The last two articles I wrote for the Byte focused on the heavy fuel loading throughout the Mosquito Fire District and the starting of a prevention program to help get rid of some of this fuel. Fortunately, I did get a response from the Swansboro Pilots Association, as they are willing to help come up with a solution to the problem. They will be working with me and other members of the community who want to protect our community by working towards preventing the destruction caused by a wild land fire. I am grateful that organization has stepped up to the plate and is so willing to help solve a problem. If anyone else wants to participate please give me a call.

Our wild land fire problem is not a unique one as you have seen on the news. Many acres and homes are being lost to fire in Colorado, New Mexico and Arizona. This year is shaping up to be one of the most destructive in US history. There are many reasons; such as drought conditions over the majority of the west, heavy brush and fuel loads, and the many homes that are being built in the rural areas. The frightening thing about the losses so far is that it is so early in the fire season. This September may be a catastrophic one for California and other western states.

Now that I have written about trying to prevent a wild land fire by developing fuel reduction strategies I want to write about what to do when a fire does start in or near our community. Notice I did not say "if" a fire starts but "when". It is simply a matter of time when either by nature, accident, or arson a fire will start and take off destroying everything. I just hope when that day comes there are not any other large fires in the area so that more resources will be available to fight such a fire.

Fires are normally a function of people, their activities and their movements. The majority of fires in California and in our District start on the side of a road, where the majority of people and movement takes place. For years I have planned for a fire and have hoped that it would not take place. Being a realist the odds are a fire will either start on Rock Creek Road at Rock Creek Bridge, on Mosquito Road at the swinging bridge or at Slab Creek Reservoir. In either case that fire will originate in a deep canyon with steep walls and a great deal of fuel. A fire of that type will start easy and accelerate quickly burning up the canyon walls to the top. Once at the top depending on weather conditions the fire will spread out and most likely be fuel driven. From a

suppression stand point the best opportunity to put such a fire out is when it just hits the top and does not have a chance to spread out. That suppression is often a result of weather conditions, the type of fuel burning and resources available to carry out the suppression activity.

When the day comes and there is a fire starting anywhere in this District this Fire Department will be the first dispatched along with the California Department of Forestry and Fire Prevention, equipment from other near by fire departments, the U.S. Forest Service, along with as much aircraft and hand crews that are available. We are very aggressive when it comes to fighting wild land fires as we know the best way to save structures is to put out the fire before it gets any size to it. However, our responsibility is to lives within our community, fire fighter safety, and property. Those three priorities will be what we do. When I respond to a wild land fire one of the first things I do is make a decision of whether to fight the fire or protect a house. We always do everything possible to protect the house but only after someone's life is not being threatened or a fire fighters safety is not being jeopardized.

So when this big fire does come along what can you, as a member of this community, do? First off make sure good clearances are maintained around your house. This one thing alone will greatly increase our ability to save your house. Make sure your driveway is cleared enough to make it possible for a fire engine to get to your house. Remember your little Toyota may be able to access your driveway but can a 16-ton fire engine do it? Take the time to look at your driveway and see if a cement truck or a moderate sized U-haul truck can go down it without tearing it self up. Make sure your roof and gutters are clean and any hanging limbs are removed. Be aware of how your house fits in the wild land and see if it can be saved. If you are not sure give Devery or me a call (626-9017) and we will gladly come to your house and check it out for you.

Other things you can do to lessen the impact of a large fire is to make sure important papers and documents are stored in a safe place or are ready to be moved with you in the event of an evacuation. For years my wife has placed pictures, insurance and property documents, along with things she cannot replace in an ice chest in the closet next to the front door. The whole thing can be picked up and put in the car.

Make sure all members in your family know what

to do if there is a fire. Where they are to meet, whom they can stay with, what they can do to help each other, and what they need to get by for several days. Each family should have a plan developed and reviewed so that each member knows what to do. A little planning in the beginning could be a lifesaver.

One thing to take into consideration during a fire is there are only three ways in and out of our community - either west on Rock Creek Road, south on Mosquito Road or north on Mosquito Road. To keep anyone from getting hurt we usually block off Mosquito Road or Rock Creek Road if a fire is taking place on one of them. Mosquito Road to the north is all dirt through the National Forest and can be a difficult ride depending on the vehicle you are driving. To help solve these problems the Fire Department Support Group and members of the Pilots Association who own hangers have developed plans and locations for evacuation. Often it is better to evacuate people to a safe and near location then having them drive down long dangerous roads to get out of the area. Several of the owners of hangers at the Swansboro Runway have graciously stated they will open their hangers to the community in the event an evacuation is necessary. This evacuation effort will be done in partnership with the Mosquito Fire Department Support Group and the American Red Cross. An area for animals has also been established for evacuation and will be controlled by the El Dorado County Animal Control and the Support Group.

I don't want to scare anyone and be the harbinger of doom and gloom but I also want you to realize that we live in a world of risk. We don't have tornadoes, (most of the time), floods, hurricanes, earthquakes (most of the time) but we do have wild land fires. They are a part of living in the state of California and especially in the foothills. Therefore we have to be ready. Do some planning with your family, get important personnel papers together, rely on common sense thinking and above all; be safe.

Enclosed in this issue of the *Byte* is a brochure provided by the El Dorado County Fire Safe Council. Will your home survive is the question. Please read the information and evaluate your situation and create a plan to correct any problems. We who live in rural areas need to be aware of the steps to be taken to help protect our families and homes from danger.

1 pkg (8½ oz) corn bread mix 1 can (4 oz) chopped green chilies, undrained 1% tsp ground cumin 1% tsp dried oregano pinch rubbed sage

Prepare corn bread batter according to package directions. Stir in chilies, cumin, oregano and sage. Spread in a greased 8 inch square baking pan. Bake at 400° for 20 - 25 minutes or until a toothpick inserted near the center comes out clean.
