dur first storm

The rainstorm a couple of weeks ago did a pretty good job of officially ending the wild land fire season. At the least CDF down staffed all their stations and shut down all the aircraft for the winter. We were very fortunate this past summer as we did not have a single wildland fire. That is the first time since I have been Chief that we have gone an entire summer without at least one wildland fire. For information I have now been Chief for over 15 years so that is a long time. We did respond to fires outside of our district during the summer as mutual aid request to other fire district. In fact we sent an engine with three fire fighters to fires in Placer County, Amador County, Sacramento County, Rocklin and El Dorado Hills.

For awhile there I was beginning to wonder if winter was ever going to come and then all of a sudden we had one real tough storm blow in. As we all know that storm knocked out the electrical power to the District. Some damage was caused in and about the area but not much. When I left in the morning to go to the fire station I knew I had some problems when I saw composition shingles all over my front yard. I went up on the roof and found I had lost about 30 square feet of my roof. I did manage to get a tarp over it so there was very little water damage. What burns me the most is having the time to fix the darn roof, as there are many other things I would rather be doing.

When I arrived at the fire station that same morning there was still power there and then once Mary (our new secretary) arrived the power went out. However, our phone did not go out and I really hate that. It isn't so bad if the power and phone go out but

when just the power is gone it becomes miserable. Mary sat down at the desk and spent the rest of her day answering the phone. I wasn't surprised when the first call came in within three minutes. The caller had but one question, "When will the power be back on?" From that point on it only got worse. What many people do not seem to realize is that those of us working at the fire station only have the same amount of information they do. We do not have a crystal ball. One thing we will not do is give out false or unknown information. If anyone is going to make a fool out of themselves I prefer it to be PG&E.

After the power had been out for a while the phone system in parts of the district started to fail. There is a battery back up system that keeps the phone lines going for about 8 hours after a power failure. What the phone company does if the power is going to be out for longer than that is bring up generators to run the system and charge the batteries. Well that is exactly what they did; they brought up four of them. No sooner had they been put out when some scumbag stole three of them. Here is a large company and some hard working people trying their best under some nasty conditions to provide all of us with a service and a real classic scumbag rips them and all of us off. When this was done the phone company employee told me he had to go back and try to find some more generators. He was concerned for we would be up here with out 911 service, he personally cared about that fact.

He had not been gone five minutes when someone came down to the fire station ranting and raving at how inept, inconsiderate, and lazy the phone company was. I kind of lost it and told the bozo to go away, get in his car and go out and be a real hero and find the scumbags that stole the generators. If anyone out there has an idea of who the jerk was that ripped off the generators please contact the sheriff. This action threatened the safety of all of us; all of us in this community were fortunate as no one had an emergency that required the use of 911

One other thing, the east side of our district is supplied with power from a line that comes down from Camino across the river and back up near Slab Creek Court. The west side gets its power from a line that starts over by Kona Way, goes down across the river and back up behind Finnon Lake. Usually if just one line goes down PG&E can supply the entire

district from the other line by just throwing switches. In this case they couldn't because the outage was a massive one throughout the County. So what we have to realize is that when a nasty weather event comes through it not only affects us but the entire County, heck maybe the whole State. So there is nothing wrong with doing a little planning, getting together a few supplies, some lanterns, flashlight and radio batteries, and above all else some common sense.

I do not have a crystal ball but I do know and even guarantee there will be other storms and that they will knock out the electrical and phone services. Preparing for it, planning to get through it and utilizing common sense to do it is something we all need to work at doing. I can also guarantee that the people working for the Phone Company and PG&E will be working on getting it all back to us.

Take care, winter is here and the roads can get you.

PASY CARE

This cake is similar to a brownie in texture but still cake-like. Easy and scrumptious. Half of the icing recipe is enough unless you like it thick. For those who are not watching calories, use regular mixes!

BLACKBERRY CAKE

1 box (18 ½ oz.) reduced-fat yellow cake mix.

1 box (1 oz.) sugar free instant vanilla pudding mix

1 box (3 oz.) sugar free raspberry gelatin

2 eggs

1/3 c. egg substitute (or one more egg)

1 jar (10 oz.) seedless blackberry spreadable fruit

½ c. unsweetened applesauce

1/4 c vegetable oil

lcing

1/4 stick butter or margarine softened

3 c. confectioners sugar

3 tbs milk (fat-free or regular)

In a large bowl, combine the cake mix, pudding

mix and gelatin. In a small bowl, beat the eggs (and substitute if used) spreadable fruit, applesauce and oil. Stir into the dry ingredients just until moistened. Pour into a 10" x 15" baking pan coated with nonstick cooking spray. Bake at 350° for 35-40 minutes or until a toothpick comes out clean. Cool on a wire rack.

In a small bowl, combine icing ingredients until smooth. Spread over cooled cake. 20 servings.


