat. The first couple of weeks this January were mild. Temperatures were mild and there was some rain. The 14th through the 18th, morning lows dropped out of the milder 40's, right through the 30's and to the middle 20's. I showed a 24° low on the 15th and 25° on the 16th. The dustings of snow that we had in December were less spectacular than the frosts this week in the middle of January. Frost was everywhere. Roofs of homes, out-buildings, cars, open fields, roads and, of course, our very own Mosquito Road wooden bridge..

Statewide it was cold. An example: Yreka in Siskiyou county the morning of January 18th reported a low of 20°. That's quite cold. However, Lancaster's W.J. Fox airport reported a low of 20° also. Lake Tahoe's south shore almost went down to zero, but stopped at plus 2°. On the east side of the Sierra, Bishop reported a low of 11°. A bit of a switch noted around Sacramento: the Executive Airport had a low of 28° while the International Airport was two degrees warmer at 30°. One expects the more rural

airfield to be colder.

The cold air, of course, moved south across western Canada from polar latitudes. A high pressure ridge apexed over eastern Alaska. Wind flow around thirty thousand feet was almost directly from the north. A minor break split the flow over northern California. Turning eastward, it developed a 140 knot (about 160 mph) speed over the Ohio River valley.

It is almost February...a short month. After March and April we're into May when temperatures have flirted with the century mark. But, focusing on February, this area of the Mother Lode shows highs around 55-56°. Overnight lows generally dip to the mid-thirties. Rainfall generally totals around 6" to 7". At my place February highs have averaged 52.7° and the lows averaged 34.5°. Precipitation averaged 10.40 ". Interestingly, the greatest and least amounts were back-to-back: 17.02" in 1998 and only 1.58" in 1997.

Into this second month of the new year, days of note are forthcoming.. .Ash Wednesday, the 13th; Presidents' Day, the 18th; and of course Valentine's Day. Remember: Valentine's Day does not have to be only February 14th ; there are 364 days for additional celebrations in a like manner. Happy hearts to all!

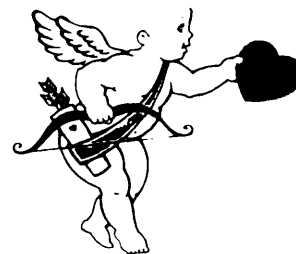
